

The Lake Bruce Conservancy District held its regular monthly meeting Thursday, December 11, in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station. All five directors were present as well as 10 freeholders of the district and one guest.

The minutes of the previous unanimously meetings was approved, as was the treasurer's report. Vice chairman, Gerald the covered Porter, correspondence received during the past month.

Norm Steigely Chairman reported that since the bid for dredging was not complete, the low bidder, DTI, would calculate the cost of reclaiming the holding site. It is hoped that this will be done by the first of the year. The next lowest bidder, All Things Water, will also be submitting another bid. These bids will be looked at once again to determine who will be awarded the work.

It was revealed that the landscaping proposed for around the treatment plant and the east vac station will be put off until spring.

Richard Denny, the new treatment plant operator, reported that he is working with the contractor on replacing a seal needed to fix a leak at the plant. He also went on to say that everything is moving along very well at the plant. Fourteen homes are now hooked up to the system and flow has finally started.

Gerald Porter reported that the LARE application for 2009 has been sent in, but success in receiving a grant is very doubtful. The weed permit for 2009 has also been sent in. Mr. Porter also went over some of the options for treatment in the coming year, but the course followed will depend on access to funding. This will not be determined until grants are announced in March. It was brought to the board's attention that damage to the grounds has occurred at the west vac station. Although adjacent landowners were notified to keep vehicles off the property, a semi truck has been parked on the property and has torn up recently seeded areas. The sheriff has been called and the situation is currently under investigation. The board will look into the cost of fencing the area and putting up signs.

application fee is in place and will allow a maximum of two inspections. In reality, the inspector should be called out only once, when all the pipe has been laid and prior to connection. The board determined that if a contractor requires more than two inspections, the contractor would be charged a \$50 fee for each additional inspection.

The subject of contractors meeting the requirements of the sewer connection ordinance was also discussed. The board was informed that some contractors are not meeting the ordinance requirements and resisted efforts by the inspector to make them comply. The board devised a form letter that will go out to any contractor that does not comply with the ordinance. It states that the district will not accept applications for permits from any landowner that is using a contractor whose work does not meet the requirements stated in the ordinance.

Once again, the board wishes to make it clear that a new payment book will come out after December 15 that reflects the full sewer rate of \$73.50. This new December coupon will be due by January 15. The last coupon in the current book for December is \$46.88 and due by January 15 should be discarded.

A resolution was passed to allow the treasurer to move monies from one classification to another, where money is needed, as long as it does not increase the budget. The subject of late charges was discussed and it was determined that the board would hold off on any decision until the billing company has completed investigation on proper its procedures required by state regulation. This is the last meeting at which Norm Steigely will act as secretary. He is the only secretary the district has ever had. Kathy Fisher will assume these duties the first of the year. The board also approved the purchase of office equipment that was formerly supplied by Norm.

Fulton County residents face higher taxes

The Fulton County Council voted 5-1 Tuesday, December 9, to institute two local option income taxes that is expected to raise \$1.62 million in 2009.

Half of the money raised will go into the county's general fund. The other half will go toward public safety expenses, including \$500,000 to help fund the Fulton County Emergency Medical Service. The City of Rochester and the towns of Akron, Fulton and Kewanna will share the rest of the public safety money.





EYE RESEARCH DEVELOPMENTS **V.I.P. TOPIC**

The December Christmas party meeting of the Visually Impaired Persons (V.I.P.) featured Dr. Cowley, local Dennis optometrist. He presented data regarding the ongoing studies of vision problems, which offer hope to people with vision issues.

Most importantly, the progress in gene therapy has been dramatic, Dr. Cowley reported. Three different research teams experimenting with mice reported successful treatment of good genes replacing diseased retinal genes. While human therapy is several years away, the studies are offering hope.

Dr. Cowley described a contact lens being developed that can monitor eye pressure for glaucoma patients. It is hoped that eventually the lens could release even needed medication.

He brought with him a variety magnifiers of hand-held including a tiny credit card size, which can be carried in a pocket or purse. That item would be particularly handy to use for menus, telephone books, etc. Of great interest was a new type of cell phone that can scan printed material, and then read it aloud to the visually impaired person.

At monthly V.I.P. gatherings, knowledgeable individuals provide support and services to the visually impaired by sharing valuable information and data with those in attendance. Not only does the group discuss serious subjects, they also provide encouragement, fun and laughter.

To further those goals, member Anna Mae Carnett, (Winamac), donated many novels on cassette tapes, which will provide a lending library service for members.

Electronics scam targeting American consumers

The Better Business Bureau of Northern Indiana is warning consumers of a number of websites purportedly selling personal electronics, but failing to deliver the product after receiving payment by wire transfer.


The outfit, most recently operating as Qbelam.com and Circuitown.com, advertises a variety of personal electronics including PS3s and laptop computers at discounted rates, and the website gives a number of options available for payment. However, when interested parties try to check out, they are sent a message stating that the only available method of payment is wire transfer.

"Anytime you're being asked to pay for something by a wire transfer service, that should be a huge red flag," said Michael Coil, President/CEO of Northern Indiana. "Once money has been sent, there's no way to get it back - using a credit card to pay for items online provides a great deal more security." +++







Dr. Sheedy grew up in Chicago and played basketball for the University of





dollars, we should remember the last several billion that we gave the industry, and the outcome of it. In the 1990s, the Partnership for a New Generation of Vehicles worked to make 80+ miles per gallon cars and allowed for communications amongst scientists between the big three auto makers to help speed the process along.

The Partnership was a huge success, with three 70+ miles per gallon prototypes. General Motors had the Precept, a 5-seat sedan with ample trunk space, with one version getting 108 miles per gallon equivalent running on hydrogen. Ford had the Prodigy getting 72-miles-per gallon, and Daimler-Chrysler also had a 72-miles-per gallon vehicle. Taxpayers were proud that their billions were not wasted and expected these vehicles on the market.

But none of the automakers put any of these vehicles into production, or anything similar. Instead, they chose gas-guzzling SUVs, the epitome of stupidity from a climate change and energy conservation perspective. Using slick ads to push their behemoth vehicles, the automakers are among the biggest culprits in the fast rise in greenhouse gas emissions in the United States.

What happened to the efficient vehicles? The failure to

incorporate that technology was also a major cause of our economic collapse. With the rise in gas prices this past summer, the values of SUVs plummeted, and for many, their gas-guzzlers are now worth less than the loan they have on them.

Why should we give a bailout now, when the automakers are the ones who put themselves into the crisis they are in through their own idiocy? Why don't they dust off these efficient vehicles and put them into production, something both our wallets and our planet could have used a decade ago?

They say those who forget history are bound to repeat it. After the foolish follies of the auto industries, in pushing guzzlers on the American public (along with tax breaks that they manipulated through Congress), why should we bail them out?

What we need is the massive investment in mass transit and high-speed passenger rail: a much better way to travel with exponential fuel savings compared to the most efficient vehicles.

Farm Bureau says proposed tax caps unfair

Farmers need to explain to legislators why a proposed cap on property taxes is bad public policy, according to Indiana Farm Bureau president, Don Villwock.

"I don't know what more I can say or do to get you motivated enough - no, make that angry enough - to call your state legislators," Villwock said. speaking at the IFB convention during his annual address to members. "We need to let them know we think it is extremely unfair to treat classes or property taxpayers differently."

Villwock was referring to a proposed constitutional amendment that would eventually cap taxes on homesteads at 1 percent of assessed value, farmland and rental property at 2 percent of assessed value, and business property and personal property at 3 percent.

"I ask you, why is a \$200,000 house any different than a \$200,000 piece of farmland?" Villwock said. "Why should homeowners, who demand all of the local services that are paid for by our property taxes, get all of the relief? They are the ones using all these services." "Meanwhile," Villwock said, "our bare farmland, which requires few if any services, gets no relief?'


"Remind your representative or senator that the property tax amending it into our state Constitution?"

Villwock also talked about how important it is for farmers to remember that all of agriculture needs to stand up for each other.

While making sure your vehicle is ready for winter driving might not sound like a healthcare issue, anything with the potential of affecting your life and health is a concern.


Pulaski Memorial Hospital encourages drivers to follow this information for the safety and well being of you and the family.

Necessary Equipment

- A properly inflated spare tire. wheel wrench and tripod-type jack
- Shovel
- Jumper cables
- Yow and tire chains A bag of salt or cat litter .
- Tool kit **Essential Supplies**
 - Working flashlight and extra batteries
 - Reflective triangles and brightly-color cloth
 - Compass First aid kit
 - Exterior windshield cleaner
 - Ice scraper and snow brush
 - Wooden stick matches in a waterproof container
 - Scissors and string / cord
 - Non-perishable, high energy foods like unsalted canned nuts, dried fruits and hard candy

If you become stranded

- Do not leave your car unless you know exactly where your are, how far it is to possible help, and are certain you will improve your situation.
- To attract attention, light two flares and place one at each end of the car a safe distance away. Hang a brightly colored cloth from your antenna.
- If you are sure the car's exhaust pipe is not blocked, run the engine and heater for about 10 minutes every hour or so depending upon the amount of gas in the tank.
- Keep at least one window open slightly. Heavy snow and ice can seal a car shut.
- Eat a hard candy to keep your mouth moist.

Severe Weather Preparation

The Indiana Department of Homeland Security is issuing the following information in preparation for expected severe weather.

Hazardous driving conditions due to snow and ice on highways and bridges lead to many traffic accidents, which is a leading cause of death during winter storms. Another primary cause of death is exposure.

Winter-Related Health Risks

§ People, pets, and livestock are susceptible to frostbite and hypothermia during winter storms.

§ Those at risk are primarily either engaged in outdoor activity (shoveling snow, digging out vehicles, or assisting stranded motorists), or are the elderly or very young.

§ Citizens' use of generators, kerosene heaters and alternative forms of heating may create other hazards such as fires and carbon monoxide poisoning. **Prepare a winter emergency**

kit for your vehicle. Supplies should include:

- At least two blankets or a sleeping bag
- Flashlight or batterypowered lantern and extra batteries
- Booster (jumper) cables
- Emergency flares
 Extra clothing, particularly boots, hats
 - and mittensA steel shovel and rope to use as a lifeline
- Bottled water or juice and nonperishable high-energy foods (granola bars, raisins, nuts, peanut butter or cheese crackers)
- First-aid kit and

necessary medications

- Sand or non-clumping cat litter for tire traction, if your vehicle gets stuck in snow or ice
- A cell phone and charger which can be adapted to vehicle use.
- Ice scraper and snow brush
- Tire repair kit and pump
- Winter Driving Tips:

§ If you can avoid driving or take public transportation, please do so.

§ Pay attention to weather reports on the radio. Allow time in your schedule for bad weather and/or traffic delays.
§ Keep spare window washer

fluid in the trunk and make sure the wiper blades are in good working condition

§ Become familiar with your vehicle's winter weather operating characteristics. Frontwheel-drive vehicles generally handle better than rear-wheel vehicles on slippery roads because the weight of the engine is on the drive wheels, improving traction.

§ Keep your windows clear of snow and ice. Remember to clean head, tail and brake lights.
§ If you need to turn on your wipers, you need to turn on your headlights.

§ Bridges become slick and icy before roads. Bridge temperatures can be five to six degrees colder than roadways, so drive with extreme caution during freezing temperatures. § Keep your gas tank at least half full. Fill the tank before you park for lengthy periods. This will help prevent fuel line freeze-up. For more information, go to www.in.gov/dhs.


