Unless a buyer comes forward in the next month, we will discontinue publication of The Observer at the end of the year.

We really regret that it will mean another vacant business building on Main Street and the community will lose its ability to advertise its activities through a local media, but we have been here for 45 years, having purchased the business January 1, 1967. (Joe has actually been here since 1959, as he worked for previous owners).

The country's economic condition and new technology are a hindrance to the sale of newspapers today - small or large. People are relying more and more on the Internet for their news and information. Myself, I still prefer a cup of coffee and my newspaper.

We have seen many changes in the newspaper business and the town during our 45 years in business.

When we purchased The Observer we were setting type on a linotype and printing on a big Babcock press that shock the building when in operation. In 1967, there were no vacant lots in the business district and the buildings were all occupied by a mom and pop business. The stores, including the bank, were closed on Thursday afternoon and they had extended hours in the weeks before Christmas so local residents could get their shopping done.

We are truly grateful to our advertisers and subscribers for providing us a living here as we have always enjoyed living in this "Little Town With A Big Heart."

The Fulton County Commissioners will meet at 9 a.m. Monday, December 5, in the commissioners' room of the Fulton County Office Building, Rochester. Assessed values will be available for review in the County Auditor's Office at least seven (7) days prior to the date of the Department budget hearing. Taxpayers shall have the right to be heard and/or to present written testimony on the budgets, tax rates and tax levies as adopted by the above named taxing units.

The following only apply if the County Board of Tax Adjustment or County Auditor modifies the budgets, tax rates, or tax levies of a political subdivision:

Ten (10) or more taxpayers or one (1) taxpayer that owns property that represents at least ten percent (10%) of the taxable assessed valuation in the political subdivision may initiate an appeal from the modification of a political subdivision's budget, tax rate, or tax levy by filing a statement of their objections with the County Auditor. The statement must be filed not later than ten (10) days after the publication of the notice required by IC 6-1.1-17-12. The statement must specifically identify the provisions of the budget, tax rate, or tax levy to which the taxpayers object. The County Auditor shall forward the statement, along with the taxing unit's budget, to the Department. IC 6-1.1-17-13.

A political subdivision may appeal to the Department for an increase in its tax rate or tax levy as modified by the county board of tax adjustment or the county auditor. To initiate the appeal, the political subdivision shall file a statement with the Department not later than ten (10) days after publication of the notice required by IC 6-1.1-17-12. The legislative body of the political subdivision must authorize the filing of the statement by adopting a resolution. The resolution must be attached to the statement of objections, and the statement must be signed by:

(1) In the case of counties, by the board of county commissioners and by the president of the county council.
(2) In the case of all other political subdivisions, by the highest executive officer and by the presiding officer of the legislative body. IC 6-1.1-17-15.

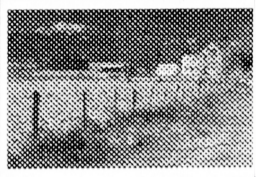
