Fulton Methodist hosting 18th annual bazaar



The signs are being erected by the county and city highway departments. They will hopefully be up by Sept. 22 when the Trail Death Commemorative of Caravan will start out on its 660 mile trek to travel the original route from north central Indiana eastern Kansas. 




