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

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The Lake Bruce Conservancy District held its monthly meeting Thursday, January 11, in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station. Three of the five directors and six freeholders were present.

The minutes of the December meeting and the treasurer's report were read and approved.

Chairman Norm Steigely covered correspondence received by the district during the month.

He reported that the dredging continues to fall behind schedule because the rain has once again caused a delay in using the 10-acre holding area. The problem is that the holding walls are muddy and are not strong enough to hold the spoils at this time.

The dredging company is planning on starting work sometime in February and dredging will take five to six weeks. The dredging permit will not allow work from April 15 until July to allow the fish to spawn. If the dredging is not completed by April 15, it will have to be finished after the July date.

The permit for weed control in the dredging areas for 2007 has been applied for as well as a LARE grant application for the west side of the lake, or phase 2, which the district is planning for this fall, if it is awarded the grant. The anticipated cost of phase 2 is \$99,000, which requires 25% matching funds from the conservancy district.

The district has also applied for a weed control permit for spraying the lake in 2007. The district has also applied for a LARE grant to cover 90% of the anticipated cost of \$18,000 for spraying and \$6,500 in required studies.

All reports from the district's engineers state that it is moving forward with the sewer project as planned. The purchase of the properties needed for the two vacuum stations needs to be consummated. An agreement for the site on the east side of the lake is in the last stages of the closing process. The railroad property is still in the hands of the district's attorney as ownership of that property must be cleared up before the purchase can move forward.

A reprint from the JF New Newsletter about problems with nuisance geese was available in hand-out form. The article explained the successes they have had using cardboard coyote decoys to keep geese away. Anyone wanting information on this may contact any director.

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
## Community/ Superintendent Scholarship Available


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## Indiana Young Farmers Score High

**Annual School Performance Reports**

By Dr. Suellen Reed, Superintendent of Public Instruction

Nothing is more essential to Indiana's future than a quality education for all Hoosier students. This reality has placed increased scrutiny on our schools' efforts to raise student achievement.

With the level of performance data that is available today, we have a better understanding of the strengths and weaknesses in our K-12 education system than ever before. Though undoubtedly more work must be done to tailor instruction and support to meet the needs of each student, clearly schools cannot meet this challenge alone.

With that in mind, each year the Indiana Department of Education, local schools and newspapers across the state work together to publish performance "report cards" for every school corporation and school between January 15 and 30. These reports are part of a continuing effort to encourage Hoosiers to become more knowledgeable about the progress of their students and schools.

Each school report features the most recent information available, including test scores, attendance rates, school safety statistics, teacher salaries and dollars spent per student. The reports provide even more information this year with additional data linked to high school graduation, such as the numbers of dropouts, freshmen not earning enough credits to

**General Explanations**

The data in this report have been supplied by the Indiana Department of Education and local school corporations. The report provides the most recent data available.

Indiana educators and citizens have developed higher academic standards for all students. These standards are necessary to prepare Indiana students to be successful in life, whether they go directly to higher education or to the workplace. The scores for ISTEP+ are listed under each school to reflect student progress toward those standards. For high schools, you also will see graduation rates and the percentage of graduates who plan to go on to college.

Other important information is provided, such as average attendance rates and indicators of school safety, including expulsions and suspensions.

Also included is information about your school corporation, such as how much is spent, on average, for each student, how much teachers are paid, and the percentage of corporation students who are in special education classes or gifted and talented classes.

picture of Indiana's schools, our Department makes detailed information available year-round on our Accountability System for Academic Progress (or ASAP) Web site at [www.asap.state.in.us](http://www.asap.state.in.us). ASAP provides information beyond what is possible on the printed page, allowing anyone to access a wide range of data, graphically display the results, and even compare schools based on a variety of characteristics.

I encourage all Hoosiers to review the performance reports for the schools in their communities. Then take the time to visit your local school to find out what you can do to help make a difference. Together, we can ensure that all students meet the high expectations we have set in Indiana.

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**Explanation of School Corporation (District) Data (see chart I)**

The following indicators show you the performance of your school corporation. Where possible, you will see three years of data so you can see the trends — not just this year's results. For many indicators, you can see how your school corporation's data compare to the state average.

- A Number of students enrolled in the corporation or school.
- B How much the school corporation is spending, on average, for each student.
- C Beginning salary for teachers in the corporation. (Bachelors — no experience)
- D Maximum salary for teachers in the corporation. (Masters +30 — maximum experience)
- E The percentage of students in the school corporation who are receiving special education services.
- F The percentage of students in the school corporation who are enrolled in gifted and talented education.
- G Percentage of total instructional hours delivered through vocational education classes.
- H The percentage of students who receive free or reduced-price lunches or free textbooks because of their family income level.
- I Students whose inability to speak and understand English prevents them from participating fully in a standard educational program.
- J The number of dollars the school corporation receives for remedial programs through a state ISTEP+ formula.
- K The percentage of students who moved from one school to another in the same school corporation.

**Former Resident Shares Memoirs**

Janel Norris and her brother, David Norris, had a memorable visit with their aunt, Alyce Norris Bruce, in South Bend last Saturday. At 92, Alyce is blessed with an amazing memory and the talent to win her audience's rapt attention. It was also a treat for them to see their cousins Valerie and Dan Kolver, Alyce's daughter and son-in-law. Everyone enjoyed hearing the latest family news and seeing recent photos of the grandchildren and great-grandchildren. The latest addition to the family is a second daughter for Alyce's grandson, Mark Waters, and his wife, Dina, of Los Angeles. The newborn has been named Alexandria Zella, in memory of her great-great-grandmother, Zella Neff Bruce, who is fondly remembered as a life-long resident of Kewanna.

A very pleasant surprise was seeing, for the first time, a hard-bound copy of Alyce's memoirs. She began a journal in 1981, and made her final entry after the 9/11 tragedy. Her grandchildren have had several copies printed to share with family members and Valerie loaned the original notes to the Norris siblings, so they could read about their father, Marion Norris, who was Alyce's oldest brother, and of whom she was very fond. Much of the memories concern Kewanna, where Alyce had many happy times visiting her grandparents, Frank and Sarah Norris on South Logan Street. Kewanna later became her home when she married C. Eldon Bruce in 1934.

After a leisurely lunch with Val and Dan at Honker's restaurant in South Bend, Janel and David drove back to Kewanna, eager to share Alyce's journal with their sister, Ruth Cogdill, who was recuperating from a bout with a virus and had not been able to join them. The siblings sat around Ruth's kitchen table, very touched to read the loving comments Alyce had written about their parents, and feeling that she has given them a priceless gift to be passed down the generations

The following is an excerpt from Alyce's memoirs:

My earliest memory is Armistice Day, November 11, 1918. Things that happened prior to that were related to me by others.

I was four on that November day, (having had a birthday on Nov. 1). My brother "Shuck" was not quite a year old - still a baby. I can remember my mother saying, "I want you to do something for me - you're a big girl and I'm sure you can. I want you to go down to the end of the street - don't cross the railroad tracks - and call Mrs. Clark. When she comes ask her if the war is over. The whistles and bells are ringing but they did that once before. She will know - then come back and tell me."

At the time we lived on Adams Street in Kankakee, Ill., two houses from the intersection of Stone St. Mrs. Clark, whose husband "Fuzzy" (as Dad always called him) lived two blocks down and faced the tracks. Her house was just one-half block from the N.Y.C. railroad station where all the news came in over the wire. Since Dad and Mr. Clark worked together, mother knew that she would know the latest news. Telephones were only a luxury in 1918. We didn't have a phone until 1922.

I can remember walking those two blocks and it seemed to take an hour and seemed like a very long way although I'd walked it with my mother and brothers many times. I finally got to the tracks and only had to call once as Jennie Clark was on her porch talking to a neighbor. She said, "Yes, Alyce, tell your mother that this time it's true - the war is over."

I hadn't realized we were in a war or what "war" was, but everyone seemed so happy, and I turned and ran all the way home to tell the news to Mother.

That night when Dad came home he heard the story of my adventures and said, "Since you were such a good girl, the boys and I will take you uptown to see the parade."

This turned out to be a great event. All the bells were ringing and we didn't have to get all the way uptown (which was about 12

blocks) but heard the bands and noise when we got to Entrance Avenue and Court Street (the main street). This was about 6 blocks from our house. My Dad and brothers, Marion, who was 15 and Everett, who was 12, took turns holding me up to see the parade - musicians, floats, and when it passed all the people fell in and followed a truck which held a coffin. Everyone kept saying, "The Kaiser is dead." The procession went to Alpena Park

at the end of Court Street where they had dug a hold. Here they buried the coffin.

I was ten years old when I read in the history books that the Kaiser was still alive - it was a terrible disappointment to me, for all this time I thought he was buried in Alpena Park.

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
