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#### KEWANNA TOWN COUNCIL

The Kewanna town council met in regular session Thursday, June 4, at the town hall. Those present included council members, Jeff Finke, Dan Birge and Mark Smith; clerk-treasurer, Jenny Kay; Tony Pesaresi, assistant fire chief; Bob Murphy, grant writer; Greg Heller, town attorney; Mike Molitor, town superintendent; Don Bixby of Territorial Engineering; and local residents, Chuck Smith and Cliff Bragdon.

Mr. Murphy presided over a bid opening on an irrigation traction system for the sewage treatment facility. The lone bidder was Thomas Excavating with a bid of \$55,650 for the traction system and \$2,724 for the nozzle assembly for a total of \$58,374. The bid was accepted by the council based on a review of the contract by Mr. Murphy. Funds for the traction system come from monies left in the recent improvement project.

Murphy also conducted a hearing concerning CDBG DR 2 grant application for \$1 million to work on the town's storm water drains. Territorial Engineering was hired as engineers for the project when the council met in special session May 28. Don Bixby of Territorial Engineering explained briefly how his company's plan will focus primarily on the trouble spots that run up East Street and Smith Street with some miscellaneous repairs in areas that have smaller issues. Mr. Murphy asked town superintendent, Mike Molitor, if this would take care of the flooding problems. Molitor responded that he thought it would take care of 75% of the town's problems. Chuck Smith inquired how the work would affect the streets in between East and Smith Streets. It was noted that the work should not cause any concerns. Tony Pesaresi asked about water accumulation behind Winamac Coil Spring. Bixby noted he hopes to talk with the county about opening things up behind there.

Pesaresi also gave the fire report for the month, noting that the annual pancake and sausage breakfast was a success. He inquired what the council has in mind for the public safety money received from the county auditor. A total of \$7,536.26 has been placed in the Public Safety Fund, which is to be used for fire, police and emergency medical service, although it is uncertain at this time what percentage is to be used toward each. The fire department would like to replace its jaws of life with the help of a recently applied for firefighter's assistance grant. It could take up to six months before the department will know whether or not it will be awarded the grant. The fire department responded to four town alarms during May, all medical, and seven township alarms, three fire and four medical. It also answered one mutual aid call.

Town superintendent Mike Molitor submitted his written report for the month, noting several sink hole repairs. A tree was trimmed on Troutman Street to make a speed limit sign more visible. The garage at the sewage treatment plant was cleaned and rearranged to accommodate equipment from the improvement project. Tim Kline, who has been hired to mow this summer, underwent orientation on the use of the town's mower and weed eater and the areas he would be responsible for. The hiring of summer help will allow town employee, Danny Chew, time to install new water meters. A new left front brake hose was installed on the town's red 3/4 ton truck. Second quarter samples for arsenic testing were pulled and the results sent to the state. Molitor met with the state wastewater inspector, Mike Kuss. Chew and Molitor are both working with Bob Murphy identifying storm drain problem areas. Murphy is applying for a grant in the amount of \$1 million to address these problems. A pump at the No. 1 lift station, which was leaking around the shaft seals, was pulled and taken to Indianapolis for repairs, at no cost to the town. The brush pile at the town's dump site for yard waste was pushed in preparation for burning by the fire department. A wash out under the deck behind the town hall was repaired. The wash out occurred when the sump pump hose serving the town hall broke. Town wide clean up day was a success. Both dumpsters were filled by 11 a.m. The water works pumped a total of 1,384,000 gallons of water during May.

Marshall Dennis Price's monthly report noted two traffic arrests, eight traffic warnings. two criminal arrests, 38 calls answered; one vehicle check and 1,383 miles patrolled. Marshal Price and two deputies, Danny Winter and Jon Sailors, Jr., attended a building search school at Grissom on May 6. Sailors started schooling at the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy May 18 and will be there until the end of August.

Chuck Smith requested that town trees at 213 South Smith Street be trimmed. Because funds in the tree trimming appropriation are nearing depletion for the year,

the council noted that he could trim the trees himself, as long as he does not cut down or top the trees.

Tony Pesaresi, on behalf of Winamac Coil Spring, requested the closing of several alleys some of which have been closed, but never recorded. Attorney Greg Heller advised that he follow the statutes for closing of alleys beginning with filing a petition

#### Jury duty scam

The FBI has verified a jury duty scam that is spreading fast. Most people take summonses for jury duty seriously, but enough people skip out on their civic duty that a new and ominous kind of fraud has surfaced.

The caller claims to be a jury coordinator. If you protest that you never received a summons for jury duty, the scammer asks you for your Social Security number and date of birth so he or she can verify the information and cancel the arrest warrant. Give out any of this information and bingo, your identity is stolen.

The fraud has been reported in 11 states. These scammers are particularly insidious because they use intimidation over the phone to try to bully people into giving information by pretending they are with the court system. The FBI and the federal court system have issued nationwide alerts on their web sites, warning consumers about the fraud.

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#### FSA county committee nominations start June 15

Don Hunton, Acting Executive Director for USDA's Farm Service Agency in Indiana, has announced that farmer and rancher candidate nominations will begin June 15 for local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees. The nomination period continues through August 3 and elections will take place in the fall.

To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area in which the person in a candidate.

Producers may also nominate themselves and organizations representing minority and women may also nominate candidates. To become a nominee, eligible individuals must sign form FSA-669A. The form and other valuable information about FSA county committee elections are available online at <a href="http://www.fsa.usda.gov/FSA/webapp?area=newsroom&subject=landing&topic=cce">http://www.fsa.usda.gov/FSA/webapp?area=newsroom&subject=landing&topic=cce</a>.

Nominations forms for the 2009 election must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on August 3, 2009.

FSA county committee members make decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price supports loan programs and other important agricultural issues. Members serve three-year terms. Nationwide, there are more than 7,800 farmers and ranchers serving on FSA county committees. Committees consist of three to five members who are elected by eligible producers.

FSA will mail ballots to producers beginning November 6. The voted ballots are due back to the local county officer via mail or in person by December 7, 2009. Newly elected committee members and alternates take office January 1, 2010.

# On-line farm program tools now available

Don Hunton, Acting Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service: Agency in Indiana, has announced that new online research and planning tools are now available for farmers and ranchers to assist them in examining how the new 2008 farm bill programs apply to their crops and operations.

ACRE or the Average Crop Revenue Election Program is a new revenue-based guarantee program administered by FSA that assists farmers and ranchers in managing the risks inherent in agricultural operations. ACRE is an alternative to the traditional price-stabilizing Direct and Counter-cyclical Program.

By visiting the FSA website at <a href="https://www.fas.usda.gov">www.fas.usda.gov</a>, growers enter their crops, acreages and price/yield projections in an ACRE calculator to evaluate potential results. The calculator tool and other information and eligibility resources can be found

by navigating to the Direct and Counter-cyclical Program/ACRE pages shown in the menu bar on the left of the FSA homepage.

"The ACRE alternative provides eligible producers a state-level revenue guarantee, based on the five-year state Olympic average yield and the two-year national average price," said Hunton.

The website also provides a 2009 Benchmark Yield History, ACRE Revenue Yield Maps and ACRE Price Values. The calculator can be used for one year and repeated to project multiple year results. Additional ACRE background information includes fact sheets and descriptive charts to help explain this program's provisions and calculations.

August 14 is the deadline to elect and enroll in ACRE for the 2009 Crop Year. Note that once a producer elects to participate in ACRE, the farm is no longer eligible for the regular Direct and Counter-cyclical Program through the 2012 crop year, the last year covered by the 2008

farm bill.

Producers should carefully evaluate their participation in ACRE. Payments in ACRE are made only when both state and farm-level triggers are met. By participating in ACRE, producers elect to forgo counter-cyclical payments, receive a 20% percent reduction in direct payments and a 30% reduction in loan rates.

#### Fire Safe Cigarettes Mandate Takes Effect July 1

+++++

Indiana smokers may notice some small changes in the cigarettes they purchase beginning July 1. Fire safe cigarettes have a reduced propensity to burn when left unattended, and have proven to decrease the number of home fires.

Fire safe cigarettes place two

bands on the cigarette paper that are less porous than the surrounding paper. These bands require smokers to inhale at these bands to increase oxygen and increase the temperature of the burning cigarette paper enough to burn through the bands.

"The cigarettes are made from the same blend of tobacco as regular cigarettes," said Jim Greeson, Indiana State Fire Marshal and Indiana Department of Homeland Security Division of Fire and Building Safety Director. "The only difference to the consumer is they need to puff it more often or re-light it."

Traditional technology keeps a cigarette burning even without puffing. This is accomplished by including a significant amount of citrate-burning agents. Within 10 minutes, 90-100 percent of traditional cigarettes will cause fires in ignition tests – and a cigarette can smolder for up to 45 minutes.

"The only physical packaging difference is that fire safety packs are denoted with a small "FSC" printed under the bar code, a heavy black line above the UPC, a diamond symbol or the letters FS, LIP, or RIP," added Greeson.

Statistics on residential structure fires through the National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS) show that 138 reported smoking related fires occurred in Indiana in 2008. These fires caused four civilian deaths, and 11 civilian injuries with property loss at nearly \$3.4 million. According to the National Fire Protection Agency, cigarette-ignited fires are the leading cause of home fire deaths in the United States, killing 700-900 people annually.

Dear EarthTalk: How can I recycle my old mattress if the

place I buy a new one from doesn't take it? What do mattress companies do with old mattresses when they do take them? Do they recycle any of the material?— J.

A typical mattres

A typical mattress is a 23 cubic foot assembly of steel, wood, cotton and polyurethane foam. Given this wide range of materials, mattresses have typically been difficult to recycle—and still municipal recycling facilities won't offer to do it for you. But along with increasing public about concerns environment—and a greater desire to recycle everything we can-has come a handful of private companies and nonprofit groups that want to make sure your old bed doesn't end up in a landfill.

The Lane County, Oregon chapter of the charity St. Vincent de Paul Society, for example, has spearheaded one of the nation's most successful mattress recycling initiatives via its DR3 ("Divert, Reduce, Reuse,

Recycle") program. "Keeping [mattresses] out of landfills is a matter of efficiently recycling them so their core materials can be reincarnated into any number of new products," reports the group, which opened a large mattress recycling center in Oakland, California in 2001. (Why hundreds of miles away in Oakland? To "go where the mattresses are," says Chance Fitzpatrick of the group.) The facility has been processing upwards of 300 mattresses and box springs per week ever since.

During the recycling process, each mattress or box spring is pushed onto a conveyor belt, where specially designed saws cut away soft materials on the top and bottom, separating the polyurethane foam and cotton fiber from the framework. The metal pieces are magnetically removed, and the remaining fiber materials are then shredded and baled. The whole process takes one worker just three to four minutes per mattress.

On a slow day, the DR3 facility recycles some 1,500 pounds of polyurethane foam, which totals a half million or more pounds over the course of a year. "A well-oiled recycling factory can reuse 90 percent of the mattress," reports Josh Peterson of Discovery's Planet Green website. "The cotton and cloth get turned into clothes. The springs and the foam get recycled, and the wood gets turned into chips."

While the DR3 facility only takes mattresses from a small group of waste haulers and individuals around the San Francisco Bay Area, other mattress recyclers are popping up around the U.S. and beyond. Some examples include Nine Lives Mattress Recycling in Pamplico, South Carolina; Conigliaro Industries in Framingham, Massachusetts; MattCanada in Montreal. Québec; and Dreamsafe in Moorabbin, Australia. To find a mattress recycler near you, consult the free online database at Earth911.org.

Those who aren't near a recycling facility might consider giving their old mattress away. But many health departments prohibit donating mattresses to charities like the Salvation Army or Goodwill. So what's an upgraded sleeper with a perfectly good old mattress to do? The web-based Freecycle Network allows people to post stuff to give away to anyone willing to come pick it up; likewise, chances are your local version of Craigslist also has a "free" section where you can post that it as available.

#### BMV STEPS UP BATTLE AGAINST IDENTITY THEFT AND FRAUD

Announces three initiatives focused on fastest growing crime in U.S.

Combating identity theft and fraud will be a major focus of three initiatives announced by Andy Miller, Commissioner of the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV) - a new BMV Fraud and Security Enforcement Division, commitment to implement the recommendations of the 9/11 Commission and other federal regulations, and an annual Identity Theft and Fraud Symposium.

The Fraud and Security Enforcement Division will coordinate efforts by the BMV to address security and fraud. The division brings together the former Investigations and Security, Compliance Internal Audit and other parts of the agency overseeing security and fraud. Monty Combs, who was BMV's Chief Financial Officer and is a former law enforcement officer, has been named the Deputy Commissioner to lead this new division.

Miller added "Establishing the new integrated Fraud and Security Enforcement Division allows us to bring all security-related responsibilities into one coordinated operation. With a singular focus on security, the division staff will proactively enhance security policies and procedures and be aggressive in investigating security breaches such as identity theft."

Miller made the announcement at the first BMV-sponsored Identity Theft and Fraud Symposium attended by representatives of federal, state and local law enforcement and public safety agencies.

In his opening remarks at the symposium, Miller affirmed BMV's commitment tully the implement recommendations of the 9/11 Commission and the federal regarding regulations identification documents. He noted that the Commission report specifically emphasized that "all but one of 9/11 hijackers acquired some form of U.S. identification document, some by fraud."

Miller continued, "There are over five million Hoosiers who have driver's licenses or ID cards issued by the BMV. These credentials are valuable identification documents that are used to board an aircraft, cash a check or perform many other business Because these transactions. credentials no longer just authorize someone to drive, but have much broader use, we must take all necessary steps to make them as secure as possible."

Miller cited a report from the Federal Trade Commission that identity theft has become the fastest growing crime in the nation. Crime statistics show that identity fraud cases increased by 22% from 2007 to 2008. The Identity Theft Resource Center calculates that there is some type of identity theft or fraud every two seconds in the United States.

In his welcome to the law enforcement officials and others attending the symposium, Miller said that the BMV staff thought there would be great value in bringing together federal, state and local law enforcement and other public safety agencies to discuss the latest developments in combating the rapidly

growing crime of identity theft. He noted that the BMV often works with law enforcement agencies, the Attorney General's office and local prosecutors in investigating and solving identity theft cases.

Presenters at the first symposium were David Kane, Transportation Security Administration; Monte McKee, Indiana Intelligence Fusion Center; Sonja Kriegsmann, Indiana Banker's Association, and Chuck Taylor, Indiana Deputy Attorney General.

Miller reported that the new initiatives are enhancing the many steps taken by the BMV over the past three years to improve security and integrity of driver's licenses and ID cards. He specifically highlighted the following:

- New STARS computer system provided a single BMV database and computing capacity for multiple security process improvements.
- A new digital driver's license and ID card incorporated new printing technology and imbedded security features to make counterfeiting more difficult.
- The Social Security
  Online Verification
  process allowed the
  BMV to instantaneously
  compare a customer's
  personal data against
  the Social Security
  Administration
  database. In this
  process over 19,000
  - database. In this process over 19,000 drivers' licenses were invalidated because name, Social Security number or date of birth could not be verified.
- Facial recognition technology now permits a comparison of a customer's photo against the BMV database of photos for duplication on other credentials.

Miller detailed six recent identity theft cases involving the BMV. He described the recent apprehension of David Grice who had successfully obtained six ID cards with different names. BMV's new facial recognition technology detected the duplicate licenses. All license branches were alerted and the man was identified when he attempted to obtain yet another license at Crawfordsville license branch. He now awaits trial on seven felony counts.

"The national statistics and this most recent case here in Indiana are warnings that identity theft and fraud are serious matters with financial and personal impact on the victims and society as a whole," said Miller.

"As the 9/11 Commission reminded us, identity theft and fraud can threaten our national security. We will continue to explore ways to enhance the security of BMV-issued credentials that will result in new processes and procedures in the future."




