

The Lake Bruce Conservancy District held its monthly meeting Thursday, March 8, in the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Department community room. Three of the five directors were present as well as five freeholders.

The minutes of the February meeting were approved as was the treasurer's report and payment of bills.

Correspondence was reviewed.

Chairman, Norm Steigely, stated that he had received an email from the district's attorney alerting them to HB 132. If passed, it would change the voting procedure for conservancy districts. Elections would need to be handled the same as other elections where only registered voters could vote. Many lake conservancies have property owners that are not registered to vote in that area as they are registered where they have their full time residence. It would also put important matters in the hands of people who have no connection with the workings of the conservancy district. Within hours, Senator Weatherwax called back stating that after reviewing the bill, he also had concerns and was contacting all his constituents to amend the bill.

Steigely made a presentation to the Fulton County Commissioners Monday, March 5. This was to request any financial help that might be available from the county, a requirement of the CFF grant. The county commissioners stated that they have no funds available but were in total support of the sewer project and would give a letter confirming that fact. It was reported that progress on the CFF grant request is looking good at this point and the final paperwork needs to be in Norm's hands by Monday, March 12. CFF grant awards will be announced on May 11.

Steve Tennant stated he hoped to have his dredge in the water by Tuesday, March 13, and begin the dredging project. This was some good news, which was appreciated by the directors.

Wightman Petrie reported that the final application for a construction permit will go to the state Friday, March 9. Blanket easements will be needed from 68 properties at this time. These easements are for placement and maintenance of valve pits and the lines that go to them. When you dig in the ground there is always the possibility that you will run into something that may make you change the design you have planned. If this happens, it may be necessary to require additional blanket easements for the adjusted locations.

Lake Enhancement chairman, Gerald Porter, gave a very in-

depth report on the Hydrilla seminar that the directors attended. He also had handouts showing what Hydrilla looks like as well as a full page article on the seminar. These handouts will be made available to all lake residents, on request. Porter expressed that if Hydrilla gets in the lake, it will make the Milfoil look like a wimp. Hydrilla would have a drastic effect on the lake within a very short period.

Porter also talked about plans for this year's weed control and the LARE program that helps the district pay for spraying of weeds. One bid has been received for weed treatment from Weed Patrol, Inc. JF New and V-3 have submitted bids for the required plant surveys and they are both in the \$7,000 range.

Steigely reported that the district is still working with CSX Railroad trying to purchase their property but there have been some hold ups. Since it is a requirement to have properties locked up prior to applying for the CFF grant, the district signed an option that allows it to purchase a small lot from Tom Davies as a back up location for the vacuum station. The district will continue to work with the railroad as their property is large enough for both the vacuum station and a meeting hall/community room. Steigely also mentioned that the closing on the east side vacuum station property with the Kline Family Trust was scheduled for Friday, March 9.

Steigely explained that the district needs a bond attorney as required by its Rural Development grant/loan of approximately \$3,700,000. The names of three very qualified bond attorneys have been referred to the district and a request for bids has been sent to them with a submittal deadline date of March 30. The district will select a bond attorney at its next meeting.

It was mentioned that in an effort to keep everyone informed on what is happening within the conservancy, the district may want to have a website that anyone could access from anywhere. A multitude of information could be included on the website so the district could be assured that the facts are available to all. Misinformation is a problem the conservancy district would like to eliminate. A motion was made and passed to have Norm look into the cost of maintaining a website. He will report his findings at the next meeting, which will be at 7 p.m. Thursday, April 12.

Kindergarten Roundup at Caston

Caston Elementary School will host its annual kindergarten roundup Tuesday, March 20, at 7 p.m. in the Caston Elementary library. Parents may report at 6:45 p.m. for pre-registration.

Parents of children who will enter kindergarten next school year are encouraged to attend this informational meeting. Children must be five (5) years of age by August 1, 2007, to be eligible to attend kindergarten. Parents who have children meeting the age requirement will have the opportunity to register their child in next year's kindergarten program at the meeting. Parents must have a legal birth certificate to verify the age of the child. Children need not attend with the parents, as there will be no screening or programs for the children that evening.

Parents are asked to bring three items to the meeting - (1) legal birth certificate; (2) Social Security card; and (3) immunization record. Immunization records will be reviewed by the school nurse that evening and parents will be informed if there is a need for any additional immunizations that the child must have prior to entering school next year.

Auditor Notes Filing Deadlines

Fulton County Auditor Denise Chandler reminds taxpayers of the following deadlines for filing for certain deductions.

Real estate/mortgages recorded by March 1, 2006 have until June 10, 2007 to file for the following deductions: mortgage deduction; age 65 deduction; blind or disabled deduction; all veteran's disabled deductions; veterans or spouses of veteran's of World War I; and geothermal energy/heating/cooling device deductions.

The State of Indiana does have certain restrictions and/or rules on some of the deductions. If you have any questions concerning these deductions, call the county auditor's office at 574-223-2912.

The last day to file for the following deductions or credits, unless an extension has been obtained from the township assessor, is May 15, 2007: economic revitalization area personal property; enterprise zone inventory credit; credit for inventory increases on industrial recovery sites; new manufacturing equipment or inventory located in a Maritime Opportunity District.

The last day a 2007 not-for-profit exemption application can be filed is also May 15, 2007.

County Chess Tourney, March 17

The 17th annual Fulton County Chess Tournament is scheduled for 9 a.m. Saturday, March 17, at the Rochester Community Resource Center, according to its sponsor, the Rochester Rotary Club. Except for 1992, the tournament has been held annually since 1989 according to tournament directors Pat Meade and Doug Morton.

Tournament play will be similar to previous years with the field divided into flights according to age of the participants. Individual matches are assigned in a Swiss movement so that each participant will play five matches whether win, lose or draw. If a flight ends tied for first place, Pat Meade, who assigns the matches, will direct a sixth match. Ideally, the field is divided into elementary, middle school and high school age players among the youth participants with an open flight for adults. Prize money is divided equally among the flights.

For the third consecutive year, First Federal Savings Bank is providing \$200 in cash for the prize money. The only requirements for participants are a \$2 entry fee, payable at the door, plus each entrant must be a Fulton County resident. Players are asked to assist by bringing chess sets and boards.

In the 2006 tournament, 10-year-old Maverick Shelpman of Akron won the under-12 flight with 7-year-old Eli Pugh of Rochester taking second and 9-year-old Austin Melms of Rochester taking third. In the young teen flight, Sam Thomas of Rochester was a first time champion with Wesley Shelpman of Akron and Brandon Melton of Rochester finishing second and third.

In the mid-teen flight, Chris Ness went undefeated and repeated as champion. Morgan Murphy finished second and Jessi Thiry, Bobby Patton and Matt Williamson finished in a three-way tie for third. All are from Rochester. Among the adults, Uwe Paff won his first championship, going undefeated on the day and defeating 1999 champion Shad Sibert in the final match. John Smith finished second and Sibert was awarded third. All are from Rochester.

Typically, a pregnant woman should gain about 25 to 30 pounds.


If you are underweight before you get pregnant, you may need to gain more. If you are very heavy when you get pregnant you may need to gain only 15 to 18 pounds.



The PTDA is a branch of the Fulton County Historical Society.

David Anderson designed the PTDA logo which is seen on their website, www.potawatomi-tda.org and the highway signs erected across Fulton County to mark the 1838 Trail of Death route. Five new highway signs were sponsored by the Manitou Chapter DAR and dedicated last fall.

The newsletter also has stories about the 2006 Trail of Courage Living History Festival, a history of Chief Keesis' family, and a poem about the Trail of Courage by Marsha Glassburn. Several new books about American Indians were donated to the Fulton County Museum's Indian collection.

A skeleton of an Indian was uncovered near Grass Creek, according to a story in *The Rochester Weekly Sentinel* August 19, 1898. This was on the farm now owned by Robert and Millie Redweik, but they had not heard of the skeleton and no one knows what happened to it.

Bob and Esther White, Overland Park, Kansas, were honored for

their work on the St. Philippine Duchesne Memorial Park, which is where the Potawatomi lived for the next 10 years after the 1838 Trail of Death from Indiana to Kansas.

Chief White Eagle to Celebrate 90th Birthday

Chief White Eagle will be 90 years old on Sunday, March 18. The Fulton County Historical Society is hosting a birthday party in his honor at 2 p.m. that day. Marsha Glassburn and Melinda Clinger will make birthday cakes. The public is invited to attend and wish the chief, Fulton County's living legend, a happy birthday and hear him tell about some of the

highlights of his life.

He was born on the Grand River Reservation in Canada on March 18, 1917, served in the 101st Airborne during World War II, and was in several movies and television programs. His first movie was "Northwest Passage" in 1939. He was in "Red River" and "She Wore a Yellow Ribbon" with John Wayne, getting "shot and killed" several times in each movie. He has been giving programs at the Fulton County Museum and the Trail of Courage since he moved to Fulton County in 1985.

When he was baptized, he was given the English name of Basil Heath. He and Bobbie Bear have been married for nearly 30 years and they renewed their vows at the Trail of Courage in 2004. They live on the Tippecanoe River west of Rochester.

Chief White Eagle has been a force in preserving American Indiana heritage and respect for their culture. In the movies, he would not do anything that shamed the Indians or was inaccurate.

For many years, people have been telling him that he should write a book about his life. In 2005, he worked with Susan Campbell, a member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, and Shirley Willard, Fulton County historian, to publish a 10-page book entitled "Hollywood Indian - the Story of Chief White Eagle". It is still available at the museum for \$5 each. Now he is planning a longer book. He has

been taping his memories with Shirley Willard, who copies and sends the tapes to Susan Campbell, who lives in Hawaii, to be typed. He plans for this book to contain lots of pictures and cover most of his life.




