

The Lake Bruce Conservancy District held its monthly meeting Thursday, April 12, in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station. Three of the five directors, three guests and 19 freeholders of the district were in attendance.

The minutes of the March meeting and the treasurer's report were read and approved. Bills incurred by the district were approved for payment.

Correspondence received by the district during the month was reviewed.

Chairman Norm Steigely reported that he had explored the cost of maintaining a web site to help keep people informed on what is happening within the conservancy district. Norm has already registered for a one year domain name. It is [www.LBCD.info](http://www.LBCD.info). The cost for hosting a web site was checked with various companies and the one considered best was one with unlimited pages for \$140 a year. A motion was made and approved to go ahead and purchase the site and try to get it up and running by the next meeting.

It was also reported that the closing on the Kline property for the east side vacuum station has been completed with one small hitch. A prepaid bill for \$200 for attorney fees was not given to the title company prior to the closing and was not included in the closing statement. Since the district agreed to pay the attorney fees, a motion was made and approved to pay this bill. On other property issues, it was reported that the district's attorney is still working on obtaining the railroad property needed for the west side vacuum station and an office with a meeting room.

A dredging report was given and it was announced that the district's application for LARE funds to cover Phase 2 of the dredging was not approved by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) for this year. The district was encouraged to resubmit its application for next year. It was also announced that Tennant's Dredging has reported they have approximately 2½ to 3 weeks of work left to finish Phase 1 on the west side of the lake.

Proposals for the required bond attorney were received from three firms. All of the proposals were higher than projected, so it was decided to try to renegotiate the cost since some of the work generally done by the bond attorney has already been completed. The selection of the successful bidder was tabled until the next meeting.

A letter of resignation was

received from the District 4 director. To fill this vacancy, the board of directors of the Lake Bruce Conservancy District will appoint a director to serve until the next election which will be in February of 2008 as sited in IC 14-33-5-12. Anyone interested in filling this vacancy should send a letter addressed to the Board of Directors, Lake Bruce Conservancy District, P.O. Box 97, Kewanna, IN 46939. This letter should detail how you believe your knowledge and experience would be helpful to the operation of the district. Letters must be mailed first class and received by April 30, 2007. The applicant must be a freeholder and own property within the district boundaries. The board will make the appointment at its next regular meeting which will be May 10, 2007. The appointed director will be sworn in at that meeting.

The Lake Enhancement Chairman, Gerald Porter, explained the plan for weed control and surveys for this year. He noted that the district has a long-range plan as well as yearly plans that are adjusted annually based on the programs funded by the DNR and weather conditions. He stated that the district's cost for surveys this year will be \$10,000 of which 90% is covered by a DNR grant. V-3 was the low bidder and was awarded the contract for this year's surveys that includes a five-year plan. Ed Belmonte of V-3 was present to explain the seven-step process that will take place to complete the required surveys for 2007.

Weed Patrol was once again low bidder for treatment services and was awarded the contract for 2007. Their price was based on areas treated and the same cost per acre was carried over from last year. Porter did mention that because of the unusually cold weather so far this spring, weeds have not started to emerge and it is uncertain how many acres will need to be treated. The district has been awarded up to \$16,000 for weed control, or 90% of the treatment cost.

Porter also mentioned that the district is talking with J F New and other knowledgeable firms about long-term planning of replacing native weeds in the lake as needed. He went on to say that this would be more feasible after the sewer system has had a chance to impact the lake as the ph of the lake could change and have a bearing on what plants the lake will support.

Bill Zartman of Quality Assurance Enterprises made a presentation to the board on services they have that may be of help to the district. The main area of interest was that of handling utility billing for sewers. Other companies will be solicited for information as the district moves closer to billing operations.

Steve Fralish of Wightman-Petrie gave an update on the progress of the sewer project. All areas other than the railroad

## Town Wide Clean-up Day, May 5

Tires will be collected by the Fulton County Recycling Center on Saturday, May 5, at the Rochester location. There is a limit of four tires per vehicle. The tires must be removed from the rims.

## Notice to Property Taxpayers







**Letter To The Editor**

TO THE EDITOR:

Even in today's reruns of those old movies set in Casablanca and Cairo, there was something mystical when Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., and Terhan Bey sat around in desert tents smoking their Turkish waterpipes.

A new study by the American Lung Association says the rapid growth of so-called hookah bars, emphasizing the use of tobacco waterpipes, poses a severe health risk. Especially vulnerable are 18-to-24-year-olds, who have quickly become the leading users of this centuries-old device to consume specially-made

tobaccos.

The hookah heats the tobacco and passes the smoke through a bowl of water. The smoker then draws tobacco smoke through a mouthpiece connected to the pipe by a rubber hose.

This form of tobacco use, which originated in Persia and India, is making a comeback because it is mistakenly thought a safer alternative to cigarettes. The truth, according to the ALA, is that hookah tobacco is not safe at all. That's because a typical smoking session, often drawing several people at the same sitting, lasts 40 to 45 minutes compared to 5 or 10 minutes with a cigarette. It adds up to increased exposure to dangerous chemicals. Another risk, says the study, is that teens are eight times more likely to experiment with cigarettes if they'd ever used a hookah.

This means parents should be especially watchful these days that their offspring aren't taking up the use of tobacco waterpipes. It really isn't as harmless or glamorous as it looks!






