## The News In Brief

The Republican Party took control of the U.S. House of Representatives in Tuesday's election, but the Senate remains Democratic by a narrow margin. In House District 2, the incumbent Joe Donnelly narrowly defeated his challenger Jackie Wallorski, with the results going down to the wire.

Fulton County had only two contested races in Tuesday's election. Both races were won by Republicans. Incumbent Mark Rodriguez defeated Donald Cook, 3.899 to 2,166, to keep his seat on the Board of County Commissioners. Incumbent Don Towne will remain in the county surveyor's office, defeating Terry Weiss, 3,892 to 2,188

Republican Dan Coats was elected to the fill the Senate seat held by Democrat Evan Bayh who did not seek re-election. Coats outpolled his opponent Rep. Brad Ellsworth by a large margin.

Republicans also took state offices Tuesday including Secretary of State, Auditor of State and Treasurer of State.

Democrat Bill Reutebuch again lost his bid for State Representative from District 16 to the incumbent Douglas Gutwein. The two also faced off in the 2008 election.

All Fulton County government offices will be closed Thursday, November 11, in observance of Veterans Day.

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


