FEDCO Executive Director Meets with Council

The Fulton Economic Development Corporation executive director, Tom Tucker, was on hand for last Thursday's Kewanna town council session to answer questions about economic development that council members might have. He also wanted to learn what grant-funded projects the town is currently involved in and the names of the grant writers involved. At the mention of the town's re-application for a grant for sewer upgrades, he noted that the FEDCO board of directors has agreed to loan the town \$43,000 as part of its local match at no interest, to be paid back in \$8,600 installments over the next five years. Tucker also questioned the council about projects it sees on the horizon and how FEDCO might be of help. The council shared thoughts on getting a doctor or nurse practitioner in the clinic and if that isn't feasible turning the clinic into a new town hall/police station. Tucker offered his assistance in contacting some area medical facilities about opening a medical office here. The council noted its commitment to help the library board see its plans of adding an addition to the library come to fruition. Also, the council would like to find funds to replace pavement, sidewalks and curbs in the two-block business district.

Tucker and John Cochran, the town's representative to FEDCO, talked about WIRED, a 14-county organization aimed at community development and urged the council to learn more about it and become involved.

Bob Murphy of R. P. Murphy and Associates conducted a public hearing on the town's plans to reapply for a grant to finance upgrades at the sewage treatment plant. He reported good news/bad news; the good news being that inclusion of upgrades at both of the town's lift stations gives the town a better chance of securing the grant. The bad news is that the amount of the town's match will go up, as the lift

stations were not included in the original grant application. The council signed a resolution authorizing submission of the grant application and committing funds for the local match.

Fire chief, Larry Baldwin, submitted his written monthly report noting one town fire call and two township responses, one fire and one medical. Training for the month involved ice rescue using new ice rescue suits and squad lighting. He thanked the council for purchasing a diffuser for the department.

The town marshal's February report revealed no traffic arrests, five traffic warnings, two criminal arrests, one accident report, 24 calls answered and 1,243 miles patrolled. The department has received two new portable radios, bringing the total number to five, so the marshal and each deputy will have a radio.

Much of the town superintendent's time as well as that of his new assistant, Danny Chew, was spent plowing snow and picking up debris after the ice storm. In between snowstorms, time was spent cleaning the well houses and servicing the blowers at the sewage treatment plant. Catch basins were cleaned so the melting snow would not pond. The water works pumped a total of 1,403, 600 gallons of water during February.

The council signed an agreement with Harrison Township of Pulaski County to provide fire and first responder services for 2007.

The council accepted a proposal from M. E. Simpson to provide a unidirectional water main flushing program for the town. The council asked the superintendent, Mike Molitor, to contact Simpson, and Leary Construction to coordinate the flushing program with water tower cleaning and inspection to be performed by Leary.

Kindergarten Roundup at Caston

Caston Elementary School will host its annual kindergarten roundup Tuesday, March 20, at 7 p.m. in the Caston Elementary library. Parents may report at 6:45 p.m. for pre-registration.

Parents of children who will enter kindergarten next school year are encouraged to attend this informational meeting. Children must be five (5) years of age by August 1, 2007, to be eligible to attend kindergarten. Parents who have children meeting the age requirement will have the opportunity to register their child in next year's kindergarten program at the meeting. Parents must have a legal birth certificate to verify the age of the child. Children need not attend with the parents, as there will be no screening or programs for the children that evening.

Parents are asked to bring three items to the meeting - (1) legal birth certificate; (2) Social Security card; and (3) immunization record. Immunization records will be reviewed by the school nurse that evening and parents will be informed if there is a need for any additional immunizations that the child must have prior to entering school next year.

Auditor Notes Filing Deadlines

Fulton County Auditor Denise Chandler reminds taxpayers of the following deadlines for filing for certain deductions.

Real estate/mortgages recorded by March 1, 2006 have until June 10, 2007 to file for the following deductions: mortgage deduction; age 65 deduction; blind or disabled deduction; all veteran's disabled deductions; veterans or spouses of veteran's of World War I; and geothermal energy/heating/cooling device deductions.

The State of Indiana does have certain restrictions and/or rules on some of the deductions. If you have any questions concerning these deductions, call the county auditor's office at 574-223-2912.

The last day to file for the following deductions or credits, unless an extension has been obtained from the township assessor, is May 15, 2007: economic revitalization area personal property; enterprise zone inventory credit; credit for inventory increases on industrial recovery sites; new manufacturing equipment or inventory located in a Maritime Opportunity District.

The last day a 2007 not-for-profit exemption application can be filed is also May 15, 2007.


Lions to Serve Fish and Chicken Supper


driver's license; and health profile cards.





County Chess Tournery, March 17

The 17th annual Fulton County Chess Tournament is scheduled for 9 a.m. Saturday, March 17, at the Rochester Community Resource Center, according to its sponsor, the Rochester Rotary Club. Except for 1992, the tournament has been held annually since 1989 according to tournament directors Pat Meade and Doug Morton.

Tournament play will be similar to previous years with the field divided into flights according to age of the participants. Individual matches are assigned in a Swiss movement so that each participant will play five matches whether win, lose or draw. If a flight ends tied for first place, Pat

Meade, who assigns the matches, will direct a sixth match. Ideally, the field is divided into elementary, middle school and high school age players among the youth participants with an open flight for adults. Prize money is divided equally among the flights.

For the third consecutive year, First Federal Savings Bank is providing \$200 in cash for the prize money. The only requirements for participants are a \$2 entry fee, payable at the door, plus each entrant must be a Fulton County resident. Players are asked to assist by bringing chess sets and boards.

In the 2006 tournament, 10-year-old Maverick Shelpman of Akron won the under-12 flight with 7-year-old Eli Pugh of Rochester taking second and 9-year-old Austin Melms of Rochester taking third. In the young teen flight, Sam Thomas of Rochester was a first time champion with Wesley Shelpman of Akron and Brandon Melton of Rochester finishing second and third.

In the mid-teen flight, Chris Ness went undefeated and repeated as champion. Morgan Murphy finished second and Jessi Thiry, Bobby Patton and Matt Williamson finished in a three-way tie for third. All are from Rochester. Among the adults, Uwe Paff won his first championship, going undefeated on the day and defeating 1999 champion Shad Sibert in the final match. John Smith finished second and Sibert was awarded third. All are from Rochester.

If our government leaders are really serious about lowering health care costs and reducing unnecessary diseases, a very important step would be the passage of long overdue, bipartisan legislation granting the U.S. Food and Drug Administration authority over tobacco products.

Tobacco use is still the leading cause of preventable death in the U.S. More than 400,000 people die from tobacco-related diseases each year. And the price tag for coping with those issues is more than \$96 billion in health care bills each year.

Despite all the harm they cause, tobacco products are still exempt from health and safety regulations that apply to other products such as food and drugs. The FDA can regulate a box of macaroni and cheese or a tube of lipstick, but not a pack of

cigarettes.

Earlier attempts by the FDA to assert authority over the manufacture and sale of tobacco products have been thwarted in Congress by special interest groups. This year an attempt will be made to correct that oversight with legislation enabling the FDA to neutralize some of the tobacco industry's attempts to win over new smokers. Such legislation is important to our national interest and should be supported.

If you agree with this stand of the American Lung Association and its Indiana affiliate, we hope you will contact your Congressional representatives and encourage their support of legislation to give the FDA more authority over tobacco products. Tobacco use is addictive and harmful to public health; it needs to be cut back.

THE LAKE BRUCE CONSERVANCY DISTRICT NEWS

The Lake Bruce Conservancy District will hold its monthly meeting Thursday evening, March 8, in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station. The meeting starts at 7 p.m. and will cover general business of the district and the matter of blanket easements.

Recently the Lake Bruce Conservancy received a letter from its engineering firm explaining the need for blanket easements to be obtained from various home owners around the lake. These are necessary for both construction of the sewer system and its maintenance. The following is an expantation of blanket easements.

An easement is an agreement that confers to an individual, company or in this case the District, the right to use a landowner's property in some way. An easement usually describes a particular portion of a property, and although not visible on the ground, provides an area of access to the holder of the easement. Although the term "blanket" easement does not imply exactness, it does in fact convey an exact location once (in the District's case) the vacuum valve pit and connecting vacuum lateral has been installed. That is, a 5' radius around the center of the valve pit and 5' on either side of the center-line of the installed pipe. The practical result is that the blanket easement allows the District access to the valve pit and vacuum lateral for initial construction and subsequent maintenance of said infrastructure, regardless of the location of same.

Our need to obtain blanket easements from a number of homeowners stems from the location of the valve pits that will be serving them. A number of valve pits are located on private property. These locations were determined by Wightman Petrie and an Air Vac representative to be the best, and in some cases, the only location to place the valve pits for proper collection system operation.

That being said, these homeowners will receive in the near future a letter that describes to them the purpose and particular need of a blanket easement, to be followed by the individual paperwork and necessary documentation for the granting of said easement. It is our intention to work closely with the District to determine the most efficient and non intrusive method of obtaining these blanket easements. We do not want to cause any undo confusion amongst your customers.



AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE RATES AND CHARGES OF THE TOWN OF KEWANNA MUNICIPAL WATER UTILITY
WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Kewanna, Indiana, has determined that certain amendments be made in the schedule of rates and charges provided for the operation of said utility so as to bring such rates and fees more equal to the costs of operation,

ORDINANCE NO. 120706-B
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE RATES AND CHARGES OF THE TOWN OF KEWANNA MUNICIPAL SEWAGE UTILITY
WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Kewanna, Indiana, has determined that certain amendments be made in the schedule of rates and charges provided for the operation of said utility so as to bring such rates and fees more equal to the costs of operation,
NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained that Section 3 of the Town Ordinance 1998-4 of Kewanna, Indiana, be amended to read as follows:

Section 3. For the use of and the service rendered by said sewage works, rates and charges shall be collected from the owners of each and every lot, parcel of real estate, or building that is connected with the Town sanitary system or otherwise discharges sanitary sewage, industrial wastes, water, or other liquids, either directly or indirectly, into the sanitary sewage system of the Town of Kewanna. Such rates and charges include user charges, debt service costs, excessive strength surcharges, and other service charges, which rates and charges shall be payable as hereinafter provided and shall be in an amount determined as follows:
(A) The sewage rates and charges shall be based on the quantity of water used on or in the property or premises subject to such rates and charges, as the same is measured by the water meter there in use, plus a base charge based on the size of water meter installed, except as herein otherwise provided. For the purpose of billing and collecting the charges for sewage service, the water meters shall be read monthly and the users shall be billed each month (or period equaling a month). The water usage schedule on which the amount of said rates and charges shall be determined is as follows:


