Local resident publishes book

Don Kegarise, Kewanna, can now count being a published author among his other artistic talents

book. Where Have You Been? No Where, What Have You Been Doing? Nothing, is a compilation of 17 short stories centered on his growing up years in western Pennsylvania. He vividly describes how it was to grow up in a world without belts, televisions computers, video games and cell phones and how the lessons learned early on favorably impacted his adult life.

Don, who was the 10th of 12 children born to his parents, tells how his family survived the recession, the market crash of 1929 and eventually The 1929 and eventually The Depression of the 1930s in his initial stories.

He goes on to relate many boyhood memories and adventures shared with his boyhood siblings and friends. He credits a immigrant lake. with Polich instilling many positive qualities in him that would aid him in later life. Readers who are golfers will enjoy his account of his introduction to the game of golf. The book turns your thoughts to your own childhood, recalling special times, places and people.

Don took a creative writing class in 2008 under the able instruction of Margaret Steinacker. This class inspired him to start writing again. Don finished writing his book in December of last year. He, along with his wife Kathy, then began the task of editing and fine tuning his work, much of it done while commuting 6,000 miles for nearly two months to Fort Wa for Don's radiation treatments

Don will talk about his book Wednesday, October 20, at 7 p.m. at the Starke County Public Library, 152 W. Culver Road Knox. There will also be a book reading at 6 p.m. Tuesday, October 26, at the Kewanna-Union Township Public Library.

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
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HOW KEWANNA GOT

[Fifth Installment] by Bromley Smith

The proof that the legal name of the town was "Pleasant Grove," although the postoffice was Kewanna, comes from abstracts of deeds, from Township Boad Books and from the Docket Book of Benneville Stamm, Justice of the Peace. From two abstracts, possessed by Oscar Enveart Luther Shoemaker, is the citation that on June 24 1847 President John Tyler signed a deed for Eli Troutman's addition to the town of Pleasant Grove. Over against that entry is an abstract in John Parker's deed, as follows: United States to John P. Tygert, dated September 2, 1847, for Lot 346 on the south side addition to the town of Kewanna. Further transfers in Parker's deed state that the lot was in Pleasant Grove. How could a lot be in two places at the same time? The only reasonable explanation is, that some one inadvertently substituted the post office name of Kewanna for the platted name of Pleasant Grove. There is a Warranty Deed dated January 1, 1874, which contains both names in one entry: In the town of Kewanna, formerly known as the town of Pleasant Grove". For additional evidence one may open the Deed Books on file in Rochester.

right here we turn to the librar which fortunately possesses a Road Rook of Union Township in the handwriting of Benneville Stamm, a former Road Commissioner. A petition dated February 16, 1855, prayed for a change in the state road from Perrysburg, Miami Co., to Pleasant Grove. On April 11. 1857, an item reads: "Intersection of the State Road from Pleasant Grove to Mauler's Ford". May 2, 1857, "Beginning in the Public Road from Pleasant Grove leading to Bruces's Lake." Dec. 14, 1863, "To intersect the Winamac and Pleasant Grove Road." The last item in the book, dated April 16, 1870, reads: That Elizabeth Williams be paid six dollars for a town lot in Pleasant Grove for a site to build a school house." Some research by a student of local education might locate that six dollar plot. At no entry in the Raod Book does the word "Kewanna" appear.

when he was a Justice of the Peace, there is considerable confusion. For instance in May and December, 1850, Stamm writes that suits were brought from "Pleasant . He used a small "g". But in April, 1853, he used "Pleasant Grove" with a capital "G". Then. as the years went by , he grew careless, for suits came from 'Grove'' in 1855, 1856, and 1857. That is, he whittled off the "Pleasant" part, just as people do now when they speak of going to "Logan", omitting the "sport", as useless or time consuming. Once or twice the pen of the Justice slipped, for suits came from "Keewana, la., (Feb. and Oct. 1851). The Book gives the details of suits brought from Aubbeenaub-

Fulton, Logansport, Union hee Townwship. Rochester, Fulton County, and Lake. It is clear that of the defendants and plaintiffs did not know exactly where they lived. In this account the names of persons who heat-up their wives and did not redeem their notes for \$2.50 have been omitted, thereby preventing suits for libel by living descendants. The main problem has been the documentary proof that the town of "Pleasant Grove" once existed.

Daisy's tale

Try to stop a Labrador retriever's tail from wagging. It isn't easy.

This became our mission after our lab, Daisy, seriously injured her tail. Can you imagine a without Labrador envisioning simultaneous

wagging? Me neither. those of you not familiar with a Labrador, wagging is akin to breathing. Labs wag incessantly. They thump their tails against end tables, walls, windows and expensive glass vases filled with flowers. They wag against soft couches and corners. They wagalicious, wagaholic and

wagariffic. To wag is to Labrador. The action is as ingrained in their blood as retrieving. (Perhaps they should be called Waglador retrievers?)

Daisy's tail has seen its share of misfortune during her seven (human) years of existence. The worst, up until now, involved slamming it in the door of our minivan. Daisy lucked out that time (although I'm sure she would beg to differ). The slam left the tail bent, but not broken. It has succumbed twice to the

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
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
