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

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Carousel on Display at Local Hardware

A replica of the historic Dentzel Carousel located at Riverside Park in Logansport will be on display at Kewanna Pro Hardware and Supply Thursday and Friday, February 2 and 3, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. and until noon Saturday, February 4.

The 1/12-scale carousel was hand-carved, painted and assembled by local artist, Don Kegarise. The carousel contains 43 animals including three giraffes, three goats, three reindeer, one tiger, one lion, 32 horses and ponies and three upholstered benches. It stands 18 inches high and is 36 inches in diameter. The replica took approximately a year to complete.

The idea of creating the replica occurred to Don while he watched his granddaughters enjoy rides on the carousel. He had been carving animals, but had no use for them, except to set them on a shelf. The carousel gave him the opportunity to make use of the carving talents he was trying to master. Everything is as identical to the original as Don could make it. Both the Dentzel Carousel and Don's replica move at 4 rpm, however, the Dentzel Carousel is gear driven while Don's is friction driven. The animals were created from blocks of basswood, cut to the approximate size and shape of the animal he wished to create, and then hand-carved. Many of his carvings are all one piece, while some woodworkers carve the tails, legs, ears, etc. separate and then attach them to the body. He has used human hair, compliments of a granddaughter, for the horses' tails.

Don recently displayed the carousel at a toy show held in

Winamac and was amazed at the overwhelming response of the public to his creation.

If you don't get the chance to see the carousel at Kewanna Pro Hardware this weekend, it will be on display at the Logansport Art Association building, 424 Front Street, Logansport, through February. We will have more information on this exhibit next week.

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Former Resident Inducted into Indiana Baseball Hall of Fame

Former Kewanna area resident, Bill Stoudt, was recently inducted into the Indiana Baseball Hall of Fame. Stoudt, son of the late Foster and Harriet Stoudt, became the baseball coach at Pendleton Heights High School in 1980. He has posted a career record of 516 wins and 211 losses, won 11 sectionals and three regionals in his 26 years at the helm of the baseball program. He has coached nearly every sport during a career that began at Markleville High School in the early 1970s and has been a football assistant under John Broughton since 1976. Broughton's first move after he was made head football coach at Pendleton Heights 30 years ago was to move Bill from the junior high staff to the varsity. He has coached every position, but specializes in receivers and helped Kody LeMond set school records last season with 100 catches, 1,317 yards and 16 touchdowns.

According to Broughton, Stoudt "coaches for the right reasons. He coaches because he loves to work with kids, and he's a teacher. He takes pride in his teaching, and that extends onto the field. He's the definition of what a coach is.

He makes a difference in kids' lives."

Scott Henson, a member of the 1991 regional championship baseball team, is getting into teaching in North Carolina, in part due to Stoudt's influence. According to Henson, "you always wanted to do it his way, he taught you as much about growing up and how to accept responsibility as baseball. No matter what he was talking about, you listened to what he was saying."

According to an article in the Indianapolis Star, nothing reflects Stoudt better than the school's baseball facility. It was, according to Stoudt, "in the middle of a cornfield" when he arrived, but he's nurtured a passion for the field's care in his players and developed one of the state's finest playing surfaces. With the help of the booster club, he focuses on a different aspect of the field each season.

Stoudt noted that being elected to the hall of fame is a great honor, but believes that he was just "in the right place at the right time". However, his players, co-workers and family, know that his success has a lot more to do with Bill than the time and place.

College Fair at Winamac


Winamac Community High School will host a college fair Wednesday, February 22, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. EST.

New Trail of Death Book

In December 2005 the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, Shawnee, Oklahoma, published a book about the 2003 Trail of Death Commemorative Caravan. Shirley Willard, Fulton County Historian, compiled the book and supplied it to CPN camera-ready. They had it printed and bound with plastic spiral binding. The 184 page book sells for \$15 but

only 150 copies were made. Copies were given free to the groups and individuals who helped with the caravan and erected historical markers. There are only a few left.

The book has newspaper

articles from all the towns and cities on the Trail of Death, in Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, and Kansas. It also has memories written by members of the caravan, including Potawatomi who had ancestors on the 1838 Trail of Death. There are seven pages of pictures in color. The rest are in black and white.


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From The Desk Of...

(STATEHOUSE) With the 2006 legislative session under way, a great deal of activity is stirring in the House. This week, House Republicans passed important legislation with the ultimate goal to better the lives of Hoosiers. One such important bill that passed out of the House was House Bill 1008, the 'Major Moves' program, sponsored by Governor Daniels and Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT). The initiative is a comprehensive ten-year investment plan that removes the state's transportation budget deficit and provides for the state's economic future through public-private partnerships. This week, Governor Daniels announced the top bid from State Mobility Partners (SMP) for a sum payment of \$3.85 billion to the General Assembly.

Major Moves will complete two new Ohio River Bridges, the Hoosier Heartland Highway connecting Ft. Wayne and Lafayette, the I-69 extension from Evansville to Indianapolis, an upgraded US 31 to South Bend, the Fort to Port project from Ft. Wayne to Toledo, and more than 200 other projects around Indiana. Without Major Moves, 130 or more important road projects won't be built.

Heated debate concerning the Indiana Toll Road is perhaps one of the most important aspects of the Major Moves proposal. Leasing would be similar to the long-term lease entered into by The City of Chicago for \$1.8 billion in 2004 for a company to run the Chicago Skyway. I also want to emphasize that Indiana is not selling the Toll Road. Indiana will always own the Toll Road and we will be able to resume operations if SMP fails to complete the project.

Leasing a major portion of Hoosier roads is not the only component of the plan, which calls for extending the I-69 Highway. Expansion would be feasible with traditional "pay-as-you-go" financing, and construction could not begin until 2017 and be completed in 2035, with costs to the state of approximately \$2 billion. If tolls were assessed between Indianapolis and Evansville, the state's cost would be cut dramatically and the project timeline could be compressed for earlier start and completion.

In addition to these critical areas, Republican legislators are also committed to working closely with Governor Mitch Daniels on his revolutionary "Major Moves" road construction initiative. This ten year plan would eliminate Indiana's \$2.8 billion transportation funding gap and complete many projects necessary for economic growth in our state.

Currently, our state cannot afford to make all of the transportation investments we need to support the creation of these new jobs. Doing business as usual would leave Indiana \$2.8 billion short of the funds we need to build these critical projects.

We often speak of "aiming higher" in Indiana, and in no realm is this more essential than the economy. Where the prosperity of Hoosiers is concerned, we cannot aim too high or dream too big.

Simply put, we cannot achieve a top-tier economy without a top-tier transportation system. To make sure that no Hoosier community is left behind, and that Indiana maximizes its opportunity to become the nation's logistics and distribution capital, we must make major moves, and bring into being a system of roads, bridges, rail lines,

ports, and airports second to none.

In conjunction with its proposal, the Daniels Administration released pages of much-needed improvements, many focused on providing infrastructure for sustained job growth. Improving I-65, building I-69, finishing the Hoosier Heartland Corridor, and thousands of local improvements, such as St. Rd 9, St. Rd 44, I-74, St. Rd 46, and St. Rd 58, are organized in such a way that proper funding and construction efficiency will help establish a more updated infrastructure.

Lastly, the bill calls for a \$150 that million payback will be distributed over the next three years to local communities for road and bridge construction and repair needs. The distribution is based on the current motor vehicle highway fund formula. If House Bill 1008, the Major Moves program, becomes law that will give local counties, cities and towns the following amount for each of the three years.

Cass Counties: \$ 380,189.82

- Galveston: \$ 7,038.59
- Logansport: \$ 90,435.71
- Onward: \$ 372.14
- Royal Center: \$ 3,822.52
- Walton: \$ 4,911.39

Fulton Counties: \$ 321,505.61

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
