Governor Daniels speaks at annual Lincoln Day dinner

Fulton County Republicans gathered last Wednesday, July 23, at the Fulton County Historical Society Museum for their annual Lincoln Day Dinner. The guest speaker for the evening was Governor Mitch Daniels.

The governor displayed several maps depicting the Hoosier state's status in several categories including: one of four states boasting the best tax climate in the United States; one of four states with the best cost of doing business in the U.S.; one of eight states rated high by CEOs of America for confidence in the business climate; one of three states with a Standard and Poor's AAA business rating; ranked in the top group by the Index of Economic Impact; and one of the top three states in attracting new jobs and investment. He also noted that Indiana is operating in the black while 32 states are facing budget deficits.

According to a recently released study, patients with early Alzheimer's disease who exercised regularly saw less deterioration in the areas of the brain which control memory.

Tri State University at Angola will officially become Trine University tomorrow (Friday).

Downtown Rochester is now listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Owners of properties in the district can now qualify for grants, tax credits and other financial incentives to preserve their properties.

Chrysler reported last week that its financial arm will get out of the auto leasing business by the end of the month because economic conditions have made leasing more expensive than buying for both consumers and the company.

According to data released last Friday, the number of homeowners facing foreclosure more than doubled in the second quarter of this year, compared to a year ago.

Congress passed a mortgage relief bill last Saturday that will let homeowners who cannot afford their house payments refinance into more affordable government-backed loans rather than lose their homes.

The IU Simon Cancer Center in Indianapolis will open officially in August. The new \$150 million cancer center is one of only 63 designated cancer centers nationwide and the only one in Indiana.

Waggoner ends term as board chairman

Ted A. Waggoner of Rochester completed his term as chairman of the Board of Trustees of Eureka College, Eureka, Illinois, on June 30. Waggoner, an attorney and partner at Peterson & Waggoner LLP, Rochester, served as chairman the last two years, during which the college saw record enrollment growth and significant financial growth. Waggoner is now serving his last year of a six-year term that ends in May 2009.

During Waggoner's tenure, the college saw two straight years of record enrollment growth and the addition of new programs, including lifelong learning programs like special education certification and organizational leadership degree completion cohorts. Retention rates soared and the overall quality of the student body increased as reflected in higher GPAs for entering freshmen and higher overall average ACT scores. The college is poised for a third consecutive record enrollment this fall, with an estimated 700 students enrolled for classes that begin August 27.

In addition, Eureka College achieved two consecutive years of positive financial results under Waggoner's leadership. In addition to strong financial operating results, multiple capital projects were completed, including construction of a 1,800 square-foot wellness center, construction of a soccer complex, improvements to the football stadium and a \$2.1 million renovation and addition to the Dickinson Commons dining facility.

Waggoner attributes the successes of the past two years to the administration of college president Dr. J. David Arnold and his senior staff, to the efforts of the faculty and staff of the college, and to the members of the Board of Trustees who have devoted their time, talents and resources to continuing the improvements at Eureka College.

Eureka College was chartered in 1855. It offers academic degrees in a wide area of the sciences, mathematics, business administration, social sciences, fine and performing arts, humanities and education. The college is affiliated with the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). Waggoner is vice moderator of the Christian Church in Indiana.

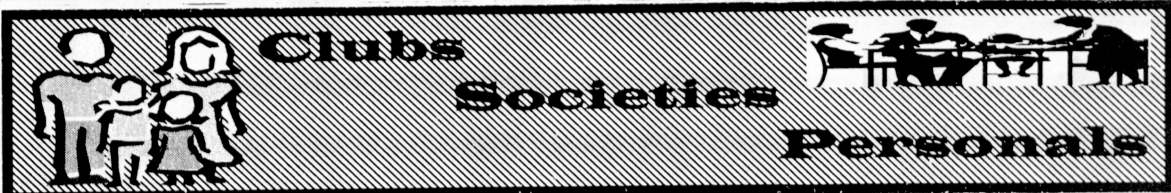

Taxpayers appearing at the hearing shall have an opportunity to be heard.
