



The Lake Bruce Conservancy District board of directors met in regular session Thursday, August 14, in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station. Four directors and 11 freeholders were in attendance.

The minutes of the previous meeting were unanimously approved as was the treasurer's report. Gerald Porter, vice chairman, covered the correspondence received during the month.

It was noted that all discharge reports have been sent to IDEM and the board has received its officers' liability insurance. Also received was a letter from the County Auditor Fulton scheduling the review of the district's proposed budget on August 19.

Reports were given on past and current dredging programs. Tennant Dredging has started reclaiming the sediment basin as part of the Dredging Project Phase 1, but lost a track on his equipment. Only two bids were received for the Phase 2 Dredging Project. Two other dredging companies declined to submit bids. One was too busy and the other said their equipment would not handle the lily pad roots. The bids received were from DTI Technologies in the amount of \$108,147.25 and All Things Water for \$165,000. The board voted to award the contract to DTI Technologies. The board has been informed that their work load is behind schedule and dredging may not take place until next year. A freeholder in attendance asked that the dredger cut into the banks and widen the dredging. channels while However, the district's permit does not allow it to widen the channel, only to take out sediment.

A report was given on problems with the district's Website. No one has heard from the Website director, to see if the problem has been corrected so updates can resume. The director may have left the company in early August and Chairman Norm Steigely has not had time to attempt the updates. Another contractor wishing to do hookups was introduced. His name is Lynn Nelson who has offices in Rochester and has been in business for 38 years. He has had experience connecting to the Air Vac system, which is being used at Lake Bruce. Mr. Nelson handed out his business cards to those present.

awarding a contract at the next regular meeting in September. More resumes may yet be received. Fralish also reported that all pipe has been laid, valve pits are now in place and the treatment plant and vacuum stations are once again on schedule for late October completion. He also reported that a bill has been turned in for cost of work at the contamination site in the amount of \$18,000.

Gerald Porter gave the Lake Enhancement report. The lake has been completely treated as Weed Patrol returned and touched up any areas that were missed by the first treatment. He thanked the Lake Bruce Association for its help in covering the cost of the algae treatment. He also once again reported that all state grants for weed control have dried up and it will result in a loss of approximately \$19,000, which will have to be made up by the tax base.

The directors went through the permit check list and determined that some changes needed to be made to make sure it was in line with the sewer ordinance. This will be done and approved at the next regular meeting.

It was announced that the district is in the process of

scheduling a training session at the Air Vac office in early September to help the contractors for making sewer connections know exactly what will be expected of them. Many of the contractors are holding off doing any bidding until they are sure of the requirements.

The treasurer, Rick Tompos, gave a report on sewer bill collections. It was noted that 26 billings are over 120 days late and three are over 90 days late at the present time.

Tompos also proposed a resolution to move monies between categories in the current budget, which was unanimously approved. A proposal was also made and approved to set the mileage reimbursement rate to coincide with the IRS rate, which is currently 58.5 cents per mile.
