Town Council Considers Fireworks Ordinance

The Kewanna town council began consideration of an ordinance regulating the use of consumer fireworks within the town limits when it met Thursday evening, August 2. Several residents complained about the noise and fire hazard caused by fireworks the past few months. The ordinance under consideration limits fireworks to July 4, the five days preceding and the five days following, as well as New Year's Eve day and New Year's Day. The ordinance proposed that fines be set, doubling with each offense for the first three offenses. It further provides that any offense exceeding three will be subject to the maximum fine allowed by law.

The town attorney, Greg Heller, reported that a resident cited for allowing trash to accumulate on his property has appeared in court and agreed to clean up. Another court date is scheduled for later in August.

The council passed an ordinance authorizing the temporary borrowing and issuance of tax warrants. The town may be forced to borrow operating money due to the fact that property tax statements have not been mailed yet this year. The town normally receives property tax settlements in June and December.

John Cochran gave an update on the Fulton Economic Development Corporation, including the fact that the executive director, Tom Tucker, is leaving. He also noted that there has been little done so far on trying to find a doctor/nurse practitioner for the local clinic. He is going to ask Tucker to make a couple of contacts before he leaves to see if there is any interest in leasing the clinic.

Mark Smith reported that he is planning a Chief Kewanna 5-K run, 2-mile walk for fun, and a Little Chiefs fun run for the Kewanna Fall Festival. He requested permission to use town streets for the run/walk, which was approved. The event will take place Saturday, Sept. 29, at 3 p.m. The pre-registration entry fees are \$12 for the 5-K run; \$10 for the 2-mile walk; or \$20 for a family (up to three people). Those who wait until race day to register must pay \$15 for the 5-K and \$12 for the walk. The cost of the Little Chiefs fun run is \$10 per person or \$28 for a family of three. T-shirts will be given to all that pre-register and race day entrants while they last. Prizes will be awarded. The race starts and finishes at the fire station.

Tony Pesaresi gave the July fire department report revealing four town responses (one fire, three medical) and four township responses, all medical. He also presented a letter from fire chief, Larry Baldwin, requesting an additional \$1,000 in annual

compensation from the town and township for the firemen as the department has added two more volunteers, giving them a full roster of 25 volunteers and two radio operators. The two new firemen are Marcus Kay and Brian Guzman. The request was okayed by the council. Pesaresi also requested funds to purchase a used vehicle for fire volunteers to use when attending out-of-town meetings. The request was tabled, as the town does not know what funds might be available for 2007/2008 until assessments and property tax rates are finalized.

Marshal Dennis Price submitted his July report. The department issued nine traffic warnings, investigated one accident, answered 73 calls and patrolled 1,743 miles.

A resolution was passed creating a town election board so the town can conduct its own election. According to the Fulton County Clerk, this will be the last time the town will be allowed to conduct its own election, which will increase the cost of the process from about \$500 to \$5,000.

The council signed an agreement with the Rural Community Assistance Partnership for services through 2007. RCAP is a non-profit agency that works free of charge to find funds for infrastructure improvements.

A quote for grading, seeding and fertilizing ground disturbed by the installation of new groundwater tile was approved, along with the repair of two driveways.

Town superintendent Mike Molitor submitted his report, which included work on the irrigator at the sewage treatment plant and trimming of trees along the lane. Leary Construction Co. cleaned and inspected the inside of the water tower. M. E. Simpson will be here soon to flush the main lines, all an effort to improve water quality. Tires were replaced on both town-owned pick-up trucks. The town dump, which accepts yard wastes and tree trimmings only, was cleaned up. A service line water leak was repaired. The Fulton County Health Department and Indiana Department of Environmental Management were contacted with the hopes that they can aid the town in securing a grant to make upgrades at the sewage treatment plant. The superintendent prepared a new inventory list for IDEM for the water system. A total of 4,133,900 gallons of water were pumped during July.

The superintendent was asked to purchase patching material and finish patching potholes by the end of September.

Lieutenant Governor Skillman Awards Fulton County With \$7,776 Planning Grant

Indiana Lieutenant Governor Becky Skillman recently awarded Fulton County a \$7,776 planning grant to develop plans for a fire station/community center. The Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs administers the planning grants through the Small Cities and Towns Development Block Grant (CDBG) program.

"Planning grants are invaluable tools that can help rural communities improve the quality of life for their residents," said Lt. Gov. Skillman, who also serves as Secretary of Agriculture and Rural Development. "I am pleased to award this grant to Fulton County. It shows good foresight to investigate the options available to improve your community."

The planning grant will be used to fund a report summarizing the current issues the Wayne Township fire station faces including the size of the bays, doors, restrooms, lack of office space, and meeting rooms. Once a plan has been prepared, it will be released to the community to make additional suggestions.

The CDBG grant program has proven to be an effective tool for community-based planning and research initiatives that improve local quality of life and economic opportunities.



Master Gardener Course

Purdue Cooperative Extension Service of Fulton County will be conducting Master Gardener classes beginning Thursday, September 6, from 6 to 9 p.m. Classes will be held every Thursday evening for 13 weeks, excluding Thanksgiving. All classes will be held at the fairgrounds in Rochester. The Master Gardener program offers intensified training on a broad range of gardening topics through an in-depth gardening course and follow-up educational program. Sessions will include the following topics: soils, plant nutrition, plant growth, diseases, insects, weeds, lawns, trees, vegetables, flowers, houseplants, fertilization and pesticide safety. Participants will receive a notebook and have a chance to participate with others interested in gardening. The cost of the course is \$110. To receive the Master Gardener certificate after completion of the course, you will need to volunteer 35 hours of your time to the Cooperative Extension Service in a variety of community service projects related to gardening. This program is very active in the community and Master Gardeners are included in many community projects.

According to Sharon Berry, Family Birthing Center Nurse Manager. "We have launched the Welcome Baby Softly program to facilitate the bonding between mother and baby during the first hour after birth. This gives the baby the very best possible start in life."

"By delaying the routine medical procedure for the baby until after the first hour, mom, dad and baby get to enjoy this very important time together in the home-like birthing suites. If the delivery is by cesarean, we also follow this procedure in the recovery room," Mrs. Berry explained.

This bonding time also adds in the success of breastfeeding, which has been proven to provide the optimal nutrition and perfect, life-sustaining food for baby. Breastfeeding provides nutritional and health advantages that last far beyond infancy, and offers health benefits for the mother, as well.

PMH has two nurses on staff in the Birthing Center who are lactation specialists—a Certified Lactation Consultant (IBCLC) and a Certified Lactation Counselor. They can be reached at the hospital for questions and help with breastfeeding issues, even if the baby was not delivered at Pulaski Memorial Hospital.

Breastfeeding with the skin to skin contact between mother and baby in the first hour or so after birth has been linked to positive health outcomes, including immediate protection from bacteria and viruses the baby is exposed to, less risk of jaundice, and improved milk production and less blood loss in the mother.

In the early moments after birth, babies are in a very alert state and are ready to learn and get to know

The 2006 pay 2007 taxes have not been determined as of the date of this notice. The amounts listed for the minimum bids include an estimate of the entire 2006 pay 2007 taxes. The estimate was calculated by adding the 2005 pay 2006 first and second installments together and then adding an additional five percent (5%). There may be additional taxes due resulting from actual amounts calculated for 2006 payable 2007. The Auditor and Treasurer specifically reserve the right to withhold from the sale any parcel which has been listed in error, or which otherwise become ineligible for sale either prior to 9/14/2007 or during the duration of the sale.

 Questions & Answers
 About Our Environment

Dear EarthTalk: How do I find a Styrofoam recycler in my area? My company receives huge sheets of the stuff on a regular basis and it just gets thrown straight into the trash. What can a business do to get this stuff recycled economically and efficiently?
 -- S.R.M., Mesa, AZ

Known within the packaging industry as expanded polystyrene (EPS) and usually bearing the "#6" recycling symbol, Styrofoam (which is actually the trademark name for Dow

Chemical's product) has long been an environmental bugaboo, as it contains chemicals known to cause central nervous system damage and other health problems for workers regularly exposed to it. And since it is difficult and expensive to recycle, EPS tends to clog landfills already teeming with toxic garbage.

But EPS has proven to be one of the lightest and least costly forms of packaging material, so the industry has worked hard to make recycling it more cost-effective and convenient. More than 80 packaging manufacturers, polystyrene suppliers and equipment makers joined together in 1991 to form the Alliance of Foam Packaging Recyclers (AFPR). The Maryland-based industry association works to facilitate recycling between EPS manufacturers and the companies that buy from them. It currently boasts of overseeing the recycling of 10-12 percent of the post-consumer EPS packaging produced every year.

Member companies, which provide drop-off services at their facilities, reprocess up to 60 percent of the EPS foam collected and incorporate it directly into new packaging. Some of the material is reformulated and used in a wide variety of durable plastic products. Currently, more than 110 plant locations serve as collection centers which together receive upwards of 50 million pounds of post-consumer EPS packaging each year. AFPR provides a comprehensive list of EPS drop-off locations from coast-to-coast on its website. While companies sending the EPS in for recycling must bear the shipping or drop-off costs, they may save money over paying for disposal fees at the landfill.

One caveat: AFPR does not get involved in the recycling of the foam "peanuts" so often used as packaging filler. Most "pack-and-ship" shops (like UPS stores) will accept used but otherwise clean foam peanuts to reuse in their own shipments. Otherwise, the Plastic Loose Fill Council, another trade group, runs a free web-based database where users can find a local drop-off center by simply punching in their zip code.

Also, food service managers should bear in mind that recycling of soiled food-grade EPS is more difficult and expensive due to issues of bacterial contamination. Most EPS packaging recycling centers will not accept such tainted foam. Many food service companies have followed the lead of McDonald's and phased-out their use of EPS containers for disposable dishware and to-go orders.

Companies that don't find it convenient to recycle or otherwise dispose of large amounts of EPS (food-grade or otherwise) might want to consider purchasing one or more StyroMelt machines from UK-based Purex. The technology uses a thermal compaction process to reduce the volume of EPS by up to 95 percent. The resulting solid EPS "briquettes" are dense enough to make for good recycling fodder, and also take up much less room than the foam they started out as if they end up

in the landfill.


