
The real challenges of '66 were questions, such as: What? Where? When? Who? Why? How?



Economic benefits stem from the use of modern business. Designed to prepare students for the business world, commercial courses presented the fundamentals of organization practices.




Biology and Chemistry Encourage Young Scientists.


Shop Work Produces Skilled Laborers, Craftsmen.



Regular math courses include problems once reserved for exceptional students. The scope of classes encompassed Algebra I through college algebra, geometry through trigonometry, and commercial math.






*Social Studies Form the Bridge Between

There were many thrilling games through the summer and fall such as coming from behind in the bottom of the seventh inning to nip Francesville and remain unbeaten, beating Pioneer for the first time in K.H.S. history, upending arch-rival Caston for the Tri-County championship, and the tense pitchers' dual between Talbott and Schwenk of 0-D, when the Indians defeated the Bobcats 5-4 in fourteen innings.
