

People know Lulu as the most requested female cast member of the long-running television series, *Hee Haw.* Many know her as the accomplished and celebrated songwriter, and as the singer who has been successfully making records for 25 years.

Few know that Lulu was born with a thyroid dysfunction in a home for unwed mothers and quickly placed in an orphanage. It was there that her weight problems furthered her pain, preventing her adoption and making her the center of teasing by the other children. It was also during this time that Lulu learned to use her sense of humor as a defense.

That sense of humor later evolved into a highly successful career as an actress and comedienne with a lead role on *Hee Haw*. Success and wealth, however, proved poisonous to the actress who began her career in

her early twenties. Drug addiction led Lulu on a downward spiral that nearly destroyed her life and her career in 1971.

Lulu's search for happiness and acceptance, which had almost led to her personal destruction, instead, led her to God. It was her new-found faith in God that led her to begin using a talent that had been lying dormant for many years, her voice.

In 1999, Lulu was inducted into the Country Gospel Music Hall of Fame. In 2002, Lulu's 16th album, a collection of hits and favorites called *Lulu Inspired*, was nominated for Dove award. Her newest project is the highly anticipated *Orphan Girl*, which Lulu says is "the album I am most proud of in my entire career."

Lulu now tours the United States singing and sharing her testimony as well as her unpredictable sense of humor. She is an accomplished author having written her own autobiography in the late 70s and the new "Kitchen Komforts" cookbook. The cookbook includes delicious recipes, stories about her life and numerous personal photographs.

Lulu will make you laugh, cry, examine your life and she will share with you some great gospel music.

A Woman's Guide to High Blood Pressure

High blood pressure, or hypertension, puts added strain against artery walls, making blood flow difficult, and causing the heart to work harder than usual. Consequences of high blood pressure are severe and include heart attack, stroke, or heart failure.


Blood pressure tends to increase with age. Studies show that more than half of all post-menopausal women over age 60 have high blood pressure. In addition, even women who have never had high blood pressure may develop it during pregnancy, especially in the last three months. If you tend to run an elevated blood pressure, it is important to have it checked regularly.

All women can and should take steps to control their high blood pressure. Some of the ways to help control your blood pressure include: achieving and maintaining a healthy weight; increasing physical activity; choosing healthy foods, lower in sodium; avoiding smoking; and limiting alcohol intake.

For some, lifestyle changes are enough to lower high blood pressure. For others, especially those with heart disease, medication may also be needed. If you have high blood pressure, your physician can help determine the best treatment.

Rep. Gutwein Supports **Expansion of Tuition Exemption for Purple Heart Recipients**

All Indiana Purple recipients would be eligible for tuition and fee exemptions at state educational institutions if a bill passed unanimously today by the Indiana House of Representatives gains final approval by Gov. Mitch Daniels.

Rep. Doug Gutwein (R-Francesville) co-sponsored the in the House Representatives.

Last year, the Indiana General Assembly created a law allowing Purple Heart recipients who served on active duty after Sept. 10, 2001, to apply for the tuition and fee exemption. Senate Bill 39 will expand those eligible for the exemption to include all veterans who have received a Purple Heart. The exemption has been available to the children of these veterans for many years, and they will retain eligibility under Senate Bill 39.

"It's a privilege to support legislation that helps our veterans," said Rep. Gutwein. "As a veteran that had the privilege of serving alongside many Purple Heart recipients, I know full well how great the sacrifice they've made for our country really is. This is the least we can do to show our gratitude."

If Gov. Daniels signs the bill into law, it will become effective July 1, 2009.

Personal property returns due May 15

It is no longer the duty of the township trustee to assist with the filing of personal property returns and they will not be mailing the personal property returns as they have in the past. If you filed a business return (Form 103-L or 103-S) or a farm return (Form 102) last year, you will need to file the return this year at the Fulton County Assessor's Office located in the Fulton County Office Building, 125 E. 9th St., Suite 026, Rochester, or your accountant can file the return for you. It is no longer required by the state for individual returns (Form 101-S) to be filed which campers, includes ATVs, snowmobiles and human powered boats. Inventory (chickens, turkeys, ducks, livestock, grain, seed supplies, etc. or tangible personal property) is no longer required to be turned in on your farm or business return. You still need to turn in any new equipment you have acquired or any equipment that you no longer use for your business can be taken off your equipment list.

Personal property forms can be picked up at the Fulton County Assessor's office, all local libraries in Fulton County, the Fulton County Museum, and the Kewanna Town Hall. Forms are also available from the State website at www.in.gov/dlgf.
