Caston students return to classes, August 18

The 2010-2011 school year begins Wednesday, August 18 for all students, K-12, attending the Caston Corporation Schools. Classes for elementary students begin at 8:30 a.m. and end at 3:17 p.m. Junior-senior high classes begin at 8:28 a.m. and end at 3:20 p.m.

All corporation buses will run on Wednesday, August 18. Drivers plan their routes to arrive at school by 8:25 a.m.

Students enrolling in kindergarten must be five (5) years old and students enrolling in the first grade must be six (6) years old on or before August 1, 2010. Parents need to provide certification from a physician that their child has been properly immunized and they also need to present a valid birth certificate if these have not previously been provided to the school. Effective July 1, 1999, the immunization list must also include hepatitis B.

Students in grades K-6 who are new students or did not enroll by mail may do so at the Caston Elementary office beginning Monday, August 9, through Wednesday, August 11. Hours are the same as listed below for the junior-senior high school enrollment.

Students in grades seven (7) through twelve (12) will enroll at the Guidance Office on the following schedule:

Monday, August 9 - all students (including new students), 9 to 11:30 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m.

Tuesday, August 10 - all students, 12:01 to 3:30 p.m. and 5 to 6:45 p.m.

Wednesday, August 11 - all students, 9 to 11:30 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m.

Seventh grade orientation will be held at 7 p.m. Tuesday, August 10, in the cafeteria.

Book rental fees will be: kindergarten, \$70; Grade 1, \$100; Grade 2, \$100; Grade 3, \$105; Grade 4, \$105; Grade 5, \$100; Grade 6, \$122; and Grades 7 and 8, \$120. Fees for grades 9-12 vary depending on classes taken. Rental fees are to be paid prior to the first day of school.

All students are to pay fees at the Bookstore beginning Monday, August 9, through Wednesday, August 11. The hours are 9 to 11:30 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m. on Monday and Wednesday and 12:01 to 3 p.m. and 5 to 6:45 p.m. Tuesday.

Lunches will be served beginning Wednesday, August 18. For students in grades K-6, the cost is \$1.70 per meal; students in grades 7-12 will pay \$1.85 per meal. Adults will pay \$2.50. Breakfast is served each morning for students who choose to participate. The cost is \$1.25 per meal for students and \$1.50 for adults. Each student will establish a renewable lunch account for meal fees. Meal fees may be credited to the student account weekly, monthly, six or nine week, semi-annual or annual payments. Some students may be eligible for free or reduced lunch fees. Applications for this assistance are mailed with schedules, book rent mailings or will be available in the book-

Students attending special education and vocational education (Century Career Center) will begin Monday, August 16. Beginning Monday, August 16, special education students will be picked up at and returned to their homes by the special education bus. They will be transported directly to Logansport to arrive there at approximately 8 a.m. Century Career Center students will attend classes at Caston in the morning and will then be transported to Logansport after lunch. They will be transported back to Caston at approximately 3:15. Special Ed pre-school students will begin school at North Miami on Tuesday, August 17. Students attending school at North Miami will be picked up and returned to their homes by the special education pre-school bus. Fees for Century Career Center and special education students attending Logansport schools and special education pre-school students attending North Miami are payable to the respective schools they attend.

The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 restricts the release of most information about students and restricts the availability of student records. Only directory information may be made public with parental consent. Directory information includes student names, parent's names, addresses and telephone numbers. If you do not want such information released, please request this by notifying the respective principals. By Indiana statute, Armed Forces recruiting representatives are allowed access to directory information.

Friday, August 13, Monday, August 16 and Tuesday, August 17, are Caston Professional Development days (no students). Monday, August 16, is the first day of school for students attending Logansport Century Career Center and Logansport Special Education classes. Tuesday, August 17, is the first day of school for Special Education Pre-school students attending North Miami. Wednesday, August 18, is the first day of school for students attending Caston.

Should the school corporation find it necessary to delay school or dismiss early, the official radio stations for notification are Rochester WROI 92.1, Logansport WSAL 102.3 or Logansport Hoosier Country 103.7.

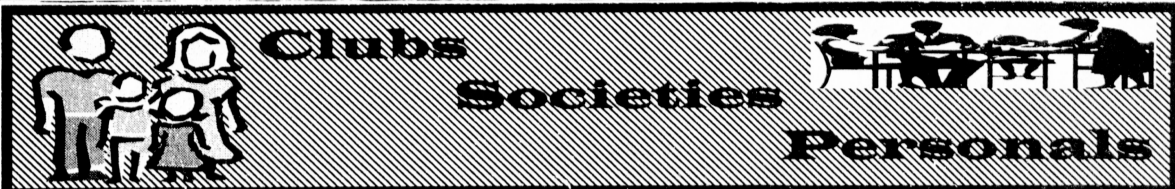

Participants must meet income and county of residence guidelines.

In a new study of more than 2,000 low-income unemployed workers age 55 and older, 46 percent need to find jobs so they don't lose their homes or apartments, and approximately half (49%) have been looking for work for more than a year. In July 2009, there were two million unemployed workers age 55 plus; the unemployment rate for this age group was the highest since the Bureau of Labor Statistics began tabulating data by age in 1948.

"Between the tough economy, increased competition for jobs, and age-related employment barriers - there is a real crisis for America's older low-income workers," says Peggy Pachowiak, Employment and Training Coordinator for Experience Works based in LaPorte. Immunizations available at Health Department

The Fulton County Health Department offers an immunization clinic every Wednesday from 8 to 11:30 a.m. and 2-5 p.m. The fourth Wednesday of every month clinic hours are extended to 6 p.m. Parents are urged to beat the school rush and take their children to the clinic early to receive their school immunizations.

Children entering kindergarten in the 2010-2011 school year will need to be immunized before attending school. Students entering the 6th through 12th grade and first year college students are required additional immunizations as well.

In addition to the previously required immunizations, students entering pre-school or kindergarten (4-6 years old)

must have two documented varicella vaccines, separated by at least three months, or written documentation that they have had the disease (chicken pox).

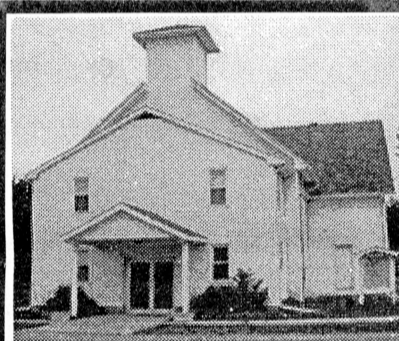
Students entering 6th through 12th grade and first year college students must have one DTap vaccine (Diphtheria, Tetanus, Acellular Pertussis); one meningitis vaccine (MCV4); two varicella vaccines (chicken pox) or documentation of the disease.

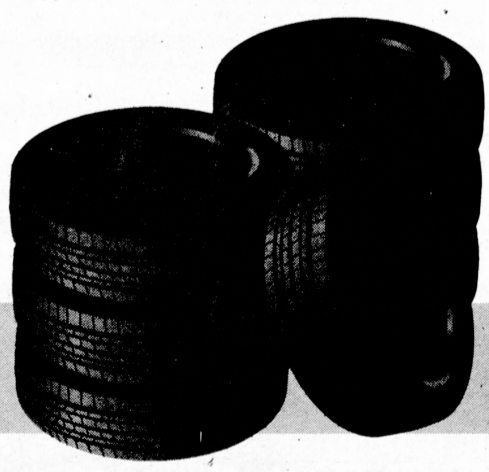

Looking Back

SIXTY YEARS AGO August 4, 1950

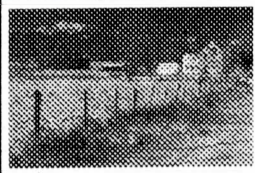
