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### KEWANNA TOWN COUNCIL

The Kewanna town council met in regular session Thursday, November 4, at the town flall with the president, Jeff Finke, presiding, Others presid included town council members, Dan Birge and Mark Smith, Clerk-treasurer, Jenny Kay; town marshal, Dennis Price; and town superintendent, Mike Molitor.

Molitor submitted his report, noting that he Had been contacted by the USDA for an annual review and was informed they would allow the council to decide whether a ladder guard is needed on the water tower ladder. At this time, the council decided to wait until it becomes a requirement.

The superintendent's monthly report noted that E&B Paving has finished resurfacing the streets and Geiger is making repairs to the roadsides. The crop at the sewage treatment plant has been harvested. Problems were encountered while trying to lower the water level in the lagoons to provide winter storage room. The end-gun on the irrigator had to be pulled and cleaned. There was a leak in the riser pipe coming out of the ground to the center pivot. The pipe had to be replaced. The irrigator then begin shutting down due to cold temperatures. It was determined that there were loose wires in the probe-The irrigator then began shutting down due to low pressure. The contact tank was pumped down because weeds getting around the pump head. After all repairs were made, pumping was completed for the season and the irrigator shut down for the winter. The leaf machine was made ready for pick-up of leaves. Meetings were held with ISO and USDA ISO went through all of the paper work and flushed a couple of fire hydrants. Town employees will try to flush all hydrants yet this year before it gets too cold. The USDA also went through all the paper work for the water works. The only thing they requested was that a ladder cover be installed on the water tower Repairs were made to the lift station servicing the Joe Hott residence. Unused quipment at the sewage treatment plant was sold. The two east bays at the town garage were cleaned out so work could begin on the concrete to allow the ambulance to fit in the east bay. The water pumped a total of 1,135,300 gallons of water during October.

Marshal Price submitted his report, noting that he and deputies Winter and Sailors have some state mandates to finish. The location of classes may change after the first of the year. The monthly report revealed four traffic warmings, two accident reports, 42 calls answered and 1,731 miles participated in a range day at the Sandbar Gun Ranch on

The council decided to not purchase a new pickup truck to replace the red truck that was recently damaged in an accident. Instead, the town will purchase the truck back at the salvage value and keep it as an "in town" truck only, if in fact it

can be repaired.

cut it down.

Claims against the town, water and sewage works were okayed for payment prior to adjournment.

### Failed acreage reporting

Area farmers are reminded of the rules pertaining to failed crop acres. A report of failed acres, due to natural disaster conditions, must be filed with the FSA county committee before disposition of the crop and producers must be able to establish that the crop failed and was prevented from being replanted through the normal planting period.

Form CCC-976, Notice of Loss,

Form CCC-976, Notice of Loss, is used to report failed acreage and may be completed by any producer with an interest in the crop. Timely filing a Notice of Loss is required for all crops including grasses. The Notice of Loss must be filed in the FSA office within 15 days of the occurrence of the disaster or when losses become apparent.

### IURC APPROVES NIPSCO NATURAL GAS RATE SETTLEMENT

Ruling results in overall rate decrease

The Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission (IURC) approved a settlement agreement reached by Northern Indiana Public Service Company (NIPSCO), the Indiana Office of Utility Consumer Counselor (OUCC) and other key customer stakeholders to resolve NIPSCO's pending natural gas rate case. The settlement - filed on Aug. 24 – was also signed and agreed upon by the NIPSCO Industrial Group, the NIPSCO Marketer Group and Citizens Action Coalition of Indiana.

The settlement slightly decreases overall rates for all NIPSCO natural gas customer while providing classes while providing continued strong support for low-income customer assistance, energy efficiency onservation programs.

The newly approved gas base ates should be implemented in the November billing cycle and will be reflected in the gas delivery portion of customer bills.
