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KEWANNA TOWN COUNCII

The Kewanna town council met in regular session Thursday, October 1, at the town hall. Those in attendance included council members, Jeff Finke and Mark Smith; clerk-treasurer, Jenny Kay; assistant fire chief, Tony Pesaresi; deputy marshal, Jon Sailors, Jr.; superintendent, Mike Molitor; grand administrator, Bob Murphy; engineer, Don Bixby; and the town's **FEDCO** representative, Doran Collins.

Superintendent Mike Molitor submitted his September report in addition to re-emphasizing his interest in purchasing a used vactor truck for the town. He is currently awaiting information from a company out of Chicago. Assistant Fire Chief Tony Pesaresi backed Molitor in his interest mentioning the uses that could also benefit the fire department. No decision will be made on the matter at this time. Due to the excess amount of time spent toward the current wastewater construction project, town employees have been unable to complete hydrant flushing as planned. Molitor would like to accomplish the flushing within the next week or

The superintendent's monthly report noted that town employee Danny Chew is almost done installing new "stop" and "yield" signs around town. He has been cutting old sign posts to make extensions so all the signs will be at the same height. Chew also located and painted all of the water valve boxes in the areas where the new storm drain lines are expected to be installed. A catch basin lid was replaced at the corner of Toner and Aurora Streets. Two sink holes on N. Smith Street were repaired. Pole and meter numbers collected so the festival meters could be turned on by NIPSCO and "stop" and "no parking signs" were created. The town borrowed the county's street sweeper to clean up for the festival. Council member Dan Birge cleaned about 90% of the streets on his own time. Danny Chew also hand-swept dirt on Main Street. The water lab reported that the town had some bad water samples. More samples were taken and submitted to the lab in South Bend. The drive belt on the town's mower was replaced. The superintendent had two meetings with Don Bixby, engineer for the storm drain project, during which they talked about catch basins and line locations. Molitor also met with Joe Donlon from Standard Equipment out of Chicago about some used vactor trucks. He is going to send

Leaf burning banned

Kewanna residents are reminded that the burning of leaves during the months of October and November is unlawful. Leaves should be raked to the edge of the street where town employees will pick them up. Pick up will begin as soon as the leaves start coming down in a greater volume.

Persons violating this ordinance will receive a warning for the first offense. A second and subsequent offense will result in fines ranging from \$25 to \$ 100.


United Ministries announces new policies for Christmas baskets

Red Cross Distributes Awards for Outstanding Support

On Friday, Oct. 2, the American Red Cross Blood Services, Indiana-Ohio Region, hosted its annual meeting and recognition luncheon at the Orthopaedic Capital Center in Winona Lake. Many awards were given out, including the Outstanding Blood Donor, Growing by Leaps and Bounds, Faithful Friend and Chapter Partnership Awards.

The Outstanding Blood Donor Award recognizes the individual in each county served by the Indiana-Ohio Region who had the highest donation frequency in Fiscal Year 2009. If there was a tie for highest frequency in a county, the donor with a combination of highest donation frequency and highest lifetime donations was recognized. Ralph Stayton of Leiters Ford, who has donated 200 units in his lifetime and seven times in the past year, was recognized for his commitment.

The blood drive sponsors recognized with the Growing by Leaps and Bounds Award increased the units of blood donated at their blood drives by

at least 25 percent or increased the number of blood drives they hosted in the last year. Hospital Woodlawn honored with this award for adding an extra drive to its schedule last year, recruiting more employees to donate exceeding its blood and collections goal for a drive during the week of July 4th.

The Faithful Friend Award recognizes the sponsors that have continuously shown support to the American Red Cross and blood donation. The Talma Community Building received this award for being willing to host drives in times of need and for increasing its collections by 46 percent last

The highlight of the event was the presentation of the American Red Cross Partnership Awards.

Partnership Awards recognize the invaluable work of the chapters, hospitals and sponsors that support the Indiana-Ohio Region. Their active role and faithful support in the collection of blood products helped make this year a success.



information on a truck he thinks would work well for the town. The truck would be used to clean the lift stations, the contact tank at the sewage treatment plant and all of the catch basins in town.

The superintendent reported ongoing and constant problems with the workmanship at the sewage construction site. The new liner was installed in the east lagoon, but some of the vents were too low. Danny Chew measured all of the vents and marked all of the low ones. A meeting was held concerning the repairs needed on the west lagoon. Molitor asked Don Woolington to survey the top of the liner and ground around the west lagoon to check the accuracy of the contractor's survey. The contractor agreed to come back and repair the north, west and south ends of the lagoon. The people who installed the liners came back and moved all of the vents up in the east lagoon and made a repair to the

liner on the transfer pipe. They added pieces to the west lagoon to get it up to the right elevation and moved those vents up where the repairs were made. Molitor talked to the contractor about repairing the sidewalk around the contact tank. They had to pour five new pieces and agreed to pin those pieces, but only one section was pinned. Molitor took pictures of the completed work. Work was done on the No. 2 lift station, but it still has a hump and a low spot and is a little rough inside the fence. Thomas Excavating installed the new tracks on the irrigator with positive results.

The town pumped a total of 1,175,100 gallons of water during September.

In discussing the wastewater treatment project, Bob Murphy brought to the council's attention that the cost has exceeded the grant funds available due to numerous change orders throughout the project. The town will need to seek another loan to pay for the project in full. Pay request No. 9 to Thieneman Construction in the amount of \$49,180.55 was approved for payment. A proposed change order from Thieneman Construction was tabled. Pay application No. 2 from Thomas Excavating in the amount of \$8,503.26 was also approved.

Tony Pesaresi submitted the September fire report. He expressed his appreciation to the town for its help and cooperation during the fall festival. Council member Mark Smith also thanked the fire department for its help during the run/walk, as well as coverage during the entire festival. department The responded to two town alarms during September, one fire and one medical, and five township alarms, all medical. It also

provided one mutual aid. Training consisted of hose testing and a county-wide disaster drill.

The police department's monthly report noted seven traffic warnings, seven criminal arrests, two accident reports, 52 calls answered and 1,347 miles patrolled. Marshal Dennis Price and Deputy Danny Winter attended training concerning Alzheimer sufferers at Grissom on September 16.

Engineer Don Bixby presented the contract for the storm drain project, which was approved and signed.

FEDCO member Doran Collins briefly explained the Indiana Main Street Initiative program currently underway and is looking to Kewanna for interest in the program. Council member Jeff Finke will speak with Shane Blair about details.

The council reviewed a quote from Keystone for a computerized budget program. The quote was tabled for the present time.

In reference to a request received from Nurse Practitioner Jean Herd at the September meeting to use a room in the town hall to see patients on Saturday morning, there has been a change as she was unable to secure a collaborator. She would like to be kept in mind, however, for future healthcare needs.

The 2010 budget was adopted by the council. Claims against the town, water and sewage works were okayed for payment.

NIPSCO HEATING BILLS PROJECTED TO DROP THIS WINTER

Northern Indiana Public Service Company announced that, assuming normal winter temperatures, customers should experience a decrease of more than 35 percent in their overall home heating bills this upcoming heating season.

Over the course of the winter heating season – Nov. 1 to March 31 – NIPSCO's average residential customer using 698 therms could expect to pay approximately \$509. This compares to \$833 for a customer using the same amount of gas during the last winter heating season.

The cost of natural gas represents the largest portion of customer bills, typically making up three-fourths of an overall bill. NIPSCO has no mark-up and makes no profit on the cost of natural gas billed to its customers. Before being billed to customers, natural gas commodity costs are filed with the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission for review on a monthly basis.

Commodity prices in the market are mainly determined by such factors as supply and demand,

weather and storage levels, but lower gas costs this year can also be attributed to the cooler-thannormal temperatures we experienced during the summer, the decline in industrial demand for energy as a result of the recession, gas production levels across the country and recordhigh inventories of natural gas.

In a commitment to secure the most reliable supply of natural gas at the lowest cost for customers, NIPSCO's purchasing strategy consists of buying gas in the market from a variety of sources at different times throughout the year, combined with contracting future purchases and utilizing gas storage to offset market price volatility.

"As we've seen since the end of last year, natural gas prices on the wholesale market have dropped considerably and we're looking at a much different picture heading into this winter heating season compared to what we faced last year at this time," said Eileen O'Neill Odum, CEO of NIPSCO. "This is welcome news to our customers planning their household budgets. However, we're anticipating a great need for energy assistance for many of our customers, some of which for the first time, as a direct result of

the current economic conditions across the state."

NIPSCO offers a number of solutions to help customers use energy wisely, make smart energy decisions and manage their monthly bill, including:

NIPSCO ANNOUNCES DECREASE IN GAS COST FOR OCTOBER

Northern Indiana Public Service Company announced recently that due to the change in the price of natural gas on the wholesale market, the price NIPSCO expects to pay for October 2009 is 33.87 cents per therm, down 11.2 percent from the September gas price.

Natural gas costs reflected on residential gas bills change each month dependent upon the gas prices in the wholesale market.

NIPSCO does not mark up this cost.

By way of example, customers using a monthly total of 100 therms of natural gas should expect their October bill to total \$41.62, an 8.20 percent decrease from a September bill with the same usage.

Additionally, NIPSCO announced that it provided its residential gas customers the lowest gas costs in the state for

I'm writing today about the 2010 United States Census, which is often misunderstood, but very important to our local and national communities.

The Census is conducted by the Bureau of Census, as a part of the U.S. Department of Commerce, and in addition to providing valuable statistics, also affects federal and state funding of public works projects, public health, education, transportation, and many more areas.

voice in Congress. Mandated by the Constitution of the United States, and first performed in 1790, the census is used to apportion seats in the U.S. House of Representatives, and to legislatures, redistrict state establish school assignment areas and other important functions of government.

The Census is used like a snapshot to help define "who" we are as a nation. It provides important statistical data to all levels of government, which will affect planning decisions, such as where to provide services for the elderly, where to locate roads and schools, or even where to locate job training centers.

The Census is a confidential survey, and all Census Bureau employees (both administrative and field employees) take an oath to protect that confidentiality, and are subject to jail and fines for the disclosure of any information that might identify a respondent or household. The focus of the Census is to gather an accurate count of all people living in the United States and their housing arrangements.

The 2010 Census is different from those in the past. In censuses. previous most households received a short-form questionnaire, and one household in six would receive a long-form survey for additional information. The 2010 Census will be an ALL short-form ONLY census.

You will be asked to provide your name, sex, date of birth, race, ethnicity, your relationship, and housing tenure. That's it! The short-form survey is estimated to take less than 10 minutes to complete, and can easily be returned through the mail.

The Census Bureau will mail or deliver the 2010 Census questionnaire to your house in March 2010. They will mail a second form to households that do not respond to the initial questionnaire. Households that do not respond will be called or visited by a Census worker (you can identify a Census worker by their Census badge and bag).

I hope you can see the importance of the U.S. decennial census (and why the 2010 Census will be more easily completed than ever before). In the coming months, you'll see reminders, not just from me, but also from the Bureau of Census itself. There is a big push on the part of the The Census also affects your Bureau to make this the most

accurate and comprehensive survey to date. I hope you'll do your part.

high quality service in a professional and customer friendly office environment."




