#### Time to file 2010 personal property returns

Personal property returns are to be filed between March 1 and May 15, 2010. Failure to file a return by May 15, as required by law, will result in penalties.

It is no longer the duty of the township trustee to assist with the filing of personal property returns. If you filed a business return (Form 103-L or Form 103-S) or a farm return (Form 102) last year, you will need to file the return this year at the Fulton County Assessor's office located in the Fulton County Office Building, 125 E. 9th St., Suite 206, Rochester.

You need to turn in any new equipment you have acquired or any equipment that you no longer use for your business can be taken off your equipment list. Personal property forms can be picked up at the Fulton County Assessor's office, all local libraries in Fulton County, the Fulton County Historical Society Museum and the Kewanna town hall. 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#### Tax statements to be on time

Fulton County Assessor Judy Dancy, Fulton County Auditor Judy Reed, and Fulton County Treasurer Lorie Hurst report they have completed the 2009 pay 2010 tax preparations.

The three officers have worked diligently with the State Department of Local Government Finance (DLGF) to accomplish getting tax payments back on schedule for the first time in four years. This year's tax statements will be mailed the first part of April. The first installment will be due May 10, 2010 and the fall installment will be due November 10, 2010.

Included in the statements will be a pink homestead verification form that must be filled out and returned to the auditor's office.

The DLGF certified Fulton County's 2010 budget order and tax rates Wednesday, March 10, giving the county an opportunity for on-time property tax bills for the first time since 2006. The budget certification came 76 days sooner than last year.

The first step in the tax billing process is the completion of property assessments, which culminates with the submission of a ratio study by the county assessor. A ratio study is a comparison between property sales prices and assessed values in the county to ensure that market values are being used to determine assessed values. Fulton County Assessor Judy Dancy submitted the 2010 ratio study January 20, one day sooner than last year.

Once the DLGF approves the ratio study, the county assessor sends the gross assessed values to the county auditor, who applies exemptions, deductions or abatements to determine the net assessed values - the values upon which tax rates are based. Fulton County Auditor Judy Reed submitted certified net assessed values February 18 - 54 days sooner than the previous year.

Now that the 2010 budget has been certified by the DLGF, the next steps are handled at the county level. The county auditor calculates the bills, which will be mailed by the county treasurer.

Born May 10, 1919, at her parents' farm home east of the Olive Branch Church west of Fulton, she was the daughter of



## Immunizations available at Health Department

The Fulton County Health Department offers an immunization clinic every Wednesday from 8 to 11:30 a.m. and 2-5 p.m. The fourth Wednesday of every month clinic hours are extended to 6 p.m. Parents are urged to beat the school rush and take their children to the clinic early to receive their school immunizations.

Children entering kindergarten in the 2010-2011

school year will need to be immunized before attending school. Students entering the 6<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grade and first year college students are required additional immu-nizations as well.

In addition to the previously required immunizations, students entering pre-school or kindergarten (4-6 years old) must have two documented varicella vaccines, separated by at least three months, or written documentation that they have had the disease (chicken pox).

Students entering 6th through 12th grade and first year college students must have one DTap vaccine (Diphtheria, Tetanus, Acellular Pertussis); one meningitis vaccine (MCV4); two varicella vaccines (chicken pox) or documentation of the disease. 
## Blood collection day, March 30



#### Delay Huge Business Tax Increase

Lawmaker hails passage as huge victory for Hoosier employers and job creation

State Rep. Doug Gutwein (R-Francesville) voted in support of Sonate Bill 23, the measure that would delay the largest tax increase on employers in the state's history. SB 23 seeks to delay House Bill 1379 (from 2009), which passed the House last year without Rep. Gutwein's

Without the passage of SB 23. over \$300 million in taxes would have gone into effect on over 80,000 Indiana employers that provide jobs for over 2 million Hoosiers.

Local employers could have seen a tax increase of up to several hundred dollars peremployee.

After a lengthy conference committee process, Senate Bill 23 was adopted by the House with a 85-12 vote. The Indiana Senate also passed the measure. 50-0. The bill now advances to the governor's desk for final approval.

"Supporting a bill to save Hoosier jobs and help employers is common sense," said Rep. Gutwein. "The economy is in no shape to increase taxes on employers. The passage of this bill will help keep Hoosiers working, and that is exactly what we need."

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
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#### Cub Scouts hold Blue and Gold banquet

#### **ENERGY ASSISTANCE OPTIONS AVAILABLE** FOR NIPSCO **CUSTOMERS**

With the state's moratorium ending March 15, Northern Indiana Public Service Company reminds low-income customers with outstanding balances that a number of assistance programs and payment arrangements are available to help customers with their utility bills.

Between Dec. 1 and March 15, natural gas utilities in Indiana do disconnect service to customers enrolled in the state Energy Assistance Program (EAP) who are delinquent on their home heating bills.

"Fortunately, with gas prices being significantly less this winter heating season, we have seen a considerable drop in the amount of customers who have fallen behind on their bill," said Guy Ausmus, Senior Vice President of Customer for Engagement NIPSCO. "Assistance funds are still available for customers who meet specific income guidelines. But, it's imperative that any customer, regardless of income, call us with bill-payment trouble immediately so we have an opportunity to work together to get the customer the assistance they need or see if they qualify for a payment plan."

While the overall number of customers receiving state energy assistance dollars has seen little change from last year, the number of customers who have fallen behind on their utility bills has dropped more than 50 percent from last year at this time.

In addition to funds available to EAP customers, nearly \$5.5 million remains available this year through NIPSCO's Winter Warmth program. Over the past seven years, Winter Warmth has provided nearly \$26 million in

assistance to more than 70,000 customers.

Among the programs available to help customers are:

- State Energy Assistance provides Program qualifying families with bill and crisis assistance. The maximum amount household can receive is \$715, including a \$200 crisis grant. Household income must be at or below 150 percent of the federal poverty level.
- Winter Warmth Program provides qualifying customers with up to \$450 in annual energy assistance. Eligibility requirements include those customers up to 200 percent of the federal poverty guidelines, in addition to those who have a financial hardship situation as determined by an administering Winter Warmth agency.
- Gift of Warmth Fuel Fund provides eligible lowincome customers whose incomes are at or below 150 percent of the federal poverty level, and who have received a disconnect notice, with heating bill assistance. NIPSCO matches agency contributions dollar for dollar.
- Township **Trustees** provides customers with home heating bill Customers are encouraged to contact their local Township Trustee to see what help is available.
