

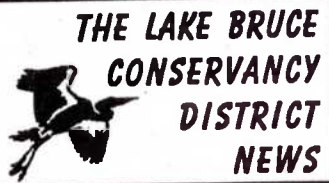

The Lake Bruce Conservancy District board of directors met Thursday, April 14, in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station with four directors, four freeholders and one guest in attendance.

The minutes of the February 27th meeting and the treasurer's report were read and approved. The chairman went through the correspondence received since the last meeting.

Old business included legal updates on two properties. One is still not connected to the sewer system and is in the hands of the Fulton County Board of Health. Acting on advice from its attorney, the board reclassified the second property as a two unit apartment bringing it into compliance with LBCD ordinances.

The board voted to accept a bid from DeSabatine Brothers Excavating to resurface the gravel driveways at the wastewater treatment plant and vac stations. Also, AIRVAC will arrange for replacement of mulch beds at both the east and west vac stations.

Wastewater treatment plant operator, Richard Denney, reported violations of ammonia for the last four months. He said the plant looks good and he doesn't know why the violations are occurring, but is working on trying to figure it out. The plant is having difficulty recovering from the cold winter. Richard and Director Bradley are considering various options to cover the critical tanks in the plant before next winter. There is also evidence of possible surface and/or ground water getting into the system.

Chairman Porter reported that the district has received its weed treatment permit for 2011 from the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). He has forwarded the permit to Clark Aquatics and is waiting to hear from them. He also noted that anyone interested in adding goose eggs should get a permit and start anytime. The directors discussed the schedule for the 2012 budget plan. The process will begin at the next meeting in June and end with the adoption of the 2012 budget at the August meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 8 p.m. There will be no meeting in May. The next meeting will be Thursday, June 9, at 7 p.m. in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station.

Redbud Trail Rendezvous, April 30 – May 1

Re-enactors from five states are gearing up for the Redbud Trail Rendezvous April 30 – May 1. This annual event is brimming with frontier history and often brings surprises for the participants and the public. Apple dumplings like the ones served at the Trail of Courage will be available this year.

The April weather varies from chilly to warm, but the redbud trees and wild flowers in the woods should be full of bloom in their natural setting. Wild ducks and wild turkey nests are seen on the grounds of the Fulton County Historical Society where the event is held from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, April 30, and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday, May 1. The FCHS grounds are located four miles north of Rochester on U.S. 31. The event will go on, rain or shine.

Over 100 historic re-enactors set up camps and live outdoors for the event, demonstrating traditional crafts, frontier life ways, and pioneer skills such as cooking over wood fires, muzzle loading shooting and tomahawk throwing. The event is educational and fun, showing authentic frontier history as re-enacted by real people.

Music and dance will be performed on a stage in the woods, a different program every half hour in the afternoon. Unless otherwise stated they will happen both days. Programs include Mark Gropp with bagpipe music; Frontier Frolic – pioneer dancing by the teenage re-enactors; and Liza and Mark Woolever – music, songs and Indian dances. Kim Hoover of Hoots to Howls Wildlife Rehabilitation, Star City, will show wild birds and animals she rescued on Saturday and Shirley Kern Needham will show a red-tailed hawk named Phoenix and a red-shouldered hawk both days. Marsha Glassburn of

Rochester will also be doing storytelling on the west side of the woods at the storyteller booth.

People dressed in authentic pre-1840 outfits demonstrate many traditional crafts such as flint knapping, bow making beadwork, spinning and weaving, leather, wood carving, blacksmithing, blade smthing, scrimshaw, finger weaving, and much more.

Members of the Seven Years War time period will be set up in the Living History Village and will be doing training demonstrations such as marching, canon firing and horse training. They will be working on the basics of the manual of arms and also do some programs on field fortifications and battalion exercises. They will march around the grounds applying their learning to a series of obstacles and scenarios. On Sunday, they will have a competitive shoot using muskets, pistols, bayonets and swords, as well as swivel guns and mortars at the shooting range in Chippeway Village.

Many trade goods and handmade items used for frontier living are offered for sale or barter in merchants' historic marquee tents and by blanket traders. Many of the traders have Indian ancestry. Traders come from Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, Kentucky and other states.

Muzzle loading shooting

contests will be held. Earl Whittaker of Peru and John Pratt of Indianapolis are the range officers. Both are members of the Me-to-cin-yah Long Rifles, which portrays woodsmen of the frontier with a camp by the river and conduct pioneer children's games. They will host the Chippeway Village Trading Post.

Foods cooked over wood fires will include ham and beans, vegetable stew, buffalo burgers, sassafras tea, apple dumplings, potato cnpis, caramel corn, homemade fudge and cookies.

Admission is \$3 for adults ages 12 and over and \$1 for children ages 6-11. Children age five and under are admitted free. Proceeds enable the historical society to operate the museum and preserve history.

There is no admission charge to see the Fulton County Museum and Round Barn Museum on the north end of the grounds. Volunteers can earn free admission to the Redbud Rendezvous by working a half day. To volunteer, call the museum at 574-223-4436. Free parking is provided on the FCHS grounds and the grounds are handicapped accessible. There are also plenty of free benches available where you can sit and rest.

Indiana Farmers Reminded About the 2009 SURE Program

Julia A. Wickard, State Executive Director for USDA's Farm Service Agency in Indiana reminds producers that the 2009 Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments Program (SURE) is underway and continues through July 29, 2011. SURE provides crop disaster assistance payments to eligible producers on farms that have incurred crop production or crop quality losses as a result of a natural disaster. This program addresses crop losses on all farming interests in all counties and states. SURE provides assistance in an amount equal to 60% of the difference between the SURE farm guarantee (expected revenue) and the actual farm revenue.

In 2009, Indiana had 29 counties that were either

declared a natural disaster by the Secretary of Agriculture, or contiguous to a declared county. Any producer who has part of his/her farming operation in one of these counties may qualify for a SURE payment, if there was a 10% production loss of one crop of economic significance. This does not guarantee a payment, because SURE is based on total farm revenue. "FSA employees are ready to serve producers with questions about the SURE Program for the 2009 crop year," said Wickard. "The 2010 crop year will be addressed later this calendar year in FSA Offices across the country."

The 29 counties include: Bartholomew, Brown, Decatur, Elkhart, Gibson, Greene, Hancock, Jackson, Jefferson, Jennings, Johnson, Knox, LaGrange, LaPorte, Lawrence, Marion, Martin, Monroe, Orange, Posey, Ripley, Rush, St.

Joseph, Scott, Shelby, Steuben, Sullivan, Vigo, and Washington.

Farmers in other counties who suffered in excess of a 50% loss and meet all other eligibility requirements may also be eligible for 2009 SURE. In addition to loss thresholds, producers must meet certain other eligibility requirements to qualify for SURE benefits. This includes the Risk Management Purchase Requirement (RMPR). The RMPR requires that a producer have crop insurance, or Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance (NAP) coverage on every crop of economic significance in every county where the producer has an interest. The deadline to make

application for benefits is July 29, 2011. For more information on SURE, visit any FSA County Office. Additional information is available online at www.fsa.usda.gov/sure.

Time to file 2011 personal property forms

Personal property returns are to be filed between March 1 and May 16. Failure to file a return by May 16, as required by law, will result in penalties. It is no longer the duty of the township trustees to assist with the filing of personal property returns. If you filed a business return (Form 103-L or 103-S) or a farm return (Form 102) last year, you will need to file the return this year at the Fulton County Assessor's office located in the Fulton County Office Building, 125 E. 9th Street, Suite 206, Rochester. You need to turn in any new equipment you have acquired or any equipment that is no longer used for your business so that it can be taken off your equipment list.

Personal property forms can be picked up at the Fulton County Assessor's office, all local libraries in the county, the Fulton County Historical Society museum and the Kewanna town hall. Forms are also available from the State website at www.in.gov/dlgf.

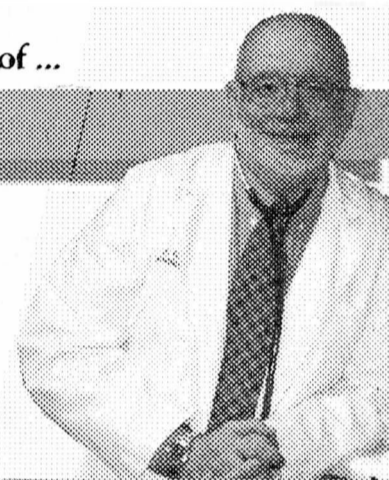
