

Don Hunton, Acting Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency in Indiana, reminds producers of the importance of timely electing and enrolling in the new Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) program or the traditional Direct soon as possible. The deadline to enroll in ACRE or DCP for 2009 is August 14.

The ACRE program is an innovative alternative to the traditional farm safety net. With this new program also comes a complex signup process. It is important the producers contact their local office to set up appointments well before the August 14 deadline.

Late-filled applications ACRE or DCP will not be accepted. ACRE elections on the CCC-509ACRE will not be approved until all producers, including owners, on a farm have signed the CCC-509ACRE for election and the CCC-509 for enrollment into the ACRE program. For crop year 2009, a CCC-509ACRE and CCC-509 not having all requisite signatures election/enrollment deadline of

August 14 will not be considered submitted for the purpose of election/enrollment and will not be acted on or approved. If producers do not elect ACRE. they have the option of completing the CCC-509 contract for enrollment into the DCP program by August 14. Both ACRE and DCP require all signatures be obtained by the deadline.

To elect ACRE for a farm, producers must complete Form CCC-509ACRE, which irrevocably elects ACRE for the farm through crop year 2012. Form CCC-509, the contract to participate in ACRE, must then be completed each year the producer intends to participate and receive benefits.

* Reinforce math skills for grade school kids. At home, use fun educational workbooks, games and books to reinforce math skills learned at school. Make sure the workbooks you choose are curriculum-based, such as the "Brain Quest Workbooks" Pre-K through Grade 4; random math books may not be attuned to the national curriculum children follow at school. You can ask your child's teacher to review a workbook before you use it.

Teach problem-solving processes throughout childhood. Knowing how to find an answer is as important as the right answer. 



He was preceded in death by a son, David Hassenplug, and his parents.





Discovering my world view

The Bible is full of of God. descriptions Scriptures like Genesis 1:1 104 Psalm and are wonderful in expressing the unlimited side to His nature. God has revealed Himself throughout the Bible. In Genesis, He is Creator of all and a Companion to Adam, the God is a first man. Provider and Guide to Moses in the book of Exodus. He is a Promise Keeper to Abraham in Genesis his and to descendants throughout the entire Bible. He is a Strong Tower for King David in 2nd Samuel and throughout the Psalms.

In the New Testament, God is the Man who came to earth and walked among us. He is the Savior of every person. He is the One who was born of a virgin and died on a Roman cross for every sin ever committed.

Throughout the gospels, Jesus speaks of what we must do to have the life God planned for us. He was not referring to the life we live now, but rather the life that we will have throughout eternity. He made it very clear that there was only one way to gain this life in eternity. He said, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life no one comes to the Father except through Me.

But why is this just? Why has man exacted this level of punishment from a perfectly just God? In other words, we have reached our fifth important question: What is the nature of man? If man were innately good, I

punishment. an unjust However, the Bible has another view of man. In Romans 3:23, it states that all men have sinned. Man's sin separated him from God. God is holy. He could not look upon or have fellowship with sin. If we try to come into fellowship with Him in our sinful and fallen state, He, the Consuming Fire (Hebrews 12:29) would consume us. Knowing His own nature so well, God made a way that we could have our sin removed and be able to have fellowship with Him. Jesus' sacrificial death on the cross was God's "way" (John 14:6) to bring about our restoration to Him. God lives at the end of a dead-end road, if you don't follow the directions He gave you, you are not going to reach His house!

The sixth important question is: What is the basis of morality and ethics? C.S. Lewis makes many wonderful arguments on the need for ethics and morality. In his book "Mere Christianity, he also shows plainly how morality and ethics are a part of us even if we insist that there is no right or wrong.

Imagine a man giving a speech to a group of new-agers decrying the lack of any real right or

Why does the speech-giver now decry that it is wrong for the criminal to enter his house? If, as he says, everything is relative and everyone must decide for themselves what is right and wrong then



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

 Only magazines & catalogs made of slick, glossy paper
