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Caston students return to classes, August 13

The 2008-2009 school year begins Wednesday, August 13 for all students, K-12, attending the Caston Corporation Schools. Classes for elementary students begin at 8:30 a.m. and end at 3:17 p.m. Junior-senior high classes begin at 8:28 a.m. and end at 3:20 p.m. (Professional early release days will be Oct. 10, Nov. 5, Dec. 11, Jan. 20 and Feb. 25 and May 8. Students will be dismissed at 12:50 p.m. on these days.)

All corporation buses will run on Wednesday, August 13. Drivers plan their routes to arrive at school by 8:25 a.m.

Students enrolling in kindergarten must be five (5) years old and students enrolling in the first grade must be six (6) years old on or before August 1, 2008. Parents need to provide certification from a physician that their child has been properly immunized and also they need to present a valid birth certificate if these have not previously been provided to the school. Effective July 1, 1999, the immunization list must also include hepatitis B.

Students in grades K-6 who are new students or did not enroll by mail may do so at the Caston Elementary office beginning Monday, August 4, through Wednesday, August 6. Hours are the same as listed below for the junior-senior high school enrollment.

Students in grades seven (7) through twelve (12) will enroll at the Guidance Office on the following schedule:

Monday, August 4 - all students (including new students), 9 to 11:30 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m.

Tuesday, August 5 - all students, 12:01 to 3:30 p.m. and 5 to

Wednesday, August 8 - all students, 9 to 11:30 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m.

Seventh grade orientation will be held at 7 p.m. Tuesday, August 5, in the cafeteria.

Book rental fees will be: kindergarten, \$70; Grade 1, \$99; Grade 2, \$100; Grade 3, \$105; Grade 4, \$95; Grade 5, \$100; Grade and 6, \$92; and Grades 7 and 8, \$120. Fees for grades 9-12 vary depending on classes taken. Rental fees are to be paid prior to the first day of school.

All students are to pay fees at the Bookstore beginning Monday, August 4, through Wednesday, August 6. The hours are 9 to

11:30 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m. on Monday and Wednesday and 12:01 to 3 p.m. and 5 to 6:45 p.m. Tuesday.

Lunches will be served beginning Wednesday, August 13. For students in grades K-6, the cost is \$1.70 per meal; students in grades 7-12 will pay \$1.85 per meal. Adults will pay \$2.50. Breakfast is served each morning for students who choose to participate. The cost is \$1.25 per meal for students and \$1.50 for adults. Each student will establish a renewable lunch account for meal fees. Meal fees may be credited to the student account weekly, monthly, six or nine week, semiannual or annual payments. Some students may be eligible for reduced lunch fees based on the guidelines listed below. Applications for this assistance will be available in the bookstore.

Students attending vocational education at the Century Career Center will begin Wednesday, August 13, and special education classes in Logansport will begin on Tuesday, August 12. Century Career Center students will attend classes at Caston in the morning and will then be transported to Logansport after lunch. Special education students will be picked up at their homes by the special education bus (No. 041) and will be transported directly Logansport to arrive there at approximately 8 a.m. Century Career Center students will be transported back to Caston at approximately 3:15. The special education students will be transported directly to their homes. Fees for Century Career Center and special education students attending Logansport schools are payable to the respective schools they attend.

The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 restricts the release of most information about students and restricts the availability of student records. Only directory information may be made public with parental consent. Directory information includes student names, parent's names, addresses and telephone numbers. If you do not want such information released, please request this by notifying the respective principals. By Indiana statute, Armed Forces recruiting representatives are allowed access to directory information.

beginnings in 1849 when Elder James Babcock, who lived near Rochester, learned of several persons of the Baptist faith in the vicinity of Pleasant Grove (Kewanna) who had no place of public worship. Elder Babcock visited them and conducted services in the home of one of the members. The group later met in a school house four miles northeast of town.

In May, 1851, there was a sufficient number of members to organize a local church so they adopted a set of Articles of Faith and a covenant agreement and called the church, The Little Flock Church. Services were conducted once a month in the

The congregation changed its worship location from Carter school to the Davis or Jackson school in 1857. The years 1858 to 1868 were trying years for the church due to the Civil War. The present structure was built in

Town council conducts July session

The Kewanna town council met Thursday evening, July 3, in regular session.

The first item of business was the June fire department report shared by Tony Pesaresi. He that the department noted responded to two town and three township calls, all medical, and two mutual aid requests during the month of June. He also noted that it is critical to the department's ISO rating that all fire hydrants be tested and documented.

Town marshal Dennis Price submitted his monthly report which revealed six traffic warnings, six criminal arrests (four adults and two juveniles). 52 calls answered and 1,530 miles patrolled. He also had information on two properties facing court-ordered clean-up.

Resolutions pertaining to tax abatement for upgrades to equipment at Winamac Coil Spring, Inc. were approved. The company will be adding a multi axis coiler, software upgrade, tempering furnace, shot peen tumble blast machine, new racks, electric picker and upgrades to the electric at Plant No. 2. Five additional employees will he required when improvements are completed.

Pam Hageman of RCAP introduced the Good Start Project to the council, noting the positive feedback they have received. At the present, the council is focusing on the Rural Health Clinic but is interested in what the Good Start Project could do for the community.

Signage regulating the use of compression brakes within the town limits was discussed.

Applications for summer mowing help were reviewed. Interviews will be scheduled.

The town's tree ordinance is being reviewed for a possible amendment.

Guidelines in place for adjusting water and sewage bills were reviewed and re-approved.

The town superintendent's report noted that the fluoride treatment equipment at both well houses has been inspected and approved.

The town has received a letter from EPA confirming that its system has been granted a 40/30 waiver from the Initial Distribution System Evaluation Requirements under the Stage 2 Disinfectants and Disinfection Byproducts Rule. This will cut back on a few samples a year for water testing.

Two rubber mounts which holds the radiator in place were replaced on the town mower.

Three loads of dirt were hauled to the park to fill in the ruts from the tile project. The dirt will be tilled and leveled.

The street department spent several days cleaning up after a wind/rain storm, including a power outage.
