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NIPSCO ANNOUNCES GAS COST ADJUSTMENT FOR SEPTEMBER

MERRILLVILLE, Ind. -Northern Indiana Public Service Company (NIPSCO) announced today that natural gas costs for September 2008 decreased compared to last month, due mainly to a decrease in wholesale natural gas prices as compared to the previous month. NIPSCO residential customers will see a decrease in natural gas costs of 25.79 percent when compared to August 2008. The Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission (IURC) approved the adjustment subject to refund.

A typical NIPSCO residential customer using 50 therms of natural gas should expect a decrease of approximately \$25.34 from last month's statement in their

New this year at the festival will be D3 Fife & Drum from Detroit, Michigan; Ben Franklin portrayed by Chuck Molenda of Carpentersville, Illinois; Marsha Glassburn, Rochester – storytelling; Thistle Mountain of Leo – dulcimer music; and author John McMullen of Evansville, author of *The Last Blackrobe of Indiana.*

The public is invited to join in the Indian dances at 2 p.m. and 3:30 p.m., which are held in an arena encircled by teepees. The drum will be Massassagan Drum led by Mike Floyd, chief of the Eel River Tribe. Head dancers will be Glenn and Beverly Barnhill of Bloomington. Beverly is a member of the Prairie Band Potawatomi and Glenn is Lakota. George Godfrey of Athens, Illinois, member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, will act as emcee. He is president of the Potawatomi Trail of Death Association and has been dancing at the Trail of Courage since 1988. Godfrey had an ancestor on the 1838 Trail of Death.

The Trail of Courage includes historic encampments representing the French and Indian War, Voyageurs, Revolutionary War, War of 1812, Western Fur Trade, Plains Indian teepees, and a Woodland Indian wigwam village. A special re-creation of a Miami Village includes wigwams and life ways demonstrations such as making cattail mats. There is also a re-creation of Chippeway, the first trading post, post office and village in Fulton County in 1832. Food purveyors and traditional craftsmen set up in wooden booths to demonstrate and sell their wares. Craftsmen also sell pre-1840 trade goods from blankets and in historic merchant tents offering a variety of items from clothing and jewelry to knives and candles, everything needed to live in frontier days. Canoe rides, muzzle loading shooting and tomahawk throwing contests and a frontier blab school add to the frontier activities. Two stages with frontier music and dance present programs from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday. Since the early 1980s, FCHS has received

Both Catholic and Protestant worship services are held at 9 a.m. on Sunday.

Pioneer foods are cooked over wood fires. Visitors can feast on buffalo burgers, chicken and noodles, barbecue, ham and beans, fish and chips cooked in big iron kettles, potato tarts, apple dumplings, corn on the cob, apple sausage, and more, including ice cream, one of George Washington's favorite treats. Local clubs cook and serve these historic foods to fund their projects including the Rochester Rotary, Kappa Delta Phi, Swingin' Dudes Square Dancers, Grass Creek Lions Club and the Fulton County Historical Society. Harvey and Beverly Jackson serve barbecue and sweet potato pie and also exhibit a frontier African-American home. Many people come to the festival just for the delicious food. The grounds are handicap accessible. Free tram rides are available to bring people from the museum, round barn and Living History Village at the north end of the grounds to the festival site. The museum and village are open with costumed hosts and free admission. Volunteers can earn free admission to the Trail of Courage by working half a day. To or for volunteer more information, call the museum at 574-223-4436. Free parking is provided on the FCHS grounds and there are plenty of benches available to sit and rest.

You can step back in time to an entirely different life when frontier Indiana history walked the streets at the 33rd annual Trail of Courage Living History Festival Saturday and Sunday, September 20 and 21 near Rochester. The Potawatomi Indians were marched single file down Rochester's Main Street September 5, 1838, on the forced removal of the Indians from this area, known as the Trail of Death. Since 1976, this festival has honored the American Indians and shown life before the removal when this was still Potawatomi territory.

Frontier Indiana comes alive with foods cooked over wood fires, period music and dance, traditional crafts, historic camps and trading, canoe rides on the river, and much more. The festival is produced by the Fulton County Historical Society. This event combines genealogy of the Potawatomi Indians and the settlers who lived in Fulton County and northern Indiana in the early 1800s with the events. rendezvous stage programs, historic canoe landing and fur trade skit on the Tippecanoe River. The Trail of Courage is staged on the FCHS grounds four miles north of Rochester on U.S. 31. Admission is \$6 for adults, \$2 for children 6-

Dear EarthTalk: Is it true that anti-bacterial soaps are no better at preventing infections than plain soaps and that they are actually harmful to the environment?-- Avery Bicks, New York, NY

University of Michigan researchers reviewed numerous studies conducted between 1980 and 2006 and concluded that antibacterial soaps that contain triclosan as the main active ingredient are no better at preventing infections than plain soaps. Further, the team argued

that these antibacterial soaps could actually pose a health risk. because they may kill beneficial bacteria and also reduce the effectiveness of some common antibiotics, such as amoxicillin. The study was published in the August 2007 issue of the peer-

Infectious Diseases. These findings concur with earlier research conducted by Tufts University's Alliance for the Prudent Use of Antibiotics. The Tufts study concluded that overuse of triclosan could cause new strains of bacteria to develop, thus "changing the kind of bacteria in our houses to those that may actually be harmful or resistant to antibiotics..." said Tufts' Dr. Stuart Levy.

According to the non-profit Beyond Pesticides, group laboratory studies have found a number of different strains of mutated bacteria that are resistant to triclosan and to certain antibiotics. The organization also of triclosan reports cites converting into a carcinogenic

class of chemicals known as dioxins when exposed to water and ultraviolet radiation. Besides cancer, dioxins have been linked to weakening of the human immune system, decreased fertility, altered sex hormones and birth defects.

If antibacterial hand soap is not effective at reducing infections, consumers may wonder about whether alcohol-based hand sanitizers may do a better job. Combing through different studies on the topic yields mixed conclusions. According to one study conducted at Colorado State University, alcohol-based hand sanitizers were as much as twice as effective as either regular soap or antibacterial soap at reducing germs on human hands.


A Purdue University study, contradicts however, these findings, concluding that while alcohol-based hand sanitizers may kill more germs than plain or triclosan-based soaps, they do not prevent more infections that make people sick. Instead they may kill the human body's own beneficial bacteria by stripping the skin of its outer layer of oil.

The best advice might just come from a study published in the journal Dairy, Food and Environmental Sanitation back in 1998, which concluded that washing hands thoroughly for 20

seconds or more with plain soap and warm water is by far the most effective way to reduce harmful bacteria, and as such remains our best defense against getting sick. **CONTACTS:** Clinical Infectious Diseases,
