## The News In Brief

The Fulton County Health Department will hold H1N1 flu immunization clinics every Thursday in February from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the health department office, 125 E. 9th St., Rochester. The clinics are open to the public and no appointment is necessary.

He is also telling people he is from the Red Cross. The Red Cross reports they have no one named "Mike" or any individual collecting articles for Haiti on their behalf.

Indiana Secretary of State Todd Rokita has announced that he is running for the 4th District congressional seat being vacated by GOP Rep. Steve Buyer. Buyer announced earlier that he will not seek re-election due to his wife's health. Buyer formerly represented the 2nd District, of which Fulton County is a part.

The Logansport City Council has rezoned land near the new Wal-mart in Logansport, allowing the development of a new shopping center. The developer says the shopping center will encompass 19,000 to 22,000 square feet and that 75 percent of the space has already been pre-leased to four companies.

The Grissom Air Museum at Bunker Hill will open as scheduled March 2, despite the fact that the State of Indiana has cut all funding as a State Historic Site. Museum memberships are available for a donation of \$20 and tax-deductible contributions can be made to the museum. Admission costs are \$4 for adults; \$3 for veterans, seniors over 55, and students between the ages of 7-18; and free for students under the age of 6 and

## Vegetable pilot project

A section of the 2008 Farm Bill authorizes a Planting Transferability Pilot Project (PTPP) which permits the planting of certain vegetable crops on base acres of farms which are participating in the USDA commodity programs. Indiana is one of seven states which takes part in this pilot project and 9,000 acres, annually, has been allotted to Indiana.

This program is designed to be utilized for farmers and/or farms for which there is not an established history of producing these vegetables. Base acres on participating farms will be reduced acre-for-acre on the acreage planted to the vegetable crop for the year in which the farm is participating.

The sign-up period for PTPP will end on March 2, 2010. There are no late-filed provisions. If the state total of PTPP offers exceeds the allotment, a lottery will be utilized to limit the participation.

Interested producers should visit their local FSA office for more information and to submit an offer to participate.

## 2010 Farm program signup

Local Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices are now enrolling farms into the 2010 DCP and ACRE programs. Participants may request advance payments amounting to 22 percent of the final direct payments. ACRE participants agree to a 20 percent reduction in their direct payments, a 30 percent reduction in loan rates and to forgo countercyclical payments.

The deadline for enrollment into the DCP and ACRE programs is June 1, 2010. Interested producers should call the FSA office to schedule an appointment.

## Head: Senate approves sweeping redistricting reforms

*GOP bills would establish objective guidelines, bipartisan review of other states' best practices*

Lawmakers approved Senate Republicans' sweeping redistricting reforms establishing objective guidelines and congressional districts after the 2010 census and requiring an in-depth bipartisan review of redistricting best practices used by other states.

"This legislation could help give lawmakers objective principles to follow while crafting new legislative and congressional districts next session and beyond," said Sen. Randy Head (R-Logansport), who voted in support of the legislation.

Head said Senate Bill 80, which passed by a vote of 47-1, will require lawmakers to consider the following factors when drawing future districts:

- Preservation of traditional neighborhoods;
- Preservation of local communities of interests;
- Protection of minority voting rights;
- Simply-shaped, compact districts; and
- Respect for county and precinct lines.

Senators also voted 45-3 to approve legislation creating an in-depth bipartisan study of best practices of other states. Senate Bill 136, also supported by Head, would establish the Redistricting Study Committee and task the panel with examining ways to improve the redistricting process including proposals to establish an independent commission to draw legislative and congressional district boundaries.

"This panel could help lawmakers gain feedback from Hoosiers and other experts in the field on how Indiana can best draw its legislative districts," Head said. "Also, the committee will take into consideration other states' redistricting efforts and their success stories."

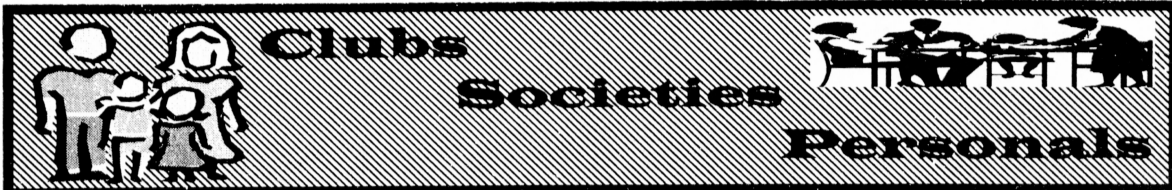
SB 80 and SB 136 now move to the House of Representatives for further consideration.
