Indiana Department of Labor Announces Indiana's Minimum Wage Increase

Indianapolis, IN July 2, 2007—The Indiana Department of Labor announces that Indiana's minimum wage will increase effective July 24, 2007 in conjunction with the Federal minimum wage.

On July 24, 2007 the Indiana minimum wage will increase from \$5.15 per hour to \$5.85 per hour. This will increase again to \$6.55 per hour on July 24, 2008 then to \$7.25 per hour on July 24, 2009. Employers of "tipped employees" must still pay employees at least \$2.13 per hour in addition to their tips. If the tips do not add up to the minimum wage, employers must make up the difference.

Many Hoosier businesses are subject to the federal minimum wage law under the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) instead of the Indiana Minimum Wage Law. Generally, businesses that generate at least \$500,000 in business or are engaged in interstate commerce or production of goods for commerce are subject to the federal minimum wage law. The federal minimum wage law also applies to most employees of state and local government, hospitals, schools, and domestic workers.

Employers subject to the Indiana Minimum Wage Law may obtain the required posting by visiting the Indiana Department of Labor website after July 10th at www.in.gov/labor.

Employers subject to the Fair Labor Standards Act may obtain the required posting by visiting the U.S. Department of Labor website at <http://www.dol.gov/esa/regs/compliance/posters/flsa.htm>.

Lori A. Torres, Commissioner of Labor, reminds all employers of their duty not only to display the applicable poster, but to pay employees in compliance with the law. "Indiana employers employ about 3 million workers. It is part of our job to ensure that Indiana law is followed".

Vacation Tips for Camping Clubs and Timeshares

Summer is here and a timeshare or camping club can be a great way to enjoy a family vacation. It's important to do some research before spending money. The sale of timeshares and camping clubs is regulated by the State of Indiana through the attorney general's office.

A timeshare is the right to use and occupy a unit in a building on a periodic basis, typically for a period of one week each year. A developer of a timeshare who offers to sell more than 12 timeshares in a project must register with the attorney general's office, and update this registration annually.

A camping club allows people to keep a trailer, tent, camper or other similar device at a land-based site for a period of time. Registration with the state is required for any camping club developer who gives a purchaser of an agreement lasting more than one year the interest in, or right to use, the camping site for more than 30 days.

Indiana law gives a purchaser the right to cancel a timeshare or camping club purchase within three days after the execution of the sales contract. Sundays and legal holidays do not count in computing this period. Indiana law also requires developers to provide purchasers with a cancellation form. The purchaser's notice of cancellation is effective on the date postmarked. Any written notice delivered other than by mail or telegraph is effective at the time of delivery at the developer's place of business.

When thinking about getting a timeshare or camping club, resist high-pressure sales. You are not obligated to make a purchase merely because a developer gives you a prize or a reduced price vacation as an incentive to attend a sales presentation.

Read the contracts and literature provided. Ask questions, and make sure you understand what you are purchasing. Not all timeshare properties are of equal value, depending on their location and the week of the year that you are purchasing.





Migraine Headaches

The word migraine is derived from the Greek word *hemikrania*, meaning "half of the head".

Vague premonitory symptoms (called the prodrome phase) may precede a migraine attack by several hours, or even a day or two. Such prodrome symptoms can include sensitivity to light or sound, changes in appetite, fatigue, malaise, and mood changes.

About 20% of migraine sufferers have pre-headache sensory disturbances called auras. Migraine headaches with auras are termed classic migraines; migraines without auras are

called common migraines. A person may experience one or the other at different times.

Typical auras include visual disturbances such as the appearance of zigzag lines, stars, or shimmering areas, blind spots, and tunnel vision (inability to see to the side).

Speech disturbances, tingling or numbness, weakness in an arm or leg, perceptual disturbances such as space or size distortions, and confusion may also occur, though these symptoms are less common. Migraine auras last between 15 and 45 minutes.

A type of migraine known as ocular migraine is painless and produces only auras or other visual symptoms.

A typical migraine attack produces throbbing pain on one side of the head, often accompanied by nausea, sometimes with vomiting; visual symptoms are common and facial tingling or numbness may occur.

If untreated, attacks usually last from 4 to 72 hours. Pain sometimes spreads to affect the entire head and is worsened by physical activity. Extreme sensitivity to light and noise are common, and patient may feel cold and look pale.

After a migraine attack, there is usually a postdrome phase, in which patients may feel exhausted and mentally foggy for a while.

Although half of women with migraines report they are related to menstruation, experts believe that true menstrual migraines are less common than thought. Such migraines are without auras and defined as those that regularly occur during the first three days of menstruation, but not during ovulation or right before a period. The study found no association between menstruation and migraines with auras.

Children may have a form of migraine known as a migraine equivalent or abdominal migraine, which does not cause a headache at all. Instead children experience bouts of nausea and vomiting (called cyclic vomiting syndrome) or other secondary symptoms found in adult migraine, such as a reaction against light or sound.

"Ginger" Begins New Indiana State Fair Arts Tradition

INDIANAPOLIS - Driving along near her Sheridan home, Melinda Spear-Huff was admiring the rural view when her gaze met Ginger's. It was a moment Spear-Huff wanted captured forever. She stopped the car, went up to the farmhouse door and politely asked Ginger's owner if she could photograph the Limousin cow that had just looked her dead in the eye with a mouthful of straw.

Spear-Huff couldn't have possibly known then that her inspiration would be the beginning of a new Indiana State Fair tradition. She brought Ginger to life on canvas and entered her painting in the fair's fine arts competition. Although it didn't win a ribbon, the Indiana State Fair Commission purchased it for permanent display in the fairgrounds' Administration building.

"I was thrilled when (the fair) called to say they wanted it to start a new collection," Spear-Huff said. "It's great to be part of something with so much tradition. I've been coming to the state fair since I was a kid."

In an effort to honor Hoosier artists and Indiana agriculture, the fair created the idea to purchase a new painting from the fine arts competition for permanent display each year. The deadline for this year's fine arts competition is July 1. Artists who would like to enter online can do so at <https://secure.in.gov/statefair/fair-entry>.

"Personally, I am committed to celebrate the arts in any way possible at the fairgrounds," State Fair Executive Director Cindy Hoye said. "Last year we started with the spectacular art piece at Fall Creek and 38th Street along with this new collection and a special exhibit of fine arts during the fair. I'd say we are well on our way to showcasing the arts and agriculture."





Letter To The Editor...

There are certain events in life that seem to parallel, to a certain degree, Bible stories. I cannot help but see a similar lesson when working with the Fulton Improvement Committee. The overall goal for the committee is to erect a community building that will improve the lives of the community and those around it. Although there have been many struggles that have gone on in the attempt to make this a reality, the committee is continuing to push forward.

Some days we feel like we are David and the many troubles and obstacles we face in this project are the Goliath, the monster that seems to stop us straight in our tracks, just as in the Bible story. Though David was the underdog whom no one believed could accomplish this insurmountable task of killing Goliath, he not only vanquished Goliath but went on through life accomplishing much more.

There are many obstacles that line the road in accomplishing our goal to build this new community center. There is not much industry or business revenue that we can look to in financing such a project in our area. The energy prices are reaching record levels. The overall money for the project would be hard to come by. The truth of the matter is that this will not succeed without the support of every person that is able and available in our community. From the first day the committee's only goal was to build a multi-purpose facility or building that everyone in our community could use from young kids to older adults. Priority activities such as Bible-based basketball and soccer, church sponsored events and community gatherings could be hosted at this

building. Other activities such as reunions, wedding receptions, concerts, and an endless array of activities could take place here. The building is planned to have a multi-purpose area, kitchen, and conference room to enable these various activities. Such activities and events could do nothing less than grow our community spirit and improve the lives of countless community members young and old.

Detractions from our goal are the perception that the building as planned is too big, too expensive, too much for our community to bear. The current blue print plans of the building are an idealistic version of our goal. We understand that the reality of the situation will dictate the size and stature of the community building. The reality is that we may not build the building that has the size, the stature or the total facilities in our goal.

This is all contingent on the support we receive from corporate and (more importantly) private donors. Phase one of this project is to raise the capital for the maintenance fund. With this fund the building should be financially self-sustaining after it is built. A flower sale and mail drive were conducted in the initial money drive. The money raised in these events has gotten us started toward our initial goal.

The cost of the building would be little compared to the dividends it would pay the community each and every year. Statistically, if every family would sacrifice eating out two times in the year and donate that money to the community building fund, we would have more than our needed goal amount for phase one of the project without the use of public tax revenue. The Truth about Indiana Manufacturing

You may see announcements that a coalition of higher education and business interests are partnering in an effort to promote the growth of the manufacturing and logistic industries in central Indiana. The Indiana Manufacturers Association welcomes more voices in the choir.

At the starting point of this campaign, it would seem appropriate to clear up some misconceptions about the current state of manufacturing in Indiana, and to provide some insight as to what manufacturing will mean to Indiana's future.

News articles and editorials with headlines like "Indiana Bleeding Manufacturing Jobs" have become common. Such articles, however, only tell part of the story and leave readers with incorrect perceptions. Certainly manufacturing is changing, and

that includes manufacturing in Indiana. But change should not be confused with decline. Over the past three years, if you had invested your 401(k) plan assets in such "new economy" stocks as Microsoft, Intel, AMD, Cisco and Wal-Mart or such Indiana companies as U.S. Steel, Nucor, Toyota, Steel Dynamics and Biomet, which do you think would have shown better growth? The answer is the Indiana companies.

It is true that over the past 25 years, Indiana's direct manufacturing employment has declined. A percentage of this decline is not because of real job loss but rather because of the reclassification of jobs to the service sector that was previously counted as manufacturing. But, it is true that the overall employment numbers are down over the past two decades. During that period, however, manufacturing production in Indiana has remained relatively constant. In 1980, manufacturing accounted for 32.8 percent of total Indiana Gross State Product. Today, it is 28.2 percent. Indiana's manufacturers are producing 28.2 percent of the wealth in the state with 16.2 percent of the workforce.

What the sum of these statistics tells us is that manufacturing in Indiana is not "old world". Indiana's manufacturers are examples of how strategic investment in technology can increase productivity and keep an employer competitive in a global

economic environment. Today, manufacturing means as much to Indiana's livelihood as it ever has; in fact, more than it does in any other state. Manufacturing is the principal engine of growth in any modern economy.

As for the future, it needs to be recognized that most of the growth in manufacturing employment over the next decade will occur in traditional industries already located in Indiana. While productivity increases have the negative effect of less total manufacturing employment, it also means that the remaining jobs and those created in the future will be more skilled, better paying and more interesting. All Hoosiers have a stake in a healthy manufacturing sector; and as a state, we can do a better job of developing policies that foster manufacturing growth. The key to unleashing the growth potential of Indiana manufacturing is to provide a business climate that encourages innovation, entrepreneurship and investment.

Manufacturing in Indiana is a great productivity story - a story that needs to be told and heard by more people. Manufacturing is high tech and high wage, and will continue to drive Indiana's economy to increased prosperity and innovation.


