Francis Schaeffer (1912-1984) was a pastor with an uncanny ability to present Christianity as intellectually relevant to modern man. He artfully demonstrated to a generation that was falling away from the Christian faith that the Bible gave answers to the big questions of life. He taught that God is really there and He is not silent. He has spoken to us through the Bible and through history. Faith in Jesus is not a "leap of faith" but rather the logical result of examining the world. As such, Schaeffer invigorated the "life of the mind" and the importance it plays in living the Christian life. With his wife, Edith, he founded a haven for those seeking "honest answers to honest questions" in a village in Switzerland naming it "L'Abri". French for shelter. During the last several years of his life he lectured widely and wrote over 20 books on various aspects of faith, church and culture. He is viewed as having had a tremendous influence on evangelism and the evangelical church in America. He is probably best known for his book and video series, "How Shall We Then Live". +++



I am abundantly able to store fat. My metabolism is decreasing with each birthday. Where are my pom poms when I need them?


