



The Kewanna town council met in regular session Thursday, June 2, at the town hall with the president, Jeff Finke, presiding, Others present included council members, Dan Birge and Mark Smith; Clerk-treasurer, Jenny Kay, fire chief, Jay Cunningham; and marshal, Dennis Price. The minutes of the May meeting

The minutes of the May meeting were read and approved.

The fire chief gave the monthly fire report noting five response within the town, all medical, and six in the township, two fire and four medical. Training involved extrication. A public hearing has been set for Thursday, July 7, at 7 p.m., just prior to the regular council town meeting, concerning the fire department tanker grant. The department is currently working on a list, provided by grant writer Bob Murphy, for CFF funding of a new tanker for the department. The township has agreed to pay half of the match money and the town does not have funds available at the needed time, it will cover the remaining half and work with the town on reimbursement for its share. The on carpet in the community building as well as the EMS quarters is due for cleaning. Jay also mentioned they have noticed that the paint on the south and three-fourths of the east side of the fire station is coming off, exposing bare metal in some places. This will need attention at some point. The fire department has been informed that the Area Five meals served at the fire station will end indefinitely as the director, Alvena Mollencupp, is on sick leave and there is a lack of volunteers.

Marshal Dennis Price submitted his monthly report detailing three traffic warnings, 48 calls answered, one vehicle check and 1,292 miles patrolled. The Kewanna department was involved in tactical training and defensive knife training at the Rochester Police Department. Price was asked to contact the owner of the General Store to an up weeds, grass, debris and remove the trash barrel as well as the water from the pond which has become a breeding place for mosquitoes. Additional mowing ordinance violations will be addressed.

An ordinance regulating the placing of mobile homes in the town was repealed.

Resumes for the position of assistant superintendent were reviewed and an executive session was set for 4:30 p.m. June 15 to interview applicants. A special meeting was set for 4 m. June 27 to hire, followed by a workshop for the 2012 budget. A quote from Desabatine for tile work near the town's farm ground was approved. Work was done on a plugged tile at the sewage treatment plant farm ground. Standard Equipment delivered the used vactor truck the town recently purchased. The water works pumped a total of 1,291,600 gallons of water during May.

Claims against the town, water and sewage works were approved for payment prior to adjournment.


Rotisserie chicken for sale

Jim Berry & Sons to be honored business at power show

Fulton County Historian Jim Berry & Sons, Kewanna, will be the featured Fulton County farm implement business at the Historical Power Show on June 17-19, at the Fulton County Historical Society grounds. They will have a tent with exhibits and history of their business and Cub Cadets

Jim Berry & Sons suffered not just one big blow but two in the past couple of years. The founder, Jim Berry, died in 2009. Then last year one of his sons, David Berry, died in a freak accident at Austin, Texas, while picking up equipment at an International Truck dealership. That left two sons, Jim and Patrick Berry, along with David's widow Melanie and her and David's son Adam, to continue the business into the third Berry generation. Lois does

some secretary work also. The business was founded in 1971 by Jim and Lois Berry. It is located seven miles south of Kewanna on 950 S and 1000 W. which is only one mile north of the Fulton - Cass county line. They sell lawn and garden equipment, trailers and flat beds, and they repair trailers, trucks and tractors. Hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday - Friday, 8 -12 Saturdays

Berrys sell Cub Cadets, which is celebrating 50 years. In 1961 the makers of Farmall, International Harvester, came out with a garden tractor, the Cub Cadet. Berrys also sell Country Clipper mowers and Simplicity garden tractors, both with a zero turn radius.

The 50 year history of Cub Cadet shows that it followed the Farmall Cub, which was a small red tractor built from 1947 to 1964. Cub Cadet began as a project by International Harvester to produce a heavyduty lawn tractor. IH built a garden tractor named the Cub Cadet in 1960 International's Lawn Products Group was sold to MTD in 1981 as the subsidiary Cub Cadet Corporation. In 1985, CCC built a new factory in Brownsville, Tennessee.

In the past, Berrys sold Deutz, YanMar, Hesston tractors and

equipment and Zetor tractors. They do not sell any large farm tractors now.

Berrys originally started selling Deutz tractors, which are green Deutz's history began in 1863 when Nicolaus Otto developed and patented a gas engine in Cologne, Germany. In 1938 the name was changed to Klockner-Humboldt- Deutz, a world -wide manufacturer of diesel engines World War II destroyed threeguarters of its plants and it took quarters of its plants and it took years to rebuild. In 1989 for its 125th anniversary, Deutz was represented in 135 countries around the world and had working agreements with 25 companies in 16 countries.

The first four-wheel drive tractor that was sold by the Berry dealership was purchased back a few years ago by David. It was a Deutz

Several years ago a tractor was sold to a neighbor around Easter time. When the customer came to pick up his new tractor. Tim had purchased a plastic blow-up Easter Bunny and had it setting on the tractor. He didn't want the customer's wife to feel left out. No wonder Berrys is considered a great family business! +++++



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



Dear EarthTalk: Instances of people with thyroid problems seems to be on the rise. Is there an environmental Dora Light, connection? Waukesha, WI

The American Cancer Society reports that thyroid cancer is one of the few cancers that have been on the rise in recent decades, with cases increasing six percent annually since 1997. Many researchers, however, attribute these increases to our having simply gotten better at detection. Regardless. exposures to stress, radiation and pollutants have been known to increase a person's risk of developing thyroid problems.

Thyroid disease takes primary forms. Hyperthyroidism occurs when the thyroid produces too much of the T3 and T4 hormones that reculate metabolism. This can cause a racing heart, weight loss, insomnia and other problems. In cases of hypothyroidism, the body produces too few hormones, so we feel fatigued and may gain weight, among other symptoms. According to American the Thyroid Association (ATA), many people

thyroid problems don't with realize it, as symptoms can be mistaken for other problems or attributed to lack of sleep. Thyroid problems in children can delay or impair neurological development.

Doctors are not sure why some people are prone to thyroid disease while others aren't but genetics has much to do with it. One recent UCLA study found that genetic background accounts for about 70 percent of the risk. However, researchers have begun to find links between increased risk of thyroid disease and exposure to certain chemicals, especially among women. "Pesticide Use and Thyroid Disease among Women in the Agricultural Health Study," published in the American Journal of Epidemiology in 2002, found that Iowa and North Carolina women married to men using such pesticides as aldrin. DDT and lindane were at much higher risk of developing thyroid disease than women in non-agricultural areas. According to Dr. Whitney S. Goldner, lead researcher on the study, 12.5 percent of the 16,500 wives evaluated developed thyroid disease compared to between one and eight percent in the general population

It's not just farm women who should worry. Trace amounts of chemical pesticides and fertilizers most certainly end up in some of the food we eat. The nonprofit group Beyond Pesticides warns that some 60

percent of pesticides used today have been shown to affect the thyroid gland's production of and T4 hormones. Commercially available insecticides and fungicides have also heen implicated.

Likewise, some chemicals used in plastics and flame retardants contain toxins shown to trigger thyroid problems in those genetically predisposed. And a 2007 study at the University of Texas Health Sciences Center at San Antonio found that triclosan, an antibacterial agent found in everything from hand soaps to facial tissues to toys-it's present in the bloodstreams of three out of every four Americans-could be causing some mothers' thyroid glands to send signals to fetuses that may in turn contribute to autism.




