KEWANNA TOWN COUNCIL

The Kewanna town council met in regular session Thursday, November 3, at the town hall. The meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. by the president, Jeff Finke. Others present were council members Mark Smith and Dan Birge; clerk-treasurer, Jenny Kay; marshal, Dennis Price; assistant fire chief, Larry Baldwin; and Consolidated Union account executive, Michael Bowditch.

The minutes of the October regular meeting were read and approved.

Marshal Price submitted his monthly report noting one traffic arrest, seven traffic warnings, one criminal arrest, one accident report, 39 calls answered and 1,465 miles patrolled.

Baldwin gave the fire department's monthly report revealing 14 responses during October, seven in the town (all medical) and seven in the township (two fire and five medical). He also requested the current balance left in the department's equipment fund for 2011. The clerk was asked prior to the meeting by the library architect, Harry Mohler, to see that the fire chief or assistant chief be in attendance during the punch list meeting at the library at 4 p.m. Thursday, November 10, to sign off on the functioning of the sprinkler and fire alarm systems.

Consolidated Union executive Michael Bowditch again sought the council's approval to continue to work toward a quote for the town's insurance. He has been working with the town clerk to gather information for the quote but is at a stand still waiting for loss runs. The council suggested that the clerk contact Smith Sawyer Smith to give them a deadline for requested information as well as for a proposal for the year 2012. A special meeting was set for 4 p.m. Monday, November 14, to select an insurance carrier based on quotes.

Pay request No. 12 from Leo Brown Construction for the library addition was approved for payment upon receipt of the state draw down.

The 2012 Keystone Disaster Recovery Plan was approved.

Claims against the town, water and sewage works were okayed for payment.

The town superintendent's October report noted that the dump truck was taken to Winamac for a front end alignment. The small generator was put into running condition and taken to the town hall. A

water main break behind Plymouth Tube was repaired by DeSabatines. The leaf machine was made ready for leaf pickup. A day was spent moving equipment around in the town garage to make more room. A representative from Utility Supply was in town to work on the wand and hand-held meter reader. Justin Field gave the town an old front end for its red ¾ ton truck. Town employees took off all the parts needed and returned the rest to Fields. A bad u-joint and broken transfer case were also found. Repair parts were purchased on E-bay at about one-third the cost of new. The frame is bent and the colors are not right, but it gives the town another truck to make use of. Blackburn Tire repaired one of the rear tires on the big tractor. Water works test sample results were received from the lab and they have been forwarded to the state. An electrical solenoid for one of the chlorine switches was replaced. It was later determined the switch was good, but a diaphragm had to be replaced. Problems at the No. 1 lift station were repaired. A hose was replaced on the white ¾ truck. Town employees worked with the town's recently acquired vactor truck to learn how to use it. In the process, they cleaned four catch basins. The water works pumped a total of 1,252,000 gallons of water in October.

Sunshine Floral has much to

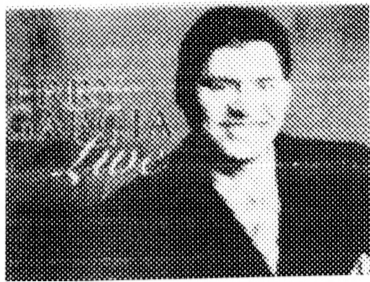

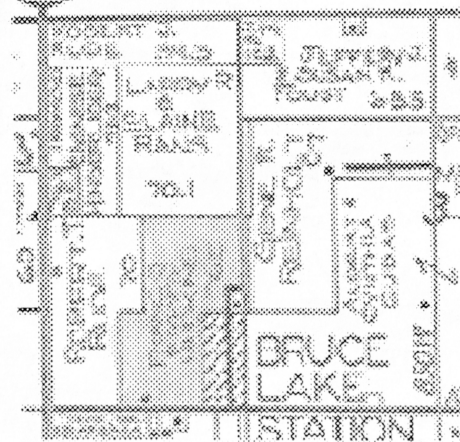

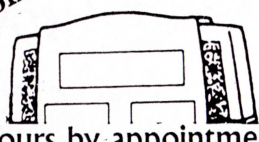

Looking Back.....

SIXTY YEARS AGO November 16, 1951

While trading in a store in Three Rivers, Mrs. Poore received a large gash in her leg from a sharp piece of metal protruding from a box setting in the aisle.

One of Kewanna's favorite eating spots closed up Sunday night and will remain closed at least until November 17. Aubrey Zellers, former owner, announced that he has sold the establishment to Mr. and Mrs. Carl Heiden. The Heidens hope to have the Coffee Shop opened by Saturday. The Heiden family moved to Kewanna 12 years ago and has been farming just east of town.

Mr. and Mrs. Ira Overmyer celebrated their 45th wedding anniversary in their farm home near Kewanna Sunday with a family dinner at the noon hour.

The Fulton County Firemen held their regular meeting Monday evening at the Grass Creek School. The main item of business was the election of officers. Everett Cunningham of Grass Creek was chosen as president; Bob Hartford, vice president; and Harold Woolington, secretary-treasurer. Grass Creek won \$5 for having the largest attendance.



Sheep and goat webinar series

Local residents can learn more about goat production through a series of webinars sponsored by Purdue University Extension Service, Kentucky State University, and the University of Kentucky.

This is a two-hour long, two part series that will focus on kidding care and birthing in does and ewes, feeding, management, marketing and economic projection issues in raising goats. Goat production numbers are rising in Indiana and Kentucky. According to the USDA, 45,000 goats are raised in Indiana and 87,000 in Kentucky.

The webinars will be held on

two consecutive Wednesday nights starting on November 30 from 7 to 9 p.m. EST.

Session 1 on November 30 concerns kidding and kid care and will feature Dr. Kenneth Andries, Kentucky State University; and dealing with difficult births in does and ewes by Endre Fink, University of Kentucky.

Session 2 on December 7 features feeding and management tips to reduce input costs for sheep and goat producers led by Dan Morrill, Extension Sheep Specialist, Iowa State University; and marketing and economic projections for sheep and goat producers for 2012 and beyond by Erica Rosa-Sanko, Agricultural Economist from the Livestock Marketing Information Center.

These programs will be carried by several extension offices throughout Indiana. Contact your local extension office to see where the program will be held in your area and the fee. Advanced registration by November 23 is required. More information on this series can be found at the Fulton County Purdue website at www.ag.purdue.edu/counties/fulton.

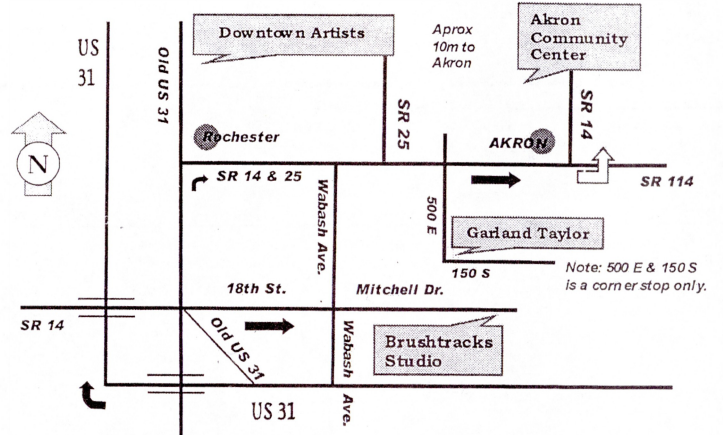
