Kewanna resident Former Thomas Overmyer has been named Alumnus of the Year at Huntington College. announcement of the award was made by Margaret Roush, director of alumni relations, during homecoming ceremonies October 4. Other honorees included Christian Elden, Young Alumnus of the Year; and Bradley and Vanessa Johnson, who received the university's Distinguished Alumni citation.

Overmyer, a 1971 graduate, is the founder and president of Prescience, Inc., a consultant business for the tech/pharmaceutical industry in Barrington, Illinois. He was lauded for his contribution to the pharmaceutical breakthroughs and the positive way he has represented his alma mater.

Overmyer has worked with several significant pharmaceutical breakthroughs. At Upjohn Company, included these Tolinase, Orinase, and Micronase, the leading drugs to treat diabetes at that time. At Glaxo Pharmaceuticals, he served as the product manager for Zantac, the first billion-dollar pharmaceutical product, and another blockbuster drug called Zofran used to treat nausea and associated vomiting chemotherapy. While at Bristol-Myers Squibb, he trademarked Taxol, the leading anti-cancer agent in the world. In addition, during his time at Nycomed-Amersham, he worked with the radioactive systemic pharmaceutical product called Metastron, used to treat the

Leaders Amanda Kistler and Cindy Gudas announced that the



## Simple Steps to Prevent Colds & other Catchy Illnesses







#### Division of Aging Urges TV Viewers to Prepare for Digital Transition

The Family and Social Services Administration's (FSSA) Division of Aging advises Hoosiers to begin preparing for the conversion to digital television (DTV). Currently, stations are broadcasting in digital and analog. However, after February 17, 2009, full-power television stations will broadcast in digital only. The DTV transition will affect those who watch free over-the-air television (through a rooftop antenna or "rabbit ears"). Those whose TVs contain digital tuners should be able to view digital over-the-air programming without the need for a digital-to-analog converter box.

"We want to encourage everyone to be ready for the DTV transition taking place on February 17, 2009," said Aging Director Megan Ornellas. "Before the switchover, it is important to ensure that your TV is digital-compatible to allow yourself time to purchase and install a converter box if it is not."

To assist consumers with this transition, a Digital-to-Analog Converter Box Coupon Program has been established. The program will be administered by the Department of Commerce's National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA). Every U. S. household is eligible to receive two coupons, worth \$40 each, toward the purchase of eligible digital-to-analog con-

verter boxes. Converter boxes are expected to cost between \$40 and \$70 each. It may take up to 12 weeks to receive the coupons, which expire 90 days after being mailed.

Digital broadcasting allows stations to offer improved picture and sound quality, in addition to multicasting, which enables several channels of programming to be offered at the same time. DTV will provide interactive video and data services that are not possible with analog technology and will provide consumers with more advanced wireless services. Another important benefit of the DTV transition is that it will free up valuable parts of the broadcast spectrum for public safety communications, such as police, fire departments, and rescue squads.

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## New conservation incentives

USDA has announced that additional payment incentives are being provided through the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) to agricultural producers to encourage enhanced wetland and bottomland hardwood conservation. Included are practice, signing and soil rental rate incentives.

The 2007 Farm Bill provides \$25 billion to help states, communities, farmers and ranchers practice conservation. USDA conservation programs help reduce nutrient runoff, control erosion and sedimentation, protect and restore wetlands, enhance wildlife carbon, habitat, sequester improve air quality, manage livestock waste, and preserve farm and ranch land.

USDA estimates that in 2007, CRP in the Mississippi River Basin reduced nitrogen runoff by 295 million pounds, reduced phosphorus runoff by 66 million pounds and reduced sedimentation by 100 million tons. In addition, the program practices protected and restored 1.2 million acres of wetlands, sequestered 12 million metric tons of carbon dioxide and enhanced wildlife habitat for migratory waterfowl and other important wildlife species such as the Louisiana black bear.

Wetlands conservation is a prominent feature of the CRP. The CRP includes general sign up, continuous sign Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) and Farmable Wetlands Program (FWP). These initiatives target wetland restoration bottomland timber establishment. Incentives are being added to encourage additional producer interest in these initiatives and are available for the CP23 Floodplain Wetlands Restoration, CP23A Non-floodplain Wetlands Restoration, CP31 Bottomland Establishment Timber Wetlands, and CP37 Duck Nesting Habitat practices.

FSA county offices take offers for these CRP practices on a continuous signup basis, and the offers are automatically accepted provided the acreage producer meet certain eligibility requirements. Under farmers and ranchers enroll eligible land in 10- to 15- year contracts with the CCC. FSA administers CRP on behalf of CCC. Participants plant appropriate cover such as grasses and trees in crop fields and along water bodies. These plantings help prevent soil and nutrients from running into regional waterways and affecting water quality. In addition to conserving soil and protecting water quality, the long-term vegetative cover also enhances wildlife habitat. It is estimated that CRP created habitat that led to a 30 percent increase in duck production in the prairie pothole region of the

country.

CRP participants receive annual rental payments - generally based on weighted average dry-land cash rent and practice maintenance - plus up to 50 percent cost share to establish and manage conservation practices on the enrolled land. In addition, CRP participants restoring wetlands, establishing bottomland hardwood forests and creating duck nesting habitat can now receive a practice incentive payment (PIP) equal to 40 percent of the cost of installing the practice. A signing incentive payment (SIP) of \$100 per acre is made after the contract is approved. A soil rental rate incentive equal to 20 percent of the weighted average soil rental rate will be added to the annual rental payment.

#### Deer present unique challenges to area drivers

The high season for car crashes with deer is October through December. Each year, they account for more than 150 human and nearly one and a half million deer fatalities. Experts attribute the problem to the combination of deer mating and migration habits and shortened daylight hours.

Here are a few basic cautions for drivers:

Scan a wide swath of the roadside. Slow down when approaching a deer standing near the side of a road and be prepared. If startled, the deer can bolt onto the road and into your path. If necessary, honk your horn and flash your lights to try to scare it away.

Be alert for more deer than you may see at the moment. Where there is one deer, there are often more nearby.

In many instances, it is best not to swerve around the deer since the deer may move in the same direction. You may also inadvertently hit another vehicle, or go off onto a dangerous shoulder. Unless certain of those road factors, it is often best to simply brake and continue in your lane of traffic.

Be particularly careful at dawn and dusk and when driving either over a hill or around a curve, where visibility is limited. Use your high beans to give you a greater area of visibility and allow you to see the deer's eyes sooner.

Deer whistles or ultrasonic deer avoidance systems attached to vehicles have never been proven to work by independent studies and may give drivers a false sense of security.

Take deer crossing signs seriously, particularly those installed specifically for this time of year. Be particularly cautious in wooded and agricultural areas where there is little distance between the road and the woods or fields.

Questions & Answers About Our Environment

Dear EarthTalk: I just read an article that said air fresheners contain chemicals that can cause health problems when inhaled. Are scented candles any better? --

Leanne Chacksfield, Cincinnati, OH Like most air fresheners, many scented candles contain and release phthalates, potentially harmful chemicals that have been linked to the disruption of hormonal systems and other health problems in people exposed to them. Burning candles can also emit small amounts of acetaldehyde, formaldehyde and naphthalene, organic chemicals that are also potentially harmful and that can leave nasty black soot deposits on floors and other surfaces.

According to Pamela Lundquist of the nonprofit Children's Health Coalition Environmental (CHEC), this black soot deposit "is primarily made up of elemental carbon, but may also contain phthalates and volatile organic compounds like benzene and toluene, which can cause cancer and neurological damage."

Children can easily ingest these

chemicals if their hands have been wandering and end up in their mouths. The chemicals can lodge deep in the lungs, disrupting the lower respiratory exacerbating existing problems like asthma, and potentially causing other longer term breathing problems.

Despite laws against it, many candlewicks still contain lead, long linked to impaired learning and brain damage in children. Lead dispersed from burning candles can be breathed in and also constitute part of the dreaded black soot deposit. Candles with lead-containing wicks are on the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission ban/recall list now (thanks to efforts by nonprofits like U.S. Public Interest Research Group (PIRG), but many are still out there on store shelves. Consumers can avoid them by sticking to candles with soft cotton wicks, not stiff, metal ones.

Eco-conscious candle burners should also avoid paraffin-based candles, which are made from waxes derived in the process of refining crude oil and literally consist of fossil-fuel generating hydrocarbons. Unfortunately, the vast majority of commercially available candles are made from though paraffin, many alternatives are now available.

Soy-based candles are a popular choice, as they are made from

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plant waste and emit less soot than the paraffin variety. Beeswax candles are another nice alternative, as well, especially if you can pick them up at a local farmers' market. For scented or aromatherapy candles, look for varieties that use only pure plant essential oils instead of synthetic chemicals with unintelligible names.
