Trail of Courage, Sept. 15 and 16

You can step back in time to an entirely different life during the upcoming 32nd annual Trail of Courage Living History Festival, Sept. 15 and 16, at Rochester. The Potawatomi Indians were marched single file down Rochester's Main Street on September 5, 1838, on the forced removal known as the Trail of Death. Since 1976, this festival has honored the American Indians and shown life before the removal when this was still Potawatomi territory.

Frontier Indiana comes alive with foods cooked over wood fires, period music and dance, traditional crafts, historic camps and trading, canoe rides on the river, and much more. It is produced by the Fulton County Historical Society. This event combines the genealogy of the Potawatomi Indians and the settlers who lived in Fulton County and northern Indiana in the early 1800s with the rendezvous events, stage programs and the historic canoe landing and fur trade skit on the Tippecanoe River. The Trail of Courage is held at the FCHS grounds four miles north of Rochester on U.S. 31. Admission is \$6 for adults, \$2 for children (6-11) and free for children age five and under. Hours are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 15 and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 16.

A unique presentation of an eagle feather to the Potawatomi Trail of Death Association will take place at 1:30 p.m. Saturday at the Indian dance arena to thank all who helped commemorate the 1838 Trail of Death removal from Indiana to Kansas. The feather is from Gary Wiskigeamatyuk, Cypress, California, member of the Prairie Band Potawatomi, whose ancestor Chief Abram Burnett was on the Trail of Death. You can visit his web site at www.wiskigeamatyuk.com. A branch of the FCHS, the Potawatomi Trail of Death Association, has a web site, www.potawatomi-tda.org, and operates the Indian Awareness booth at the Trail of Courage.

This year's honored Potawatomi family will be Smokey McKinney, Haskell Indian Nations University, Lawrence, Kansas. He is a member of the Prairie Band, who teaches Potawatomi language and history at <http://www.kansasheritage.org/pb/p/talk/home.html>. He will tell their story at 10:30 a.m. on the Chippeway Village stage both days.

New this year will be Sarah Miller, Kewanna, playing guitar and violin. Her church class will perform a Hebrew dance. Three authors will sell and autograph their new books and give talks on the stage. John McMullen, Evansville, will tell about *The Last Blackrobe of Indiana and the Potawatomi Trail of Death*. Keith Drury, professor of religion

at Indiana Wesleyan University, Marion, will tell about *Walking the Trail of Death* and Mike Floyd, chief of the *Eel River Tribe*, will tell about their Welsh ancestry and famous Chief Little Turtle.

The public is invited to join in the Indian dances at 2 p.m., which are held in an arena encircled by teepees. The drum will be All Nations Drum led by John Helton, Kenton, Ohio. Head dancers will be Zania Russell, Westminster, Colorado, a descendant of Chief Keesis, who was on the 1838 Trail of Death from Indiana to Kansas. She is a member of the Prairie Band Potawatomi. The head man will be Tim Jordan, Peru, first chief of the Hawk Band of the American Metis Aboriginal Association. George Godfrey, Athens, Illinois, member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, will act as emcee. He is president of the Potawatomi Trail of Death Association and has been dancing at the Trail of Courage since 1988. Godfrey had an ancestor on the 1838 Trail of Death.

The Trail of Courage includes historic encampments representing the French and Indian War, Voyageurs, Revolutionary War, War of 1812, Western Fur Trade, Plains Indian teepees, and Woodland Indiana wigwam village. A special re-creation of a Miami Village includes wigwams and lifeways demonstrations, such as making cattail mats. There is also a re-creation of Chippeway, the first trading post, post office and village in Fulton County in 1832. Food purveyors and traditional craftsmen set up in wooden booths to demonstrate and sell their wares. Craftsmen also sell pre-1840 trade goods from blankets and in historic merchant tents, offering a variety of items from clothing and jewelry to knives and candles, everything needed to live in frontier days. Canoe rides, muzzle loading shooting, tomahawk throwing contests, and a frontier blab school add to the frontier activities.

Two stages with frontier music and dance present programs from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Since the early 1980s FCHS has received grants from the Indiana Arts Commission and the National Endowment for the Arts to help pay for musicians and dancers including the 42nd Royal Highlanders, Steve McPhail as Johnny Appleseed, Aztec dancers, Shakin' Hammers String Band, Mark and Lisa Woolever, Susan and Gary Brown, Beverly

Vanderpool and her Frontier Blab School, Chief White Eagle and his Indian lore; and Indian dancers and drum. Many volunteers provide programs such as the Frontier Frolic dance called by Shirley Willard, Nan Edwards' dogs pulling travois, Dr. John Haste and his frontier animals, the Schultz family and their goats and kids, Phyllis Whitmore and her Woodland Indian storytelling, the Riddle School 4th grade dancers; Hannah Jones and her fiddle, Dan and Dale Lybarger and their Native American Indian flute music. Both Catholic and Protestant worship services are held at 9 a.m. Sunday morning.

Pioneer foods are cooked over wood fires. Visitors can feast on buffalo burgers, chicken and noodles, barbecue, ham and beans, venison chili, Indian fry bread and tacos, fish and chips cooked in big iron kettles, apple dumplings, corn on the cob, apple sausage and more, including ice cream, one of George Washington's favorite treats. Local clubs cook and serve these historic foods to fund their projects including the Rotary, Kappa Delta Phi, Swingin' Dudes Square Dancers, Grass Creek Lions Club and the Fulton County Historical Society. A Navajo family, Anthony and Mary Ann Yazzie, of Merrillan, Wisconsin, make fry bread and Navajo tacos. A black family, Harvey and Beverly Jackson, Rochester, do the barbecue and sweet potato pie and also exhibit a frontier African-American house. Many people come to the festival just for the delicious food.

The grounds are handicap accessible. Free tram rides are available to take people from the museum, round barn and Living History Village at the north end of the grounds to the festival area. The museum and village are open with costumed hosts and free admission.

Volunteers can earn free admission to the Trail of Courage by working half a day. To volunteer or for more information, call the museum at 574-223-4436. Free parking is provided on the FCHS grounds. Plenty of free benches are available to set and rest.

Public Hearing September 6 Attendees Needed!

A public hearing will be held at 7 p.m. Thursday, September 6, in conjunction with the monthly Kewanna town council meeting on the town's application for a Community Focus Fund grant from the Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs. The grant, along with local funds and an interest-free loan from FEDCO, will be used to upgrade the local sewage treatment plant.

The work at the sewage treatment plant is imperative, but the town must secure a grant in order to perform the work without raising sewage bills.

IT IS VERY IMPORTANT THAT KEWANNA RESIDENTS ATTEND THIS PUBLIC HEARING AND EXPRESS THEIR APPROVAL OF THE WORK AND THE GRANT APPLICATION. A good attendance at the public hearing will give the town more "points" in the scoring process for the grant application. During the last grant round, the town missed the grant cut-off by 18 points. The hearing will be the first item on the agenda and those present for the hearing can leave as soon as it is over, if they choose.



Ethan Zartman Part of Role Model Program

Ethan Zartman, a junior basketball player at Caston High School, is one of 126 student-athletes across the state to be included in the IHSAA's role model program this year.

Indiana's high school athletes can't measure up to the paychecks of players in the big leagues, but they are every ounce the role model. The Indiana High School Athletic Association (IHSAA) Role Model Program, now in its fifth year, shines a spotlight on Hoosier teens that excel both on and off the court. Superior grades, outstanding character and community involvement are just some of the characteristics embodied by the 126 sophomores, juniors and seniors selected for this honor for the 2007-08 school year. This year's effort serves to address vital health and wellness issues concerning teens, such as abstaining from alcohol and tobacco use, while encouraging students to recognize their role model status in the community. Funding for the program is

provided by the Indiana Tobacco Prevention and Cessation Agency along with its community and minority coalitions, National City, Smokefree Indiana, Printing Partners, members of the Circle City Group and several community-based organizations. Fulton County schools are able to participate in this year's program thanks to Smokefree Fulton-Kosciusko Counties.

The student-athletes selected for the program will be featured on posters, pocket schedules and counter cards. Each school will receive 200 customized posters and 1,000 pocket schedules. The materials will feature messages discouraging tobacco use and carry the headlines: "My Game is My Life. My Life is Tobacco Free: and "Turn Your Back" in reference to teens turning their back on tobacco. Fall sports materials, including student-athlete information, are currently being distributed while winter sports materials will be distributed in mid-November and spring in January.

Educators are encouraged to display the posters and distribute the pocket schedules in their high school, the middle and elementary schools that feed their

high school and in local businesses throughout the community.

According to statistics from the Indiana State Department of Health, more than 19,000 Indiana youth become new smokers each year and nearly 10,000 Hoosiers die annually from smoking-related health problems. Educating young people on the dangers of smoking is an important step in reducing the effects of tobacco use. The IHSAA and its corporate sponsors believe the role model program will help encourage young people to abstain from tobacco or to stop any current tobacco use.

SIGNIFICANCE OF LOCAL ELECTIONS

Traditionally, Labor Day, in addition to honoring labor, is a day during an election year, whereas national and state political candidates inaugurate, or "kick off" their campaigns with public appearances and speeches, informing the potential voters that they are electable in November.

Yet, small town municipal elections are normally muted, the candidates non-partisan, issueless and having no agenda. Generally speaking, local elections such as town and township government offices are essentially "popularity contests", whereby the candidates "toss their hats into the ring" and if nominated or appointed, and if eventually elected "get their feet wet". Unfortunately, voter turnout is often of a low percentage, often attributed to apathy and powerlessness; "no matter what I, the voter, say or do, the powers-that-be are going to do what they want."

However, local elections are significant even though interest in local politics today is less than 100%, candidates are reluctant to come forth and eligible voters don't vote. Despite the facts, no level of government affects the citizens more than their local government. The voice of the voter is most likely heard and acted upon at the local level than at the vast and seemingly impersonal federal, state or even

county level of government.

Local elections determine who will lead our community, establish a civic tone, and improve the quality of life.

The public servants of the town have an important impact on the day-to-day lives of the constituents in the choices they make, and the civic direction they take. Local government officials are the "heart and soul" of our democratic republic.

Civic-minded voters, the "life blood of the political process", should let their elected representatives know what they like and dislike about our community, thereby local government will act more effectively to serve the citizens, improve the quality of life, and enable the "pursuit of happiness" as granted in the Declaration of Independence.
