Prevented planting or failed acres

With the amount of rainfall this spring and the struggle to get crops planted, area farmers need to be aware of the deadlines and rules pertaining to Prevented Planting and/or Failed Acres. If crops are prevented from being planted or have failed due to disaster related conditions, producers are encouraged to report these acreages to their local Farm Service Agency office. This will help to ensure their eligibility for future FSA programs and benefits are not adversely affected.

The normal ending planting dates, respectively, for corn and soybeans are June 5 and June 20. If acreages of these crops are prevented from being planted due to adverse weather conditions, it must be reported to FSA within 15 days of the final planting date. This would be by June 20 for corn and by July 5 for soybeans. Late-filing fees would be assessed after these dates

For failed crop acreage to be considered timely filed, the acreage must be reported to the local FSA office prior to the crop being destroyed. Producers must also be able to establish that the crop failed and was prevented from being replanted through the normal ending

planting period.

The final date to report all cropland acreage to FSA is July 15, 2011. Failure to report all crop acreage to FSA by this date directly affects the producer's eligibility for FSA program payments.
