Council outlaws use of jake brakes

The Kewanna town council passed an ordinance prohibiting the use of compression or "jake" brakes within the Town of Kewanna when it met for its regular monthly session Thursday, June 5. The ordinance can be found printed elsewhere in this issue of The Observer.

In other business, Ned Urbin requested permission to remove a dead tree next to his garage. The council approved the request as long as he also plants another tree. Urbin also requested that county law enforcement officials be made aware of the town's consumer fireworks ordinance.

The council received a request from Winamac Coil Spring, Inc. to reestablish an Economic Revitalization Area and additional tax abatement for a proposed investment of \$1,102,000 in new manufacturing equipment over the next two years with an anticipated increase of five new employees. A declaratory resolution was passed with a final vote to be held after a public hearing set for July 3.

The council entered into a contract with Thieneman Construction, Inc. for upgrades at the wastewater treatment plant. A meeting was set for June 11 at the plant with grant writer, Bob Murphy, Mike Strang of Strang & Associates/Bonar Group, the contractor and many of his subcontractors to discuss the paperwork, construction schedule, and responsibilities of the different parties as well as any additional work that might be done as the project came in under budget.

Judy Collins inquired about the Medical Task Group and volunteered to be part of the group, which is attempting to bring a physician into the community. The group's next meeting will be Monday, June 23, at the town hall.

A resident expressed concern about a beehive in a tree near his home. The council suggested calling a beekeeper to take the bees. Another resident requested an alley closing. The council advised him of the process involved.

Quotes were received for the removal of a concrete slab on the water tower lot and the filling in of the excavation under it. The work was awarded to Cliff Bragdon.

It was noted that town employee Danny Chew has received his certification as a Grade WT2 water treatment plant operator as well as a Grade DDS water distribution system manager.

The council okayed the hiring of part time summer help and the clerk was asked to advertise the position.

The council set its July meeting for 5 p.m. Thursday, July 3, rather than 7 p.m. due to the local fireworks.

The fire department responded to five alarms during May. All were medical runs. Training covered extrication using Squad No. 5, jaws and cutters.

The police department reported one traffic arrest, eight traffic warnings, four criminal arrests, two accident reports, 57 calls answered, three vehicle checks and 1,652 miles patrolled. Town marshal, Dennis Price, and deputy, Danny Winter, attended building search schooling May 7.

Work was completed on the lighted sign at the town hall and some broken electrical pipes on both irrigator panels at the wastewater treatment plant were repaired. Tree branches and a big tree limb were cleared from streets following a storm. The last of the cold patching material was used. The salt spreader was removed from the dump truck and the truck cleaned up. Danny Chew finished cutting up signposts to aid in installing the new stop and yield signs at the correct height. He also cleaned up the dirt pile behind the town hall, which was left from installing the radio tower. The area around the catch basin at East and Phillips Streets was filled in. One of the trees planted by the Town Tree Committee was pulled as it had died and the hole was filled in. Work was done around the lagoons at the wastewater treatment plant to get ready for the construction project. Several new water meters were installed. The water works pumped a total of 1,247,800 gallons of water during the month of May.

Dogs must be tied or penned

The Kewanna town marshal reminds Kewanna residents that it is unlawful to permit any dog to run at large within the corporate limits of the town. Any dog running at large will be impounded.

Dog owner's must exercise proper control over their pet and make sure they do not bother passers-by, chase passing vehicles, attack other domestic animals, trespass upon private property, damage private or public property, or cause a disturbance with continued barking. Pens or the areas in which a dog is tied must be kept clear of wastes that produce a foul or noxious odor.

Give twice as much with double red cell donation

There is more than one way to give the gift of life. You can donate whole blood, platelet pheresis and double red cells.

Unlike traditional whole blood donations, which are sent to the laboratory for separation into components, the double red cell donation process separates your blood into its components as it is being drawn.

An immediate benefit is that you should find the donation experience more comfortable. Your plasma, which contains vitamins, minerals and nutrients in your blood, is returned to you during the donations process, along with a small amount of saline solution. You usually leave the American Red Cross blood drive or donor center more hydrated than you would normally be after a whole blood donation. Double red cell donation may also fit into your schedule better. Since you are donating two units of red cells, you must wait 16 weeks or 112 days between donations.

There are specific donor requirements for double red cell donation. You must be 18 years of age or older. Males must weigh at least 150 pounds and stand at least 5'1" tall. Females must weigh at least 175 pounds and stand at least 5'5" tall. Please ask if double red cell donation is available at your local blood drive or donor center.

Regardless of whether or not you give through double red cell donation, your gift of blood is needed. You can help boost the summer blood supply by donating blood at one of the following blood drives:

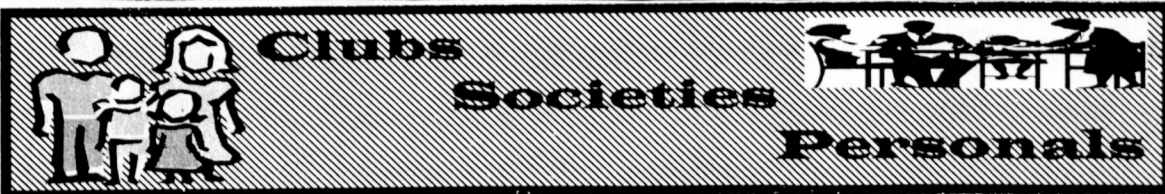

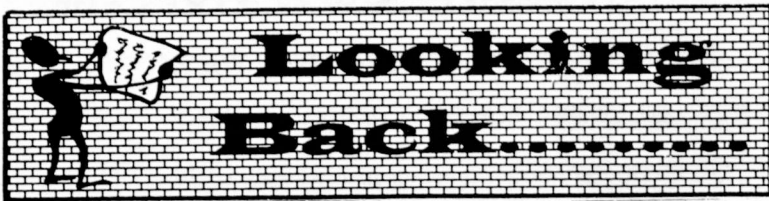

SIXTY YEARS AGO June 10, 1948

Mrs. Ida Murphy, Kewanna, suffered a fall in her home Sunday and injured her hip. She was taken to Woodlawn Hospital for observation and X-ray.

The farm home of Lawrence Perry, five miles west of Kewanna in Pulaski County, was almost completely destroyed by fire around 4:30 p.m. Tuesday. The family had been burning papers in a small stove and it is thought the fire started by an over-heated flue. About half the furniture was saved.

Donald Clark, Margaret Hendrickson, Lee Kubicki and Norma Murray were among the seniors at Indiana University scheduled to receive their diplomas June 13 during IU's 119th commencement.

Rev. W. C. Evers is the new pastor at the Kewanna Methodist Church. He replaces Dr. George Burdon who was transferred to Clinton. Rev. Evers comes to Kewanna from Dayton where he was pastor for four years. He has held pastorates at Royal Center, North Liberty, Hebron, Trinity and Terre Haute.

Patsy Joyce Wilson, Kewanna, was bitten on the face by a stray dog last Wednesday evening. It took 10 stitches to close the wound.

FIFTY-FIVE YEARS AGO June 12, 1953

The Kewanna Fire Department was called to the Robert Wilson farm home east of town Friday afternoon about 4 p.m. to help extinguish a fire in the home. It is believed the fire was caused by sparks from a chimney. There was only minor damage done.

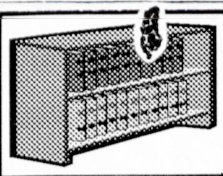

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Haying, grazing CRP acres allowed

The USDA recently made certain grasslands which are enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) available for haying or grazing for 2008. The livestock industry is experiencing soaring feed costs, with fewer acres available for haying and grazing. CRP participants with certain established vegetative cover may voluntarily have their CRP contract modified to utilize CRP

acres for critical feed use, including haying or grazing. This one-year program will limit the scope, frequency and duration of the haying or grazing.

To ensure protection of the resources, critical feed use is not authorized during the primary bird nesting season. Therefore, the earliest that haying or grazing may occur is August 1, 2008. The more environmentally sensitive land will not be eligible for haying or grazing and must be left undisturbed. Only one cutting of hay is permitted. Grazing on the land must be completed by November 10, 2008, and hay bales must also be removed from the land by that date.

No more than 50 percent of each eligible field may be hayed. Grazing can be conducted on 75 percent of each field, or on 100 percent if no more than a 75 percent stocking rate, as determined by NRCS or TSP, is utilized. There is a \$75 administrative fee for participating in the critical feed use program. No payment reduction will be applied to the CRP participant's annual rental payment.

CRP participants interested in this program must contact their local USDA Farm Service Agency office for more details and information.

WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Kewanna, Indiana, has determined that to protect the public's health, safety and welfare that the use of compression brakes be prohibited within the town limits except in case of emergency.

2. Any person who violates this section shall be fined not more than \$2,500.00 for a first offense and not more than \$7,000.00 for a second offense. If a written plea of guilty is made to the Town Clerk-Treasurer within 72 hours after violation notice is issued, the violator shall pay a fine of \$25.00 to the Clerk-Treasurer, who shall deposit all such fines in the General Fund of the Town Treasury; provided however, that the Clerk-Treasurer may refuse to accept the plea and payment of fine if the violator has paid such fine to the Clerk-Treasurer two or more times previously in any one calendar year and may require the violator to answer the violation in a court of competent jurisdiction.
