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Ground broken for library addition

Ground was broken for an addition to the local library Tuesday afternoon. Clem Good, a former library board president, is shown removing a shovel full of dirt here as Rich Hoff, library board member, Jeff Finke, Kewanna town council president, and Harry Mohler, architect, look on.

Prior to the ground breaking, Mark Brown of Leo Brown Construction of Logansport, contractor for the new addition, addressed those assembled. He presented a time line for construction of the addition, which will begin as soon as the razing of the former doctor's building to the west of the library is complete. This work should be done by the end of this week.

The basement of the doctor's building will be filled in and then foundation work can begin. "Stake-walk superintendents" can then begin to see progress as structural steel is put in place for the addition and steel studs are installed to connect the new with the old. Progress will depend on the severity of the winter weather.

Architect Harry Mohler noted that the nearly 4,000 square-foot addition will double the size of the present library. The entrance to the library will ultimately be in the new addition.

Larry Cunningham, who recently served as interim library director, commented that this is the most exciting thing that will happen in Kewanna in the next 50 years. Former library board member/president Clem Good commented that when he served they felt good when 15 patrons visited the library in one day. According to the new director, Nicholas Hughes, the library sees as many as 60 patrons some days. Cunningham predicts that the new addition could double or triple that number. Town council president Jeff Finke also offered comments noting that the library board is to be commended for all its hard work in securing the library addition. Library director Nicholas Hughes offered comments, much of which can be seen in his weekly column.

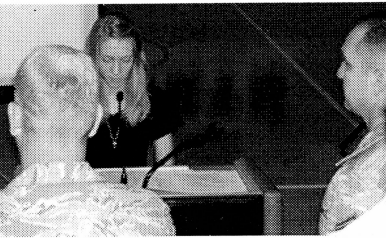

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Kara's Comments

Kara Smith

Early Saturday morning, November 13, my brother and I (accompanied by our parents) prepared to set off for the Nike cross country regionals in Terre Haute. My brother, Zach, was on a team with Justin, and Seth Cousins and Andrew Smith. Me, I was alone. We slept on the car ride there, stopping at Cracker Barrel for lunch. By the time we got to our destination, it was raining. Zach and I went to the cross country course to see where to get our race packets. We were also checking to see if Amy Yoder-Begley had arrived yet.

After we realized we had a lot of time to kill, we went to Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology where Zach hopes to attend college. It was still raining, but we walked around campus for a few. Who knew they are called the "Fighting Engineers" and their mascot is an elephant?!

We checked into our hotel and took naps, waiting to go to the pre-race party at the Terre Haute Children's Museum. We were the first to arrive so we secured our first place in line. We were not planning to eat the pasta supper they offered, but we had enough tidbits to keep us fortified since the rest of the boys on the team did not come to this event. By ten minutes until six, the line had grown into a huge crowd. When they finally unlocked the door, people pushed and shoved their way in to secure or buy their tickets.

On the first floor of the museum there were huge rows of tables and chairs with ruby red tablecloths. The beginning of the food line offered plates and breadsticks. The other held massive pasta and salad bowls. These bowls were so huge, I'm sure you can't purchase them at any kitchen store I've been to! On the second floor, there was another food line, a live DJ, flashing lights and everything. I was having fun just walking around and looking. The third floor included Wu games and ping pong. There were also shirts for sale - we got one of each.

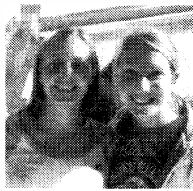
The packet pickup was like an assembly line. You got your packet with your bib number, course map, rules, Eastbay catalogs and a bag - I am not sure if the bag was to put the free stuff in or, was it a puke bag? We also received rubber bracelets proclaiming "Cross Country Town" on them.
Next was amazing - I got to meet Amy Yoder-Begley! She is the X2 cross country USA champ in the 10K (6.2 miles). She signed my copy of *Running Times* - which features her on the cover. I got my picture taken with her - it was amazing to meet an elite cross country runner who is originally from Indiana.

We then left the pre-race party as the loud music was getting to mom. (But, I was having a blast.) Afterwards, we decided to get pizza since we didn't eat pasta. As dad and Zach left to fetch dinner, I accompanied mom to the pool where we talked about the race plan for Sunday. This was after I looked at the course map and found out I had to jump over hay bales during the race. When the pizza came, we ate, watched TV and I read until I was tired enough to sleep.

Early Sunday morning (well, not too early because I slept in), we went down stairs to the hotel lobby for breakfast. There was a team of boys down there eating after their morning run. We packed our stuff and headed out to the course to work on jumping hay bales and to get to know the whole course. Thankfully, it was not raining. It was just brisk. Since we were the first ones there, we were unsure where to park. As soon as we understood the course, we were on our way. Zach and I were pumped and energized. We jogged and walked the course. I also learned how to jump the hay bales - at least they told us where they were placed. Down in the valley it was steamy hot to us because we had so many clothes on. After the course tour, we went to the pre-race tents. They had some heated stretching tents and a retail tent. With our race packets we received the night before, we got "sweet" hats that are orange and brown with the Nike (National) and cross country emblems on the sides. The pre-race tents had free shoe strings in neon colors and colored track replacement spikes. My race was scheduled to start at noon and I was warmed up and ready to run by 11:54 a.m. Mom and I went down to the start line and found out that they combined the girls open (my race) and the girls champion race. So that meant the boys open was first. I ran back to tell the boys they only had 45 minutes to get ready and warm up. They were all flustered and panicky. I went and sat in the warm car. They got their time chips on their shoes and bibs pinned on and went to warm up at the start line. I watched their race and mentally prepared myself for my race. That is what I need to do

more. I was in line with other girls, one being Cara Love from Westfield and she was nervous, too, this being her first Nike race also. The third girl didn't show up, but the team next to us took half our lane. Then the race began with fireworks. We were off on our 3.1 mile journey. I have to admit, running with all these girls who have probably made it out of sectionals made me feel honored and a bit out of place. The start was fast and I felt pretty good - got through the IK mark and the first jump, but knowing I was getting tired, I was afraid of this. My first mile was 7:00 flat. Right on pace for me, but it seemed to go down hill from there. The second set of hay bales (there were three in each set) were good - I tried to rotate my jumping legs, right, left, right. After every set of jumps, my running rhythm got more undone and messed up. By the time I reached the halfway point, I was tired and I knew I wasn't running good, I was shutting. I was embarrassed and a bit ashamed, but that is how I run. Many of the others work with great runners, some of the best. Another hay bale jump. At that point, the jumps were just in the way. I used everything I had to jump. Then came a hill, but it was a slight incline. The last hay bale jump was placed on a curve and an incline. I couldn't tell you how many stutter steps I took before jumping the first bale in

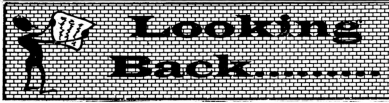

are mud-laden and I take pity on them by going to the laundry and throwing in a load of orange. They are exhilarated and tired. Spent, but happy.

We girls return from our hunt with the essence of Caesar salad pits wrap on our brows and eau de free perfume samples on our wrists. We are laden with shopping bags and the boys take pity on us by carrying them into the house. We are exhilarated and tired. Our money is spent, but we are happy.

Later, we will exchange hunting stories over Kit Kats and Reese's Peanut Butter Cups left over from Halloween. Since our expeditions are once-a-year events, we always have tales to tell - and next year to look forward to. Our men will wear orange; we will not (unless it is the trendy fashion color of the season).

It is a fair and just world, this separate but equal hunting thing. At my house, every one is happy (well, except the deer).

- Developing a fair redistricting plan.
