





Foreign persons must report land holdings

The Farm Service Agency in Indiana reminds foreign persons with an interest in agricultural lands in the United States that they must report their holdings and any transactions to the U.S Secretary of Agriculture.

Any foreign person who acquires, transfers or holds any interest, other than a security interest, in agricultural land in the U.S. is required by law to report the transaction no later than 90 days after the date of the transaction.

Foreign investors must file Agriculture Foreign Investment Disclosure Act (AFIDA) reports with the FSA county office that maintains reports for the county where the land is located. For AFIDA purposes, agricultural land is defined as any land used for farming, ranching or timber production, if the tracts total 10 acres or more.

Disclosure reports are also required when there are required changes in land use. Data gained from these disclosures is used to prepare an annual report to the President and Congress concerning the effect of such holdings upon family farms and rural communities in the U.S. For more information, contact
