

THE LAKE BRUCE CONSERVANCY DISTRICT NEWS

The Lake Bruce Conservancy District held its regular meeting Thursday, June 12, in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station. All five directors were present as well as five freeholders and one guest.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved. The treasurer's reports for the past two. months were read and approved. Chairman Norm Steigely covered the correspondence received during the month.

It was reported that the district's insurance carrier is attempting to find a company that will save the district money on its liability coverage. An application was filled out and sent to Cincinnati Insurance for a quote.

Steigely reported that the holding site used for the Phase 1 dredging project will not be able to be reclaimed until July. This means that the land owner will not be able to plant a crop this year and the district will have to reimburse him for the loss. It was also reported that Phase 2 of the dredging project is moving forward. A request for bids will be sent out to a more extensive list of dredgers than was received from J. F. New's office.

Director Gerald Porter reported that because of the high cost estimate received for the dry hydrant plan (\$21,300), it will have to be put on hold until funding can be found.

Director Kathy Fisher reported that thee members of the board interviewed Paul Bradley to fill the position of inspector for the home connections. They were very impressed with him and suggest that the district sign a contract with him. Paul was taken to the office of AirVac to see what would be required and has agreed to accept the position if offered. The funds to pay the inspector will come from the \$75 inspection fee. A motion was made and approved to give Steigely the authority to sign a contract with Bradley when he returns from out-of-town. Steve Fralish gave his monthly activity report for Wightman-Petrie. He stated that things are moving forward and are on schedule. Since the roads were not disturbed, the mess has been reduced to everyone's liking. He stated that it is important to get the inspector for the connections on board ASAP. He went on to say that the district also needs to advertise for a treatment plant

Bills approved for payment included Kamphius Pipeline, \$727,034.33; Thieneman Construction, \$119,112.90; and Wightman-Petrie, \$123,960. The meeting was adjourned at 9:05 p.m. The next meeting will not be on the second Thursday as usual, but will be a joint meeting with the Lake Bruce Association's annual meeting on Saturday, July 12, at the Hoosier Hide-a-way. The meeting will follow a carry-in luncheon which starts at 11:30 a.m. Meetings are open to all freeholders and

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interested parties.

The number of U.S. homeowners swept up in the housing crisis rose further last in May, with foreclosure filings up nearly 50 percent compared with a year earlier.



In 1999, Lorie Jones Kirkley was tragically taken from her home in Valparaiso and murdered. This was a small community, country girl from Kewanna, a graduate of Caston High School and Purdue University. As a registered nurse, she was always ready to help people. Her death was a shock to her family as well as the community. A bicycle enthusiast, she belonged to a bike club so it was only fitting that a bike tour be organized in her honor. Along with her family and friends, it has become an annual event. Lorie's parents, Bill and Pat Jones, still live in the Kewanna area. They

enjoy going each year and helping with the ride by attending the stations along the way where the bikers stop and rest. Lorie also has several aunts, uncles and cousins in the surrounding area who also pitch in and help.

Last year, Norma Miller of Lucerne, Lois Robinson of Royal Center, Christy Coon, Kewanna, and Amy and Pam Jones of Star City headed out one rainy Saturday for Chesterton to participate in the ride for Lorie. Before making the drive, pledges were received from many merchants and friends to the tune of \$610. Those pledges kept the ladies focused on their task. Meals are provided as part of the registration for the tour, along with a T-shirt. There are bike trails for all levels of skill for people to enjoy. Each year, a different non-profit organization receives the money generated by the ride. The organizations have all been close to Lorie's profession with this year's bike

tour proceeds going to the Visiting Nurses Association of Porter County. The ride this year will be June 22 and will once again be in Chesterton.
