Local ISO classification upgraded

The Kewanna-Union Township Fire Volunteer Fire Department has been informed that, effective December 1, the community's ISO Public Protection Classification (PPC) has been upgraded to Class 4 from Class 6.

The classification is set by the Insurance Service Office (ISO). ISO collects and evaluates information from communities in the United States on their structure fire suppression capabilities. The surveys are conducted whenever it appears that there is a possibility of a classification change.

The ISO rating plays an important role in the underwriting process used by insurance companies. Most insurance companies in the country, including the largest ones, use PPC information as part of their decision making when deciding what business to write, coverages to offer or prices to charge for personal or commercial property insurance.

ISO ratings range from Class 1 to Class 10, Class 1 being the highest representing exemplary fire protection. Class 10 indicates that the area's fire suppression program does not meet minimum recognition criteria. The Class 4 rating granted to Kewanna and Union Township is a real plus for local property owners when it comes to purchasing insurance.

Kewanna/Union Township is one of 73 communities in the state to receive the Class 4 rating. There are no Class 1 ratings, only one Class 2 rating and 45 Class 3 ratings. A total of 1,695 communities in Indiana were rated by the ISO.

Three major features are considered when establishing the ISO rating for a community: the fire alarm and communication system (10%), the fire department (50%), and the water supply system (40%). In many communities, ISO develops a split classification; the first applies to properties within five miles of a fire station and within 1000 feet of a fire hydrant. The second classification applies to properties beyond 1000 feet of a hydrant, but within five road miles of a fire station. The local classification applies both to the town and the township.

The local fire department and water department are to be commended for the effort, time and money they have put in to gaining a better ISO classification.

The News In Brief

Due to the Christmas holiday, The Observer will be published a day later next week. We will be printing and mailing on Thursday rather than Wednesday. Unless someone comes forward in the next few days, that will also be our last issue of The Observer as we are planning to retire after 45 years of publishing the local newspaper.

Akron Area Arts League member, Mike Yazel, is the featured artist this month at the Fulton County Public Library in Rochester. Mike lives in the Mentone area and paints rural landscapes in oils and watercolors. His watercolor of Webb's Pharmacy in downtown Akron was accepted into the Hoosier Salon earlier this year. The salon is one of the most prestigious art organizations in Indiana. His work will be on display at the library until January 13.

Town clerk-treasurer Jenny Kay is looking for old black and white pictures of Kewanna scenes to place in the town hall. If you have any you would like to share, take them to her at the town hall, 308 S. Logan Street.

The Kewanna town council will meet in special session at 4:30 p.m. Thursday, December 29, at the town hall to conduct year-end business.

The swearing in ceremony for newly elected town/city office holders will be held Sunday, January 1, at 2 p.m. at Rochester City Hall. The ceremony is open to the public and all are invited to attend. A reception with cookies and punch will follow the swearing in ceremony performed by Judge Wayne Steele. (Note: Kewanna town officials are not planning to participate in this ceremony, but will be sworn in at a later date.)

The Central Indiana Transit Task Force plans to ask state legislators to approve funding for a mass transit plan that would include train service from Noblesville to downtown Indianapolis. The legislation would also include a transit governance structure. The group purposes to pay for the \$1.3 billion project through an income tax of three-tenths of one percent in Marion and Hamilton counties and federal money.



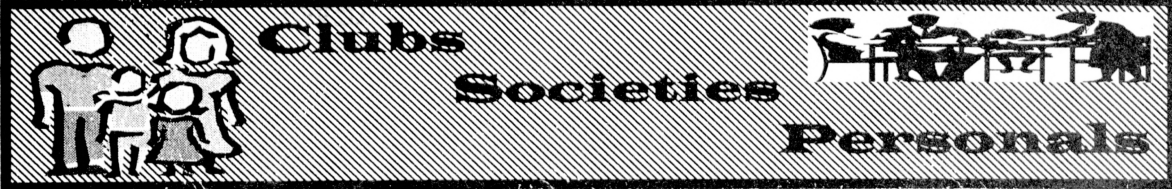

I've learned a lot in the last two decades.

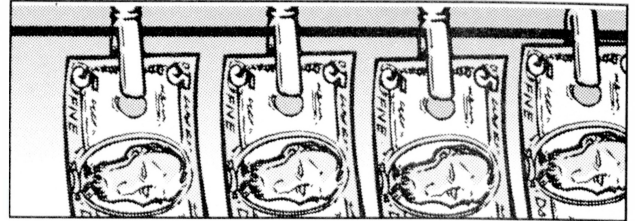
I've learned sometimes you take your spouse for granted
