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## Postage Going Up

New postage rates will take effect January 8. First class mail will cost \$.39 for a one ounce letter and \$.63 for a two ounce letter. Postcards will go from \$.23 to \$.24.

The price increase, the first since 2002, was made necessary by a federal law that passed in 2003 requiring the Postal Service to place \$3.1 billion in an escrow account.

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## Formaldehyde: Have You Had Your Daily Dose?

Millions of Americans every day are willingly drinking a chemical that breaks down into formaldehyde in the digestive system. Why do they do this? Because they think it's good for them; because they want to lose weight or, at least, to avoid gaining weight; and because they, along with millions more, like to drink soda. They know sugar is unhealthy, so they choose "diet" soda.

Do they know they are introducing formaldehyde into their bodies? Probably not. Unfortunately, we can't always believe what the advertisers tell us, even the really big names in soda manufacturing. We have to take the trouble to know at least a little about what we are consuming.

Aspartame, a sugar substitute marketed under several household names such as NutraSweet and Equal, has a complex chemical structure. One part of that structure is methanol, commonly known as wood alcohol. Methanol itself is already a controversial ingredient. There is strong evidence to suggest that it has caused blindness and even death when consumed in quantity.

It gets worse. When consumed as part of the aspartame chemical, the methanol is broken down by the small intestine into formaldehyde, which is a strong preservative known to the general public for its use in preserving body parts in jars. The formaldehyde is further converted in the intestines to formic acid, the same poison conveyed by ant stings. That's not antacid, a substance commonly taken to settle the stomach, but ant acid, a toxic acid, which of course does just the opposite. One common practical use of formic acid is as an activator to strip epoxy and urethane coatings. This is not a substance calculated for the well-being of the human digestive systems.

True, it is not likely that the amount of aspartame in a can of soda will kill you or send you to the hospital; it is true that many foods we know and love are not traditionally classified as "healthy." But there is a significant difference between eating a food generally considered unhealthy - for example, a candy bar - and eating something that is actually a toxic chemical. Sugar is not healthy, but it isn't a poison.

Today, aspartame is available in a huge variety of popular food items - cakes, cookies, gum, beverages and many others. Read the small print on the gum packets at the grocery store checkout counter. You might be surprised what you find.

Since its 1981 approval, the FDA has published a list of close to 100 symptoms of aspartame

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poisoning. The FDA admits approximately 80% of the consumer complaints it receives each year are aspartame-related. Just a few of the documented physical side effects are abdominal pain, asthma, burning eyes or throat, diarrhea, fatigue, heart palpitations and death. Yes, death is listed as one of the possible side-effects. And there is also a long list of mental side-effects, including mental confusion, irritability and memory loss.

Unfortunately, halting consumption does not completely reverse the physical damage and mental side-effects. However, there is something effective you can do.

According to the *New York Times* bestseller *Clear Body, Clear Mind* by author and humanitarian L. Ron Hubbard, toxins are stored in the fatty tissues in the body and can remain there for years after the initial exposure to the toxins occurred. The book offers a program that can reduce the amount of toxins in the body. This supervised program is a careful balance of exercise to increase circulation, vitamin and mineral supplements and time sweating in the sauna. Many of those who have completed the program since its inception in 1979 have experienced results such as thinking more clearly and having more energy.

This program, which is endorsed by many health professionals, was administered to New York firefighters who were suffering from side-effects of exposure to toxins at Ground Zero. The program received rave reviews. One graduate, a firefighter of 19 years who had been told his days were over because of his symptoms, reported simply and joyfully, "I am finally back to my old self!"

## BUDGET BILLING PAYMENTS FOR SOME NIPSCO CUSTOMERS TO INCREASE

MERRILLVILLE, Ind.

Northern Indiana Public Service Company today announced about one third of the utility's 200,000 customers on budget billing payment plans will see an increase in their monthly budget payment beginning with their January 2006 bills. NIPSCO performs an annual mid year review of all budget plans in December to determine if payments need to be either increased or decreased based on the customer's estimated actual usage for the budget year.

"The budget billing plan is probably one of the best tools customers can use to manage their winter heating bills," said Customer Contact Center Manager Debora Owen. "By making this mid winter adjustment budget plans will be much closer to actual usage when accounts "settle up" in May 2006.

Budget payments are calculated in May of each year and are based on historical usage and the anticipated cost of natural gas for the coming 12-month period. Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, however, which affected major Gulf of Mexico producing areas, drove up wholesale natural gas prices this winter even further than expected requiring, in some cases, adjustments to budget billing plan payments.

Customers requiring an adjustment in their monthly budget billing payment received a message on their December bill reflecting the new payment amount and that it would be effective with their January 2006 statement.

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**National Radon Action Month**

During National Radon Action Month, our Nation is reminded of the serious danger that radon gas poses in our homes. The Environmental Protection Agency estimates that radon causes about 20,000 deaths from lung cancer in the U.S. annually. Exposure to indoor radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer after cigarette smoking, and the U.S. Surgeon General has warned that radon is a national health problem.

Protecting the health of all Americans against the threat of radon gas begins with testing

your home.

Radon is natural radioactive gas released in rock, soil and water from the natural decay of uranium. It is colorless, odorless and tasteless. Fortunately, scientists have provided tools that help protect us from radon, such as a simple test that determines the level of exposure in our homes, schools and other buildings. Testing for and measurement of this dangerous gas in the indoor air we breathe is simple, inexpensive and effective. If elevated levels are detected, there are simple, cost effective steps that can be taken to reduce concentrations to acceptable levels.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is working in concert with other Federal, State and volunteer organizations to educate Americans about the risks of radon. During National Radon Action Month, I encourage all Americans to join in this crucial effort and learn more about the health risk posed by radon, test for it, and when warranted take steps to reduce

exposure to it.

As Assistant Administrator of the Office of Air and Radiation in the United States Environmental Protection Agency, I urge the recognition of the month of January as National Radon Action Month. I encourage our partners and programs to honor this observation with appropriate programs, ceremonies and activities.

ORDINANCE GRANTING EASEMENT

REGULATIONS AND USE  
OF SAID SYSTEM BY SAID  
COUNTY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY  
COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY  
OF FULTON, INDIANA, AS  
FOLLOWS:

1. Short Title: This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Cable Television Ordinance."

2. Definitions: For the purpose of this Ordinance the following terms, phrases, words, and their derivations shall have the meaning given herein. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words in the plural number include the singular number, and words in the singular number include the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely discretionary.

(a) "County" is the County of Fulton in the State of Indiana.

(b) "Company" is T.V. Cable of Winamac, Inc., the grantees of rights under this Ordinance awarding easement.

(c) "Person" is any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind.

(d) "System" shall mean the entire cable television network located in the County of Fulton.

(e) "Franchise" when used in this Ordinance shall be synonymous with the word easement. It is not the intention of the County to grant a franchise, within the ordinary legal meaning of said term, to the Company.

3. Grant of Authority: The County, after due consideration and being satisfied as to the Company's legal, technical, character, financial, and other qualifications, hereby grants to the Company a non-exclusive franchise, right and privilege to construct, erect, operate, and maintain, in, upon, along, across, above, over, and under the streets, alleys, public ways, and public places now laid out or dedicated and all extensions thereof, and additions thereto, in the County, poles, wires, cables, and underground conduits, manholes, and other television conductors and fixtures necessary for the maintenance and operation in the County of a cable television system for the purpose of distributing television and radio signals, and other electronic impulses in order to furnish television and radio programs, and various communications and other electronic services to the public. The right so granted includes the right use said streets, alleys, public ways, and public places and all manner of easements for the purpose herein set forth. To the extent possible, the Company shall make attachments to poles already in existence within the County. To the extent that existing poles are insufficient for its purposes, or if the Company is unable to negotiate arrangements satisfactory to it for use of existing poles, the Company shall have the right to erect and maintain its own poles, as necessary for the

construction and maintenance of its distribution system, subject to the approval of the County as to the location of such poles. The Company shall obtain approval from Fulton County Commissioners concerning the location of any new poles before their installation. The Company shall extend to the County, free of expense, joint use of any and all poles owned by the Company for any proper municipal purpose insofar as may be accomplished without interference with the use and enjoyment of the Company's cable and fixtures. The County shall hold the Company harmless from any and all actions, causes of action, or damage caused by the placement of County's wires or appurtenances upon the poles of the Company. The Company shall not erect or cause to be erected any poles in any area where underground electric and telephone service is furnished; in such a service area the Company's distribution system shall also be installed underground.

4. Standards and Requirements: Construction and maintenance of the transmission distribution system, including house connection shall be in accordance with the provisions of the National Electrical Safety Code prepared by the National Bureau of Standards, the National Electrical Code of Underwriters, and such applicable ordinances and regulations of the County affecting electrical installations which may be, from time to time, in effect. The system shall be adequately grounded according to best cable industry practices. In case of any disturbance of pavement, sidewalk, driveway, or other surface, the Company shall, at its own expense and in a manner approved by the County, remove, replace and restore all pavement, sidewalk, driveway, or surface so disturbed in as good condition as before the work was commenced. In event the County shall elect to alter or change any street, alley, easement or public way, requiring relocation of the facilities of the Company, the Company, upon reasonable notice by the County, shall remove and relocate the same at its own expense. The Company shall, when necessary, on the request of any person holding an appropriate permit issued by the County, temporarily raise or lower its lines to permit the moving of any building or other structure. The actual expenses of such temporary removal shall be paid by the person requesting the same and the Company shall have the right to require such payment in advance or such temporary removal. Said payment shall be reasonable and in accord with the standard practices and charges of the community. Whenever it is necessary to shut off or interrupt services for the purpose of making repairs, installations, or adjustments, the Company shall do so at such times as will cause the least amount of inconvenience to its customers.

5. Liability and Indemnification: The Company shall and hereby agrees to indemnify and hold the County, its officers and agents harmless from and against any and all claims, or cause of action, liability, judgments, damages, costs, losses, or expenses arising out of the

Company's construction, installation, maintenance, or operation of the Cable Television System authorized herein, including, but not limited to, any claim, demand, or suit made or brought against the County arising out of the content of any program transmitted through the said system. The County shall notify the Company's representative in the County within fifteen (15) days after the presentation of any claim or demand to the County, either by suit or otherwise, made against the County on account of any contract, act, or omission to act, negligent, or otherwise, on the part of the Company. Upon receipt of such notice, the Company shall, at the option of the County, undertake to defend such claim or demand in the name of the County. The Company shall carry and pay the cost of maintaining liability insurance providing coverage against the following risks and in the minimum amounts sufficient to support its obligations under the provisions of this section. The Company shall furnish to the County a certificate of insurance outlining the coverage specified above. Said certificate shall be presented to the Fulton County Auditor annually. The Company shall comply with all the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Laws of Indiana.

6. Local Office: The Company shall maintain a toll free telephone number where inquiries or complaints regarding quality of service, equipment malfunctions, billing disputes, and similar matters. Inquiries or complaints shall be received during normal business hours, 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. All complaints and inquiries will be investigated, responded to, or acted upon as promptly as it is practical, and unless circumstances otherwise require, within three business days of their receipt.

7. Conditions of Road Occupancy:

(a) The Company may enter into one or more contracts with the light, gas, water utilities in the County of Fulton, the telephone company or the owner or lessee of any poles or posts located within the County to whatever extent such contract or contracts may be expedient and of advantage to the Company in furnishing the services covered by this franchise to its customers.

(b) The Company system poles, wires, and appurtenances shall be located, erected and maintained so that none of it shall endanger or interfere with the lives of persons, or interfere with any improvements the County may deem proper to make, or hinder unnecessarily or obstruct the free use of the streets, alleys, bridges, easements, or public property.

8. Subscriber Contracts: No contract as to the length of service for a regular monthly subscriber shall be required by the Company. The Company agrees it shall be the right of the subscriber to start or terminate his service on the cable according to his own wishes by making advance payments to commence service and to terminate said by giving the Company reasonable notice. For the purposes of termination reasonable notice shall be fourteen [14] days. Any rights of the

customer are enforceable by said customer, and the County shall not be obligated to prosecute or defend any actions between the customer and the Company arising from the terms contained herein or the relationship between the customer and the Company. It is hereby acknowledged, however, that equipment installed by the Company on behalf of the subscriber shall remain the property of the Company, and shall be subject to reasonable inspection and service by the Company at reasonable hours and shall be subject to removal upon termination of the service. Upon removal of the equipment from the customer's real estate the Company shall repair at its own cost any damage done to said real estate during said removal.

The service rendered by the Company shall be available to all inhabitants of the County along reasonable pole routes of the Company.

9. Transfer and Right of Acquisition:

No sale or transfer shall be effective until the purchaser, and seller, assignee, lessee, or transferee has filed with the Board of Commissioners of Fulton County a request, duly executed, reciting the fact of such sale, assignment or lease, accepting the terms of this ordinance and agreeing to perform all conditions thereof. In addition, the Board of Commissioners of Fulton County may require such additional proof of financial responsibility, as it deems necessary upon investigation. The rights granted under this ordinance shall not be sold or transferred by the Company to any outside interest except upon written notice to the County not less than thirty [30] days before such transfer or sale and subject to the approval of the County through its Board of Commissioners of Fulton County. Said approval shall not be unreasonable withheld.

10. Franchise Terms: The easement granted the Company herein shall terminate twenty (20) years from date of this Ordinance, provided however, that the easement may be renewed for successive twenty (20) year terms if the County shall determine, after a public hearing as provided herein, that such renewal would be in the best interests of the County and its residents. It shall be the Company's obligation to apply for renewal of said easement. Failure to so apply shall result in an automatic termination of the easement. Said approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.

(a) Notice and Hearing: Not less than forty-five (45) days prior to the termination date of any term, the Company shall give written notice to the County of such termination date, which written notice shall request a date, time, and place for a public hearing on the renewal of the easement desired by the Company. Notice of the date, time and place of said hearing and the purposes thereof shall also be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the County serviced not less than one per week for two successive weeks; the last publication date being not less than ten (10) days prior to the date of the hearing. The Company as well as all members of the public interested in the renewal of the easement or the modification of its terms shall be heard, and the County shall thereupon have the right to renew or not renew the easement or to modify the terms thereof. For the purposes of this paragraph only any and all actions required hereunder

shall be conducted by the Board of Commissioners of Fulton County.

11. Rates and Charges: The Company agrees that all rates charged to subscribers to its services shall be standard, uniform and reasonable. The County has no control over any rate and charges. The Company by virtue of this Ordinance does not become a County utility subject to its power to regulate and control rates.

12. Commencement of Construction: Upon grant of this easement to construct and maintain a community television system in the County of Fulton, the Company may enter into contracts with light, gas, and water utility which service the County of Fulton, telephone company or others for the uses of poles and posts necessary for proper installation of the system, obtain right-of-way permits from appropriate State, County and Federal officials necessary to cross highways or roads under their respective jurisdictions to supply main trunk lines from the Company's received antennas, obtain permission from the Federal Aviation Authority to erect and maintain antennas suitable to the needs of the system and its subscribers, and obtain whatever other permits the City, County, State or Federal Agency may require. In the construction, installation and maintenance of its system the Company will use steel, cable, and electronic devices all of specialized and advanced design and type.

13. Construction Schedule:

Upon the passage of this ordinance, all works necessary for the installation of the cable television system in the County shall be completed within twelve [12] months or said ordinance shall be null and void. Only the area built within twelve [12] months, only extensions of 5280 feet or less will be built without the written permission of the Board of Commissioners of Fulton County. A certificate of completion shall be filed with the Board of Commissioners of Fulton County.

14. Compliance of FCC Rules: The Company hereby agrees to comply with all FCC Rules, which apply, and any and all modifications, amendments, or deletions after the date of this Ordinance are automatically incorporated by reference herein.

15. Activities Prohibited: The Company shall not allow its cable or other operations to interfere with television reception of persons not served by the Company, nor shall the system interfere with, obstruct, or hinder in any manner, the operation of various utilities servicing the residents of Fulton County. Upon notice to the Company, it shall take whatever action is necessary to correct any interferences as outlined in this paragraph. Failure of the Company to make said corrections shall result in the repeal of this Ordinance and the Company. No notice or hearing shall be necessary for said repeal.

16. Limited Purpose: This easement is granted by the Board of County Commissioners for the County of Fulton to the Company purely for the purpose of using easements, streets, and highways of the County to erect and construct the Company's system and is not intended to convey any copyright or patent privileges whatsoever nor is said easement intended to

give the Company exclusive rights to construct a cable television system in the limits of the County.

17. **Separability:** If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct, and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

18. **Repealer:** All Ordinances or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

19. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that this Ordinance take effect from the date it shall have been passed by the board of Commissioners of Fulton County, and become effective as provided by law.

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
