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Wayne Township gets grant for addition to fire station



Wayne Township officials and community members were in Indianapolis Monday where they were presented with a \$500,000 Community Focus Fund grant for renovations to the Grass Creek fire station and community center The award was building. presented by Lieutenant Governor Becky Skillman. The Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs administers the grants, which are funded through federal Community Development Block Grant Twenty-six program. communities and counties received grants, totaling more than \$11 million.

Wayne Township will use the grant to increase the size of the Grass Creek fire station and community room, as well as make updates to meet current ADA standards. The existing bays will be updated to allow for more clearance for trucks, improved equipment storage, and other needed renovations. The community center will be updated to generate more use of the facility.

"These grants provide Indiana communities with funding for needed infrastructure improve the quality of life for Hoosiers," said Lt. Governor Becky Skillman. "I oversee the federal CDBG program and I've seen its tremendous impact on our state. I'd like to extend my sincerest thanks to everyone involved in this project for their commitment to making their community a better place to live, work, and do business."

The Community Focus Fund grants are awarded twice annually through a competitive application process. Eligible projects include, but are not limited to: community and senior centers, special needs facilities, libraries, water system improvements, storm drainage projects, and sewer system improvements.

The country's trade deficit fell in May to the lowest level in more than nine years. Exports posted a small gain while the weak U.S. economy pushed imports down for the tenth straight month.

The U.S. Treasury Department announced Monday that the federal deficit has topped \$1 trillion for the first time in history. The imbalance is intensifying fears about higher interest rates and inflation. The deficit shot up due to the huge sum the government has spent to combat the recession and financial crisis, combined with the sharp decline in tax revenues.

The Lake Bruce Conservancy District held its July meeting in conjunction with the Lake Bruce Association's annual meeting Saturday, July 11, at the Hoosier Hideaway. Following lunch, each group convened its meeting.

Director Kathy Fisher reported on the dredging project noting that the retaining pit is completed. The dredging will begin as soon as the company hired to do the work finishes its current project.

Three bids for generator maintenance were received. The bids will be reviewed and discussed at the next meeting.

Chris Pine submitted a bid for mowing the wastewater treatment plant and the two pumping stations. The board of directors accepted his proposal.

The conservancy district is still looking for someone to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Norm Steigely.

Richard Denny reported that the treatment plant is running great, but it is necessary to keep the flow moving. Property owners are encouraged to complete connections to the system.

Paul Bradley reported that there are currently 152 homes hooked up with 65 remaining. Twenty new permits have been applied for. It was reported last month that 180 homes have been hooked up, but the actual figure was 118.

The board of directors report that, unfortunately, sewer bills are likely to increase. It is working very diligently to make this increase as little as possible. Reasons for the increase include the fact that maintenance cost was grossly underestimated by the consultants; construction cost came in over the estimates (for instance the need for a second pumping station); the high price of oil increased the cost of pipe; the district has too many delinquent accounts (there are several properties that have not paid anything and this greatly impacts everyone); original usage figures were over-estimated (numbers are down due to opt outs and demolitions); and attorney costs will be increasing as the connection deadline approaches.

The deadline for connecting to the new sewage collection and treatment system is August 31, 2009. Everyone is urged to get hook up as soon as possible to avoid fines and connection fees.

The proposed 2010 budget for the Lake Bruce Conservancy District is scheduled for first reading at the August 13 meeting at 7 p.m. in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station.



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

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


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SIXTY YEARS AGO July 21, 1949

All corporation buses will run on Thursday, August 13. Drivers plan their routes to arrive at school by 8:25 a.m.

Students enrolling in kindergarten must be five (5) years old and students enrolling in the first grade must be six (6) years old on or before August 1, 2009. Parents need to provide certification from a physician that their child has been properly immunized and also they need to present a valid birth certificate if these have not previously been provided to the school. Effective July 1, 1999, the immunization list must also include hepatitis B.

Students in grades K-6 who are new students or did not enroll by mail may do so at the Caston Elementary office beginning Monday, August 3, through Wednesday, August 5. Hours are the same as listed below for the junior-senior high school enroll-

Students in grades seven (7) through twelve (12) will enroll at the Guidance Office on the following schedule:

Monday, August 3 – all students (including new students), 9 to 11:30 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m.

Tuesday, August 4 - all students, 12:01 to 3:30 p.m. and 5 to

Wednesday, August 5 - all students, 9 to 11:30 a.m. and 1 to 3

Seventh grade orientation will be held at 7 p.m. Tuesday, August 4, in the cafeteria.

Book rental fees will be: kindergarten, \$70; Grade 1, \$99; Grade 2, \$100; Grade 3, \$105; Grade 4,

\$95; Grade 5, \$100; Grade 6, \$92; and Grades 7 and 8, \$120. Fees for grades 9-12 vary depending on classes taken. Rental fees are to be paid prior to the first day of school.

All students are to pay fees at the Bookstore beginning Monday, August 3, through Wednesday, August 5. The hours are 9 to 11:30 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m. on Monday and Wednesday and 12:01 to 3 p.m. and 5 to 6:45 p.m. Tuesday.

Lunches will be served beginning Thursday, August 13. For students in grades K-6, the cost is \$1.70 per meal; students in grades 7-12 will pay \$1.85 per meal. Adults will pay \$2.50. Breakfast is served each morning for students who choose to participate. The cost is \$1.25 per meal for students and \$1.50 for adults. Each student will establish a renewable lunch account for meal fees. Meal fees may be credited to the student account weekly, monthly, six or nine week, semiannual or annual payments. Some students may be eligible for reduced lunch fees based on the guidelines listed below. Applications for this assistance will be available in the bookstore.

Students attending special education and vocational education (Century Career Center) will begin Monday, August 17. (Caston Career Center students are reminded they should attend school on Thursday and Friday, August 13 and 14, at Caston). Beginning Monday, August 17, special education students will be picked up at and returned to their homes by the special education bus. They will be transported directly to Logansport to arrive there at approximately 8 a.m. Century Career Center students will attend classes at Caston in the morning and will then be transported to

New document requirements and mail delivery procedure coming in 2010

The SecureID initiative to identity theft and combat enhance the security of driver's licenses and ID cards was announced by Andy Miller, Commissioner of the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV). These major new actions are the result of the 9/11 Commission recommendations and related Federal laws.

Miller emphasized, "The BMV will comply fully with the spirit and letter of the recommendations of the 9/11 Commission and related Federal laws and regulations. The 9/11 Commission noted that 'sources of identification are the last opportunity to ensure that people are who they say they are,' and we know that our BMVissued credentials are the most frequently used source of identification for Hoosiers."

"Identity theft and fraud is the fastest growing crime in the United States, and governmentissued documents like our driver's licenses and ID cards are targets for people who commit these crimes. In fact, the BMV today has over 500 active cases of identity theft or fraud."

Miller explained that effective January 1, 2010, all Hoosiers will need to complete three simple steps when renewing, amending or applying for a new driver's

need to visit a local license branch and present all of the required documents. These documents will only need to be presented one time, meaning that future renewals will be handled as they are today. The BMV will continue the current requirement for documentation with a name or address change.

Step 3: To enhance security even further, after January 1, 2010, driver's licenses, ID cards and permits will be mailed to customers and no longer produced at the license branches. Customers will be issued an interim document at the branch and will receive the permanent document in the mail within 10 business days.

This central issuance process is being used by 20 other states. During this process all of the driver's application documents are sent to a government-run secured print shop where their validity is checked against national databases and then the driver's licenses, ID cards and permits are printed. They are mailed from the print shop to the customers using the same secure mailing procedures used by the U.S. Passport Service, credit card companies, banks, and other states currently centrally. The myBMV.IN.gov Web site will allow a BMV customer to track the processing, mailing and delivery dates of the license, permit or ID card.

Central issuance allows for a review complete of documents. Attempts at identity theft and fraud can be detected before the permanent card is issued. This step can help virtually eliminate situations like the David Grice case where he successful acquired six ID cards under six different names or Claudia Andrade who was recently convicted for a bank theft in Indiana and had 11 different identity documents issued by the BMV.

Miller added that BMV will extensively publicize the new document requirements using direct mail, email, and advertising. Letters will be mailed to all customers with a driver's license renewal date in 2010 early this fall. A second reminder letter will be mailed 30-45 days before their renewal date. An insert will also be included in all registration renewal notices.

He concluded, "After January 1, we are asking Hoosiers to help us protect them and others from identity theft and fraud. These new document requirements and mail delivery procedures will allow us time to more carefully check the identity verification documents ensure applicants are who they say they are."

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FSA programs open to all

Don Hunton, Acting Executive Director for USDA's Farm Service Agency in Indiana, says FSA is reaching out to women, ethnic and minority farmers in the state in an effort to get more of them involved in its programs.

"FSA programs are available to all producers but we would like to participation increase underrepresented traditionally groups in all program areas," said Hunton.

FSA defines a socially disadvantaged (SDA) farmer, rancher, or agricultural producer as one of a group whose members have been subjected to racial, ethnic, or gender prejudice because of his or her identity as a member of the group without regard to his or her individual qualities. SDA groups are African Americans, women, Indians, Alaskan American Natives, Hispanics, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders.

According to Hunton, FSA also reserves a portion of its direct and guaranteed loan funds each year for SDA loans for eligible participants. These loan programs are designed to help farmers purchase and operate family farms.

"With these loan programs, FSA hopes to help reverse the declining number of farmers and ranchers across the U.S. and especially here in Indiana,' Hunton said.

Applicants must meet the eligibility requirements for a given program before FSA can extend program benefits. For more information on these programs and other programs available through FSA, contact the Farm Service Agency at the county USDA Service Center.
