Conley is a 1974 graduate of Rochester High School. Following graduation, he entered the U.S. Air Force where he earned the rank of sergeant and was an aircraft maintenance crew chief. After his military service, he worked at Fulton Metal Fabricating (later named Delta Tool). He is a member of the Midwest Association of Voice Stress Operators, Reserve Deputies Association, Indiana Sheriffs Association, National Sheriffs Association, American Legion, the Rochester Optimist Club, and the Blue Knights, a law enforcement motorcycle club dedicated to helping youth. He was also a girl's softball coach for two years. A 20-year member of the Olive Branch Church of God, Roann, Conley is also a big brother with the Big Brothers/Big Sisters organization.

Walker and his wife, Shelley, live on Mt. Zion Road. She is a Woodlawn Hospital laboratory technician. They have two daughters, Erin Wagoner, an accountant, who lives in Indianapolis with her husband, Dan, and their 5-year-old son, Jacob. Amanda Conley and her fiancé, Brandon Tugmon, are seniors at Manchester College. She is studying sociology and criminal justice and hopes to become a paralegal.

Conley notes that courtesy and professionalism are his top priorities for the sheriff's department, followed by community involvement, closer ties with other agencies and promoting officer specialization. He believes that having observed three previous sheriffs, Richard McLochlin, Bruce Baker and Roy Colvert, gives him insight into department management. He also believes his management and supervision skills learned in the military and his National Criminal Justice Institute course in police management will add to his ability to serve Fulton County residents as their sheriff.

The primary election will be May 2 and the general election will take place November 7.

Indiana Attorney General Steve Carter has announced that Ameriquest Mortgage Company, the nation's largest sub-prime lender, has agreed to pay over \$4 million to Indiana consumers, as well as make sweeping reforms of its lending practices, that states allege amounted to predatory lending. Ameriquest will pay \$325 million to 49 states and the District of Columbia.

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Cigarette Tax Increase a Health Win for Hoosiers

Indianapolis, IN- The Indiana Tobacco Prevention and Cessation (ITPC) Agency congratulates Governor Daniels' call for an increase in the cigarette excise tax as a potential health victory for Indiana that will prevent youth initiation, reduce adult tobacco use and save Hoosier lives.

"ITPC and our statewide network of over 1300 local organizations involved in tobacco prevention applaud Governor Daniels' proposed cigarette tax increase because raising the price of cigarettes is a smart and proven public health solution to reduce smoking," said Karla Sneegas, ITPC's executive director. "Research analysis by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control demonstrates conclusively that increasing the price of cigarettes will prevent youth from trying cigarettes and becoming daily smokers."

Studies show that every 10 percent increase in the price of cigarettes reduces youth smoking by seven percent and overall cigarette consumption by roughly four percent. Research shows that Indiana can expect a \$.25 cent per pack cigarette tax increase to: "prevent 26,100 kids alive today from becoming smokers," help 12,200 current adult smokers to quit "reduce Hoosier consumption by 49.5 million packs of cigarettes and" save more than \$520 million dollars in healthcare costs savings with as much as \$5.8 million from health care costs for smoking-related pregnancies and births.

"A higher cost for cigarettes at the cash register will keep more teens from being hooked by the tobacco industry," said Logan Hartshorne, a 14-year-old Indianapolis teen and spokesperson for Voice, the state's youth-led anti-tobacco movement. "Youth are really a lot more sensitive to price than adults so more of them won't smoke if it costs too much."

Indiana's cigarette tax was last raised in 2002. Beth Kohli, a 20-year smoker from Hamilton, Indiana, said she had considered quitting several times, but the last cigarette tax increase was what pushed her to make the commitment. "It made me think about what smoking was costing me, not just financially, but also in terms of my health and my family's well-being," Kohli said. "I realized I wanted to stop before the toll tobacco had taken became any greater. I quit over three years ago and haven't smoked since."

Indiana's present cigarette tax of 55.5 cents puts Indiana as the lowest in the Midwest (below states of Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin, and Ohio), and stands 36.5 cents per pack below the national average of 92 cents per pack. Over 40 states have increased tobacco taxes since Indiana last raised the rate in 2002. Currently, five states - Maine, Michigan, New Jersey, Rhode Island, and New York City have cigarette taxes of \$2.00 or more per pack.

Tobacco use is the leading preventable cause of death in Indiana, claiming more than 9,700 lives each year and costing the state \$1.91 billion annually in health care bills, including \$448.3 million in Medicaid payments alone. Close to 18,900 babies are born each year to mothers who have smoked during pregnancy and smoking-related health care costs for these babies are \$20.4 million each year.

"Governor Daniels' proposal could be a win for youth health that will lead to future benefits," Sneegas said. "Since 90% of daily smokers start

before they turn 18, a reduction in youth smoking will reap benefits for generations to come."

Voice is Indiana's youth-led movement dedicated to exposing the manipulation of teens by the tobacco industry. Voice is funded and facilitated by ITPC. The ITPC Executive Board was created to oversee funding from Indiana's share of the 1998 Master Settlement Agreement. The Board oversees the comprehensive tobacco control program, which includes media components, special youth features, enforcement, cessation initiatives and community programs in every county in Indiana. 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Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,

The American Lung Association of Indiana seeks to improve Hoosiers overall health and lower our state's tobacco healthcare costs by preventing youths from smoking, helping smokers to quit, and reducing everyone's exposure to tobacco toxins on secondhand smoke. One effective way to achieve these goals is with a "health toll" in the form of increased cigarette taxes.

There is overwhelming evidence showing that a sizeable cigarette tax will deter youth smoking. Governor Daniels suggested a tax increase of at least 25 cents per pack; however the American Lung Association of Indiana recommends an increase of at least 50 cents. Based on the experiences of other states, the increased tax on cigarettes will cause 90 million fewer packs of cigarettes to

be sold annually in Indiana, resulting in a 9.2% decline in youth smoking and a 2.1% decline in adult smokers with an overall long-term health savings that will exceed \$1 billion over five years.

A National Academy of Sciences report concluded that increased taxation of cigarettes is the most effective way to deter teens from becoming addicts. The National Cancer Policy Board believes the single most direct and reliable method for reducing consumption is to increase the price of tobacco products, thus encouraging smokers to stop and non-smokers not to start.

Raising the cigarette tax is a proven method to reduce smoking, reduce smoking related illnesses and improve the health of Hoosiers. The greatest benefit from increasing the cigarette tax is that young people are much less likely to ever start smoking, avoiding devastating, chronic, smoking related illnesses and death. Raising Indiana's cigarette tax by 50 cents per pack means that approximately 52,000 youth who might have taken up smoking won't.

American Lung Association of Indiana is committed to a health toll as a key component in a comprehensive smoking prevention and cessation program. It is our mission to prevent lung disease and promote lung health. Out of concern for the long-term health benefits to Indiana's young people, I hope our political leaders eagerly embrace an increase in our cigarette tax. Not only will we have a healthier society but a stronger economy. The reduction in tobacco use resulting from an increase in the cigarette tax, a health toll, would be a tremendous step toward saving the lives of Hoosiers, one

breath at a time.

NAP Deadline Approaching

Farmers are reminded that the sales closing date for certain spring planted crops, under the Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP), is approaching. March 15 is the sales closing date for crops such as sweet corn, cucumbers, watermelons, potatoes, peppers, pumpkins, onions, cabbage, carrots, etc. A complete listing of eligible crops is available in the Farm Service Agency office, 1252 E 100 S, Rochester.

The NAP program kicks in when natural disasters result in a catastrophic loss of production or prevented planting of an eligible crop. NAP coverage is equivalent to that provided by Catastrophic Risk Protection Plan (CAT) insurance 50% loss threshold. NAP is available for commercial crops or agricultural commodities produced for food and fiber for which CAT is not available. Livestock is not available for coverage.

NAP applications and payment of the service fees may be submitted to the Fulton County FSA office.

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DOT Announces Final Decision on Indiana Time Zone Proposals

After five months, 22 hours of public hearing testimony and more than 6,000 public comments, the U.S. Department of Transportation today announced a final rule that will change the clock for eight of 17 Indiana counties seeking to move to the Central time zone.

The Indiana counties of Daviess, Dubois, Knox, Martin, Perry, Pike, Pulaski and Starke will move from the Eastern to Central time zone beginning April 2, when the nation switches to daylight saving time, according to the final rule to be published in the *Federal Register* on Friday, Jan. 20. Nine other counties that asked the Department to make the change, including Carroll, Cass, Fulton, Lawrence, Marshall, Sullivan, St. Joseph, Vermillion and White, will remain in the Eastern time zone, the Department decided.

"This rule reflects careful consideration of every public comment we received," said U.S. Secretary of Transportation Norman Y. Mineta.

The Department's final decision follows public hearings held last November in Jasper, Logansport, South Bend and Terre Haute, as well as a review of written and videotaped comments collected from residents.

Under the Uniform Time Act of 1966, the Secretary of Transportation has the authority to set time-zone boundaries and must base decisions on the "convenience of commerce."

Seventeen Indiana counties asked the Department last September to change from Eastern to Central time. On Oct. 25, the Department issued a notice proposing Knox, Perry, Pike, St. Joseph and Starke counties move from Eastern to Central time, and made no change to time zones in the remaining 12 counties.

In its final rule, the Department decided against changing St. Joseph County's time zone based on comments received at the public hearings and in writing. The Department said a critical factor was additional comment from local leaders who initially sought a change in the time zone but also wanted to be on the same time as Elkhart, Kosciusko and Marshall counties and communities in Michigan which observe Eastern time.

While the Department's proposed rule did not approve requests for changing the time zones for Daviess, Dubois, Martin and Pulaski counties, subsequent information provided by the counties and residents supported the case for moving the counties to the Central time zone.

State Representative Bill Friend..... DISTRICT 23

Perhaps the most important issue the legislature needs to address in this short session is a transportation funding mechanism. Historically, the state has used a combination of federal transportation monies, the state gas tax and bonding to fund the maintenance and new construction for our highway system. As a state, we find ourselves at the end of a bonding program on June 30th, and the ability to continue our construction and maintenance programs is in jeopardy. Available funds will barely complete the normal upkeep necessary and construction of new highways is nearly impossible. The state is presented with a dilemma; how can we continue to improve our infrastructure with available revenues? It is a major problem with long lasting ramifications.

Infrastructure construction provides immediate job creation for laborers, equipment operators, engineers and suppliers of aggregate, concrete, asphalt and steel. If we are serious about job creation, this industry must be supported and stimulated financially. The latest statistic I've seen is that for every \$1 billion dollars invested in infrastructure, 47,000 jobs are created and or retained. It is simply hypocritical for us to discuss job creation and not be supportive of this construction industry. The people who provide the labor, supplies and engineering deserve our support because the work will improve the facilities of our state. Economic development will follow after the new roads and bridges have been built.

Governor Daniels has proposed the Major Moves program to finance our system. It is thoughtful and innovative because it proposes a new concept for Indiana to consider. The controversial part of the program is the possible lease of the Indiana toll road for an extended time period—perhaps 75 years. The Governor is trying to generate the capital to fund \$2.8 billion dollars in projects that have been approved and engineered. This administration is seeking proposals to lease the toll road for an extended period of time. It is a new concept here in Indiana, but has been used in other parts of the country successfully. Illinois, Virginia, Washington D.C., and California have used this practice and completed important projects. This week, the Governor announced that the highest bidder to lease the Indiana toll road has committed to \$3.85 billion. I don't have any pre-conceived notions about this proposal, but I am open-minded enough to listen. I do know this, the alternatives are not good and it is a proposal we must consider.

A communication came in the mail this week and it contained a petition "telling Governor Mitch Daniels not to sell the toll road." There was a

web site printed on the petition referring people to the Indiana Democratic Party. If you have received one of these petitions, please understand that the information is not correct. The proper word is lease and the state does not give up control of the toll road. Please correct those that are speaking or writing bad information.

As I state earlier, this is not an easy decision. The "deal" must be a good one if it is to be accepted. If the numbers are not good, we must move on to "Plan B". One thing is certain however, our construction industry, our infrastructure and our future economic development depend upon a program that works and benefits all Hoosiers. We shouldn't be afraid to try a new program simply because it has not been tried here before. Let's make the decision based on fact and the possibility for success, not on emotion. This is a historic opportunity for Indiana's future.

Rep. Friend's Public Water and Wastewater Projects Bill Passes out of Committee

Bill Passes 10-0

(STATEHOUSE) January 11, 2006 – House Bill 1076 (HB 1076), authored by State Representative Bill Friend (R-Macy), passed out of the Local Government Committee today by a vote of 10-0. In addition to the existing energy savings contracts, HB 1076 will provide public water and wastewater projects with guaranteed savings contracts and utility efficiency programs that may be used by local units of governments to reduce consumption and usage costs.

"I am very pleased to see this bill pass out of committee," stated Representative Friend. "This bill will not only provide energy savings for local agencies like school corporations, but it will also promote water conservation and water quality," stated Representative Friend.

Currently, public law allows local units of government to become part of a utility energy efficiency program or guaranteed energy savings program with a qualified provider to help reduce energy consumption costs or operating costs if the savings due

to an improvement will cover the costs of the improvement. If passed into law, HB 1076 will allow the same to be done for projects that will reduce water usage and consumption costs. It will also allow local units of government to enter into efficiency programs or savings contracts to provide billable revenue increases.

"It is important to provide this savings opportunity to our local units of government, because there will be more demand for conservation improvement projects that will in turn create more job opportunities for our contractors and their workers," stated Representative Friend.

Representative Friend represents House District 23, which includes portions of Elkhart, Marshall, Kosciusko, Fulton, and Miami Counties.

The Medicare Rx Access Network of Indiana is a partnership of more than 40 such organizations across the state, including many health care provider associations, patient advocacy groups, non-profit service organizations and others you already know and trust. They can provide assistance and information on the new prescription drug benefit and help you make an informed decision. One such source of information is the Indiana Association of Area Agencies on Aging (IAAAA), whose 16 member Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs) provide services throughout Indiana. IAAAA provides the following tips:

- Remember that legitimate plan providers are not allowed to market to consumers door to door or through

unsolicited e-mail. They may contact you by phone or through the mail, but they must follow any do-not-call registry rules.

- Never sign anything you don't understand. Have a trusted adviser or attorney review it.
- Don't give out your credit card number, bank account information Medicare number or social security card number over the phone or Internet unless you initiate the transaction and know with whom you are talking.
- Shred or tear into small pieces all mail solicitations, bank records or any other discarded documents that contain identifying personal information.
- Be aware of scams. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.
- Stay socially active. Isolation increases your risk of becoming a victim.
- Review the 2006 Medicare & You handbook that was mailed to every Medicare beneficiary in the fall. It contains a list of all approved Medicare drug plans and information about the coverage.
- You can verify that the plan is legitimate by calling 1-800-MEDICARE or the Senior Health Insurance Information Program of Indiana at 1-800-452-4800.

"If someone contacts you and pressures you to buy, hang up the phone or close your door," said Melissa Durr, CEO of IAAAA. "Also, make sure you clarify what is covered, what the cost of the product is, how to cancel if you change your mind and that you understand what you are buying."

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
