Lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer deaths in the United States, among both men and women. Lung cancer claims more lives each year than colon prostate, ovarian, lymph and

breast cancers combined.

People who smoke have the greatest risk of lung cancer. The risk of lung cancer increases with the length of time and number of cigarettes smoked. If you quit smoking, even after smoking for many years, you can significantly reduce your chances of developing lung Lung cancer typically doesn't cause signs and symptoms in its earliest stages. Sig symptoms of lung Signs and typically occur only when the

disease is advanced. Signs and symptoms of lung cancer may include:

If you smoke and want to stop in order to reduce your risk of lung cancer, make an appointment with your healthcare provider. They can recommend strategies for quitting, such as counseling, and nicotine medications replacement products.

Smoking. Smoking remains the greatest risk factor for lung cancer. Your risk of lung cancer increases with the number of cigarettes you smoke each day and the

number of vears you have smoked. Quitting at any age can significantly lower your of developing lung cancer.

Exposure secondhand smoke. Even if you don't smoke, your risk of lung cancer increases if you're exposed to secondhand smoke

Exposure to radon gas. Radon is produced by the natural breakdown of uranium in soil, rock and water that eventually becomes part of the air you breathe. Unsafe levels of radon can accumulate in any building, including homes, testing can d s. Radon determine testing can dete whether levels are safe.

Exposure to asbestos other chemicals. and Workplace exposure asbestos and other substances known to cause cancer - such as arsenic. chromium, nickel and tar also can increase your risk of developing lung cancer, especially if you're a smoker. Family history of lung

cancer. People with a parent, sibling or other first-degree relative with lung cancer have an increased risk of the

Excessive alcohol use.

Drinking more than a moderate amount of alcohol no more than one drink a day for women or two drinks a day for men --- may increase your risk of lung cancer.

MOTORISTS **ENCOURAGED TO** PREPARE VEHICLES FOR WINTER DRIVING

With snow flurries back in the Indiana forecast for the first time this year, public safety officials are reminding Hoosier motorists of a few tips to help get ready for the coming winter.

The Indiana Department of Homeland Security (IDHS), Indiana Department of (INDOT) and Transportation

Indiana State Police (ISP) affirm that all Hoosier motorists need to prepare vehicles in preparation difficult winter conditions.

Drivers are encouraged to follow these tips to winterize vehicles:

- Check tire pressure and tread depth. Use a pressure gauge and measure tire tread depth to ensure good traction. Consult your owner's manual for advice. Look for uneven wearing which can also
- be dangerous. Check battery, exhaust system, heater and defroster. Make sure the battery is not past its lifespan, and that the terminals are tight and free of corrosion. Hoses and belts should be inspected for cracks. Now is the time to discover if your heater is broken - not when the temperature drops.
- Check antifreeze. Make sure that a 50 percent antifreeze, 50 percent water mixture is at the proper radiator level. If the coolant is two years old, get it flushed and refilled.
- Change oil every 3,000-5,000 miles. Consider using a lighter, "winter weight" oil. Refer to your owner's manual for midance
- Check windshield and blades: the blades Replace twice a year and make sure extra wiper fluid is on hand.
- Ensure the four-wheel drive system and brakes are functioning properly.
- It is a good idea to keep at least a half tank of gas in your car at all times during months, to keep the fuel lines from freezing.

Even with the best maintenance and cautious driving, snow, ice and freezing temperatures can sometimes still get the best of your vehicle. Hazardous winter driving conditions crashes, which are the leading cause of death during winter storms. Being prepared to handle potential slide-offs,

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crashes, and car trouble in winter is a simple but crucial step to take in preparing for the next few months.

Prepare a winter emergency kit for your vehicle. Supplies should include:

- ät laget turo blankate or a sleeping bag
 - Flashlight or battery-powered lantern and extra batteries
 - Booster (jumper) cables
 - Emergency flares Extra clothing particularly boots, hats and mittens
 - A steel shovel and rope to use as a lifeline
 - Bottled water or inice nonperishable high-energy foods (granola bars, raisins, nuts, peanut butter or cheese crackers)
 - Thermos or container that won't allow liquids to freeze
 - First-aid necessary medications
 - Sand or non-clumping cat litter for tire traction if your vehicle gets stuck in snow or ice
 - A cell phone cnarger which can be adapted to vehicle use
 - Ice scraper and snow hrush Tire repair kit and
 - Candle, matches, heat
 - sticks/packs, lighters, hand-warmers, etc. (Be sure to crack the window if you using a heat source inside the vehicle)

NIPSCO FILES NEW FLECTRIC RATE CASE

Filing Cuts Increase to Residential Bills from First Electric Case in Half

Northern Indiana Public Service Co. (NIPSCO) filed a new electric rate case with the Indiana Utility Regulatory electric rate case with the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission (IURC) that, if approved, would lessen bill impacts on residential customers and address a number concerns by expressed regarding the customers company's currently pending electric rate increase.

The newly-filed rates would replace any existing electric rates, and they would not be in addition to the increase authorized in August – which has not yet been applied to bills.

"We have listened to our customers and regulatory stakeholders and developed a new rate plan that eases the burden on residential customers while allowing NIPSCO while allowing NIPSCO to continue investing in service, reliability and infrastructure improvements," NIPSCO CEO Jimmy Staton said. "We believe this is a positive solution for our customers, our community partners and for northern Indiana's long-term economic growth and development."

Under the new electric rate filing, residential electric bills

would increase by an \$5.94 per month, or 7.9 percent when compared with 2010 bills. If approved this bill increase would be less than the amount authorized in the company's 2008 rate case order received August.

The new rate filing uses NIPSCO's existing electric rates a starting point, not the rates authorized in its recent rate case order. NIPSCO has asked that its new rate filing be considered implemented under accelerated review procedure that could result in the new rates being implemented in 2011

Staton emphasized that NIPSCO continues to be involved in constructive discussions with kev stakeholders regarding all matters, and noted that settlement could be reached that
