Trail of Courage, Sept. 17-18

Over 175 years off the calendar and celebrate the early 1800s at the 36th annual Trail of Courage Living History Festival September 17 and 18 at Rochester. It's a place where history comes alive, where you can trace the very footsteps of history and have a good time doing it.

The primary purpose of the Trail of Courage is to educate the public, to preserve and promote an accurate picture of life in frontier Indiana, as well as other areas and time periods of North American history, including the French and Indian War, voyageurs, Revolutionary War, War of 1812, Woodlands and Plains Indians, Western Fur Trade and Frontier Indiana. The festival is based on local history, when it was still Potawatomi Territory, before the Potawatomi Indians were marched west on the forced removal known as the Trail of Death. Since 1976, this festival has honored the American Indians and shown life before the removal.

Frontier Indiana comes to life with foods cooked over wood fires, period music and dance, traditional crafts, historic canoes and trading, canoe rides on the river, and much more. It is produced by the Fulton County Historical Society. This event combines genealogy of the Potawatomi Indians and the settlers who lived in Fulton County and northern Indiana in the early 1800s with the rendezvous events, stage programs, the historic canoe landing and fur trade skit on the Tippecanoe River.

The Trail of Courage will be held at the FCS grounds, four miles north of Rochester on U.S. 31. Admission is \$6 for adults, \$2 for children (ages 6-11) and free for those age five and under. Hours are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday.

Hundreds of motorcycles will gather starting at 8 a.m., leave the fairgrounds at 12 noon sharp and travel through various parts of South Bend as well as North Liberty and Walkerton. The ride route is approximately 46 miles. The "parade of bikes" will return to the fairgrounds for an afternoon of food, fun and entertainment.

For non-riders, the gates at the fairgrounds will open at 2:30 p.m. The event is open to all ages. Admission is a minimum of \$35 and there are no advance ticket sales.

The event benefits the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA) which is a local and national agency seeking treatments and cures for 40 neuromuscular diseases. Along with research, MDA also provides program services at no charge to the patients and families. 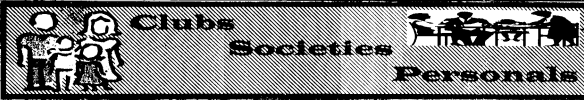

How did you do? These shows were from the 1970s and 1980s, so your memories go back 30 or 40 years. Recalling a complete set of lyrics from decades ago is remarkable (not to mention a little embarrassing). I may not remember the periodic symbol for gold, but I admit - somewhat unwillingly - these tunes still feel fresh on my brain.

Perhaps there's more than a good melody and catchy beat that has me looking back at the era - with a rosy sense of nostalgia. Archie and Edith had a point about the good old days. Television in the '70s and '80s was a period filled with strong family ties, when our fields were lush with green acres, all days were happy days with hardly any dark shadows. Back then, reality TV consisted of Ed Sullivan and Lawrence Welk and we didn't think it at all odd, boring or even gong-worthy to watch middle-aged couples waltz to big band champagne music on a black and white screen.

As a kid, my Saturday evenings were reserved for one show: Carol Burnett. So, I'll use her words to end my reminiscing: "I'm so glad we had this time

together. To have a laugh or sing a song. Seems we just get started and before you know it, comes the time we have to say, 'So long...'

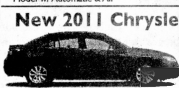

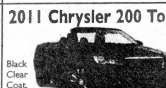
