Haley Markley, a senior at Caston, has signed with the Ancilla College women's volleyball team for the 2011 season.

Markley is a versatile athlete who can play any position on the court. She has lettered all four years at Caston under head coach Katie Williams, earning team MVP honors her junior and senior seasons.

"I am excited that Haley has chosen to join the Ancilla College volleyball family," said Ancilla head coach Lana Singleton. "She is a hard worker and loves the game."

Markley earned All-Midwest Conference honors and All-Loganland honors in her junior and senior seasons. She has led the Comets in kills in her last three seasons, finishing her career with 504 total kills to go along with 123 aces and 349 digs. She has been named to the Caston High School Hall of Fame.

In addition to her volleyball accolades, Markley was a standout softball and basketball player for Caston, earning all-conference honors in both sports.

### Rotisserie chicken for sale

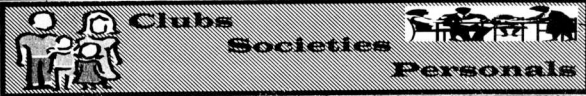
The Kewanna United Methodist Church is selling rotisserie cooked Amish chicken halves (carry-out only) to help send youth from the community to church camp this summer.

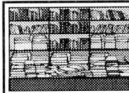

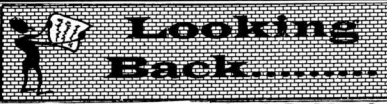

**SIXTY YEARS AGO**  
June 8, 1951

Tom Walsh lost his barn Wednesday afternoon in one of the hottest blazes the area has seen for some time. Since no one was living on the farm at the time, the fire was late in being reported. Paul Shull, fire chief, stated that he could see the flames as he was leaving town. By the time the fire truck got there, the barn was a raging inferno and the fire department could do no more than keep nearby buildings from catching fire. The Grass Creek fire truck arrived a few minutes after Kewanna's.

Kenny Smith left Sunday for Rochester, Minnesota, where he is under observation at the Mayo Clinic. It is thought that he may have to undergo back surgery with grafting from his foot. The Smiths are staying with Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Zellers who are also there for observation and possible surgery.

Adam J. Sommers was paralyzed by his waist after being kicked by a cow Memorial Day morning. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Adam Sommers, fearing a broken neck, rushed him to Memorial Hospital where x-rays were taken. As he was removed from the x-ray table, the paralysis went away. It was assumed that a nerve in his spinal column was pinched by the kick and the movement caused the pressure to let up.

Schuyler C. Overmyer, 86, died Friday night after a long illness. Services were held Sunday at the Zion Methodist Church with his grandson, Rev. Samuel Overmyer, officiating. ## Prevented planting or failed acres

With the amount of rainfall this spring and the struggle to get crops planted, area farmers need to be aware of the deadlines and rules pertaining to Prevented Planting and/or Failed Acres. If crops are prevented from being planted or have failed due to disaster related conditions, producers are encouraged to report these acres to their local Farm Service Agency office. This will help to ensure their eligibility for future FSA programs and benefits are not adversely affected.

The normal ending planting dates, respectively, for corn and soybeans are June 5 and June 20. If acreages of these crops are prevented from being planted due to adverse weather conditions, it must be reported to FSA within 15 days of the final planting date. This would be by June 20 for corn and by July 8 for soybeans. Late-filing fees would be assessed after these dates.

For failed crop acreage to be considered timely filed, the acreage must be reported to the local FSA office prior to the crop being destroyed. Producers must also be able to establish that the crop failed and was prevented from being replanted through the normal ending

planting period.

The final date to report all cropland acreage to FSA is July 15, 2011. Failure to report all crop acreage to FSA by this date directly affects the producer's eligibility for FSA program payments.
