Town Hall, Police Department to Relocate

The Kewanna town council made plans to move the town hall, clerk-treasurer's office and police department to the former medical clinic on South Logan Street when it met Thursday evening, November 1. The council has been unable to locate medical professionals to lease the building and decided to make use of the building as a town hall beginning the first of the year when Jennifer Kay takes over as town clerk-treasurer. The clerk's office has been operating out of The Observer office on Main Street for the past 28 years during which Karen Good has been serving as clerk-treasurer. The building will also house the police department and the town council meeting room.

Tom Mate, head of the Kewanna Fall Festival, gave a report on the 2007 event and shared some plans for next year.

John Cochran reported that a group from Purdue University is studying Kewanna and the surrounding area to determine if the community is under-served by the health-care industry. He suggested that town council members accompany him to Purdue to meet with the group and/or invite the group to Kewanna. He also suggested a public meeting in 2008 to determine if local residents would support a health care clinic here. The location of the clinic will be determined if and when it materializes.

Casi Cramer, Area Plan director, presented copies of five resolutions for the council's consideration. All five resolutions were introduced and went through first and second readings. These resolutions include: Resolution to Adopt the Initial Area Comprehensive Plan;

Resolution to Adopt the Initial Area Zoning Ordinance; Resolution to Adopt the Area Subdivision Control Ordinance; Resolution to Adopt the Initial Area Zone Map; and Resolution to Adopt the Initial Area Fee Ordinance. The third reading and final vote will take place at the next regular meeting of the town council, December 6.

The town marshal, fire department and town superintendent submitted reports.

The marshal's report revealed seven traffic warnings, four criminal arrests, 52 calls answered and 1,691 miles patrolled. The marshal and all deputies participated in a range day October 15 at the Sand Burr Gun Ranch. A Halloween safety night was conducted in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station October 24.

The fire department responded to three town calls in October, all medical, and four township calls, one fire and three medical.

The new clerk-treasurer will be Jennifer Kay who ran unopposed and received 79 votes. The newly elected officials will take office January 1.

attended a half-day seminar in Bourbon dealing with sewage treatment lagoons. A new fluoride testing meter was purchased. Annual water samples were pulled at both well houses and taken to South Bend for testing. The Fulton County Highway Department power broomed the parking lot at the fire station and excess stone was hauled away. The leaf machine was serviced and leaf pick up has begun. The irrigator at the sewage treatment plant has been drained and the plugs pulled for the winter. The superintendent made a trip to Crown Point to inspect a new lagoon they were installing using black top for the liner, but determined it would not be cost effective for Kewanna. The water works pumped a total of 1,104,200 gallons of water during October.

The council set the pay for the poll workers for the town election on November 6.

The 2008 budget for the water works was okayed.

Refrigerated Toboggan Opens November 23

Thrilling riders with speeds of nearly 40 miles per hour, the toboggan at Pokagon State Park will open for another season Friday, November 23.

The refrigerated toboggan, the only one in the Hoosier state and one of only three in the Midwest, typically operates Friday from 5 to 10 p.m.; Saturday 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. and Sunday and holidays, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. On opening day, the toboggan has extended hours from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.

The 1,780-foot dual-lane toboggan will remain open weekends through Sunday, March 2. The toboggan operates even if there is no snow on the ground. Park personnel may close the slide if the temperature falls below zero degrees.

Riders arrive at the bottom of the toboggan in approximately 35 seconds. Visitors can enjoy coffee, soup and sandwiches and a fire at the warming center adjacent to the toboggan.

Toboggans rent for \$10 per hour and hold up to four people. In order to ride, children must be old enough to follow directions. No cameras are allowed, along with no group reservations or all-day rentals. Sleds are rented on a first-come, first-serve basis. Riders may rent up to four toboggans with a valid driver's license. Cash, credit cards and checks are accepted. (The price for the toboggan is subject to change.)

The daily entrance fee into the park is \$4 per Indiana vehicle Monday-Thursday; \$5 Friday-Sunday and \$7 per out-of-state vehicle seven days a week.

Pokagon State Park is located six miles north of Angola, near the intersection of Interstate 69 and Interstate 80/90 (the Indiana Toll Road). For more information on the toboggan, call (800) LAKE-101 or visit www.lakes101.org.



Community-Associated Methicillin Resistant Staphylococcus Aureus

Staph infections are most commonly associated with hospitals. However, there has been much attention regarding Community-Associated MRSA due to recent outbreaks in schools and other public places.

What is CA-MRSA?

Staph and MRSA can also cause illness in persons outside of hospitals and health-care facilities. MRSA infections that are acquired by persons who have not been recently (within the past year) hospitalized or had a medical procedure (such as dialysis, surgery, catheters) are known as CA-MRSA infections. Staph or MRSA infections in the community are usually manifested as skin infections, such as pimples and boils, and occur in otherwise healthy people.

What does a staph or MRSA infection look like?

Staph bacteria, including MRSA can cause skin infections that may look like a pimple or boil and can be red, swollen, painful, or have pus or other drainage. More serious infections may cause pneumonia, bloodstream infections, or surgical wound infections.

How can I prevent staph or MRSA skin infections?

Practice good hygiene:

- ✓ Keep your hands clean by washing thoroughly with soap and water or using an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- ✓ Keep cuts and scrapes clean and covered with a bandage until healed.
- ✓ Avoid contact with other people's wounds or bandages.
- ✓ Avoid sharing personal items such as towels or razors.



Educating young people on the dangers of smoking is an important step in reducing the effects of tobacco use. The IHSAA and its corporate partners believe this program will help to encourage young people to abstain from tobacco or to stop any current tobacco use. Since the program's inception more than 77,000 posters, 242,000 pocket schedules and 160,000 trading

cards have been distributed in 78 counties.

"All of our role models lead healthy and positive lives," added Ress. "We know that through this program they are encouraging others to do the same."





Questions & Answers About Our Environment

Dear EarthTalk: Is it true that some ingredients in common air fresheners can cause health problems? -- Mike Jaworski, Seattle, WA

Air fresheners are a \$1.72 billion industry in the United States. An estimated 75 percent of homes use them regularly. According to a September 2007 report released by the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC), most common household air fresheners contain potentially noxious chemicals that degrade the quality of indoor air and may even affect hormones and reproductive development, particularly in babies.

As part of its "Clearing the Air" study, NRDC researchers tested 14 brands of common household air fresheners and found that 12 contained chemicals known as phthalates. Only two, Febreze Air Effects and Renuzit Subtle

Effects, contained no detectable levels of phthalates. Products testing positive included ones marketed as "all-natural" and "unscented." None of the brands tested listed phthalates on their labels.

Phthalates are "hormone-disrupting" chemicals that can be particularly dangerous for young children and unborn babies. Like some other man-made chemicals, phthalates can affect normal hormonal processes—those that control brain, nervous and immune system development, reproduction, mental processing and metabolism—by blocking them altogether, throwing off the timing or "mimicking" natural hormones and interacting with cells themselves, with very unhealthy consequences. The State of California notes that five types of phthalates—including one commonly used in air freshener products—are "known to cause birth defects or reproductive harm."

Despite these issues, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) does not regulate the use of phthalates or require the labeling of phthalate content on

products. Other governments take the phthalate threat more seriously. The European Union forbids the most harmful phthalates in cosmetics or toys, and California Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger is expected to soon sign similar legislation for his state.

NRDC bemoans the fact that the U.S. government does not test air fresheners for safety or require manufacturers to meet specific health standards. "More than anything, our research highlights cracks in our safety system," says Dr. Gina Solomon, a senior NRDC scientist. "Consumers have a right to know what is put into air fresheners and other everyday products they bring into their homes," she says, adding that the government should keep a watchful eye on potentially dangerous products.

In conjunction with the study, NRDC—along with the Sierra Club, the Alliance for Healthy Homes and the National Center for Healthy Housing—is petitioning federal agencies to start assessing the risk air fresheners pose to consumers by testing all products now on the market. And NRDC has already begun working directly with some manufacturers to find ways to eliminate phthalates from these products.

NRDC recommends that consumers be selective and purchase only air fresheners that have the least amount of phthalates. Better yet, the group suggests consumers first try to reduce household odors by tending to their root causes or


