



The Lake Bruce Conservancy District held its monthly meeting Thursday, April 13, in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station. All five directors and five freeholders were present for the meeting.

The minutes of the March meeting and the treasurer's report were read and approved.

The chairman, Norm Steigely, went through correspondence received during the month. It was noted that the conservancy district has been awarded a LARE grant in the amount of \$13,000 for aquatic weed control and surveys of the lake during the year. A new bid process was implemented this year for the letting of bids. Two contractors were sent bid forms for this year's work as required by the grant. Also, a certificate of insurance of liability coverage was received from First Source Insurance stating coverage's carried by Wightman-Petrie for the sewer project.

Steigely reported he had been in touch with the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to find out the status of the application for a grant for dredging portions of Lake Bruce. He was told that awards have not been decided upon to date but that they should be announced by the end of the month. Since the call did not seem very positive, a call was made to Senator Tom Weatherwax enlisting his help as the conservancy has jumped through every hoop required to date. Weatherwax said he would do everything in his power to help the conservancy obtain the grant this year. He has been a very ardent supporter of the efforts made by both the Lake Bruce Association and the Lake Conservancy to improve water quality and recreational opportunities at the lake.

Jay Cunningham, assistant fire chief of the Kewanna-Union Township Volunteer Fire Department, gave an informative presentation on the need to get a hydrant at Lake Bruce. He stated that under the new system, the department's rating has increased from 5 to 10 and it could mean a doubling of insurance rates for most of the people around the lake. He noted the fire department is trying to get more information on specifications and contractors for installing a hydrant and will forward that information to the conservancy. Director Tom Davies, owner of Hoosier Hide-away, will be coordinating efforts with other organizations and citizens to move this project forward.

Steve Fralish of Wightman-Petrie gave a detailed explanation of the final engineering contract

## Townwide Clean-up Saturday, May 6

Maple Street to receive discarded items from **town residents only**. Items placed in the roll-offs must exclude tires, appliances (microwaves and televisions are acceptable), hazardous wastes, yard wastes or liquid wastes of any kind. Appliances can be gotten rid of through area scrape dealers.

There will also be a trailer at the same location for the collection of used tires.

for the sewage collection and treatment project. A copy of the contract was sent to the group's attorney and he has determined the contract is fair and thorough. Therefore, the board approved the contract. Another contract for a financial advisor in the amount of \$28,000 was reviewed and approved, also based on the advice of the district's attorney. Both agreements are contingent upon the district receiving funding from Rural Development.

It was also mentioned that the income survey that is being done by the directors is over 80% complete. The goal is to have it done by the end of April so it can be sent off for certification.

It was mentioned that the conservancy would have to look at what is required by the district for liability coverage for the sewer project. Currently, the district only has professional liability coverage for the directors.

The next meeting of the conservancy district board of directors will be at 7 p.m. EDT in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station. The meeting is open to the public.

## Lake Bruce Association to hold Spring Meeting/Clean Up

The board of directors of the Lake Bruce Association will hold its spring meeting Saturday, April 22, at 9 a.m. at the home of Chuck and Gail Scheeringa, 11099 West Willow Point Drive. All board members are urged to attend.

The meeting will be followed with the spring road side clean up. Anyone needing bags for the clean up may pick them up at the Scheeringa residence. Participation by all residents is encouraged.

## Lake Residents Insurance Rates May Double

The Kewanna-Union Township Fire Department has given notification to the property owners at Lake Bruce that due to a change in the way fire protection is rated, they may see a huge increase in their homeowners insurance. The change in the rating process has moved the area from a rating of 5 to 10. Some insurance carriers have already doubled rates for some of the lake properties. This information was revealed during a presentation at a meeting of the Lake Bruce Conservancy board of directors Thursday, April 13.

Jay Cunningham, assistant fire chief, gave the presentation. He stated that the rate is determined by the response time, the distance to an adequate hydrant and the amount of water that can be made available at the scene. To get a favorable rating, the department needs to be able to pump 750 gallons of water a minute for a period of two hours.

To accomplish this, a hydrant needs to be available on the lake. The most economical system would be a dry hydrant. This would eliminate the need for a pump or any electrical connections to maintain. The base for a dry hydrant must be set at least 15 feet deep in the lake with a 6" pipe buried underground to a stand pipe that can be easily accessed by a pumper truck. There are probably only a couple of areas on the lake that would be suitable for the project.

It is hoped that the Lake Bruce Association, Lake Bruce Conservancy District and township can work together to fund this project. The fire department is currently trying to find out more information on design and qualified contractors to install the system.

Tom Davies, one of the LBCD directors, has volunteered to coordinate the project with the other organizations and the public. Any input should be addressed to him at the Hoosier Hide-Away, 574-653-2017.

## April Blood Drives


There will be two blood collection days in Fulton County in April. The American Red Cross is encouraging persons to make a double red cell donation. This is an advanced type of blood collection that allows qualified donors to give two units of red cells in one visit. While certain types are needed specifically for double cell donation, all blood types are needed for whole blood donation. Donors are asked to give double red cells this spring, and then take the summer off from donating blood to enjoy vacations and the weather since one must wait 16 weeks between donations. Donors who give traditional whole blood donations will have the opportunity to help build the summer blood supply by giving again in eight weeks.

The blood donations dates are 1 to 7 p.m. April 20 at the United Methodist Church in Akron and 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. April 25 at the St. Joseph Parish Hall in Rochester.





### April Showers Bring Home Improvement Scams

For a large portion of the state, April showers turned into major thunderstorms causing damage to homes and businesses. Many people will hire individuals to make improvements, and while most contractors are hard working and honest, it's important to be on the lookout for unscrupulous individuals who may be seeking to profit from the severe weather.

Sometimes a scam artist will show up at your door and offer to make repairs. Be skeptical if the person says he just finished work on your neighbor's house and has just enough materials to do repair

work on yours. Below are some tips on finding a contractor:

- Take your time and don't let a contractor rush your decision.
- Do research and know how much you can afford and what needs to be done.
- Talk to your friends and family about contractors they recommend.
- Opt for local, well-established contractors and don't assume that an ad makes a contractor reliable.
- Be skeptical if a bid is too low. Cheaper is not necessarily better.
- Get bids in writing.
- Check with your city or county building department to determine the licensing requirements for your area and if the contractor you are considering is properly licensed, bonded and insured.

Indiana law requires home improvement contracts exceeding \$150 to be in writing. Before signing the contract, make sure it includes the price of the job, a payment schedule, a detailed description of the work, an estimated start and completion date, the contractor's name and address, and a name and telephone number of the person to contact if a problem arises as well as the contractor's signature.

Never pay for the entire project before the work begins. Do not pay more than one-third of the total cost as a down payment. Remaining payments should be tied to completion of specified amounts of work.

Don't make the final payment to

the contractor until you know that all subcontractors and/or suppliers have been paid. Get written proof of payment because subcontractors and suppliers may file a mechanics lien against your home if they haven't been paid.

Be sure to get a copy of all warranties and keep all records related to your project. This includes the contract, change orders, warranties and correspondence. These records are important particularly if you have a problem.

Even if precautions are taken, problems can arise. Take time to talk to the contractor to resolve these issues and if problems continue, put your complaints in writing and send them to the contractor.

**NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS OF HEARING ON PROPOSED CUMULATIVE CAPITAL DEVELOPMENT FUND RATE**

Notice is hereby given the taxpayers of Fulton County, Fulton County, Indiana that the Fulton County Council will meet in the Commissioners Meeting Room at 125 E. 9th Street, Rochester, Indiana at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 16, 2006 to consider the establishment rate of the Cumulative Capital Development Fund under the provisions of Indiana Code 36-9-14.5 for the purposes as follows:

Section 1 - That there is hereby a re-establishment of the Fulton County Cumulative Capital Development Fund pursuant to the purposes of I.C. 36-9-14.5.

Section 2 - That an ad valorem property tax levy was imposed and the revenues from the levy will be retained in the Fulton County Cumulative Development Fund.

Section 3 - That the maximum rate of levy under Section 2 of this ordinance will not exceed .0333 per \$100.00 of assessed valuation continuing until rate is reduced or rescinded.

Section 4 - That the funds accumulated in the Fulton County Cumulative Capital Development Fund will be to provide funds for the provisions listed in I.C. 36-9-14.5-2.

Section 5 - Notwithstanding Section 4 of this ordinance, funds accumulated in the Fulton County Cumulative Development Fund may be used for purposes other than the purposes stated in Section 4 if the purpose is to protect the public health, welfare or safety in an emergency situation which demands immediate action. Money may be spent under that authority of this emergency section only after the Board of Commissioners issues a declaration that the public health, welfare, or safety is in immediate danger and that the emergency requires the expenditure of money in said fund.

Section 6 - This rate increase takes effect upon approval of the State Board of Tax Commissioners pursuant to the provisions of I.C. 36-9-14.5.

The tax will be levied on all taxable real and personal property within the taxing district and will not exceed \$.0333 (cents) per \$100 of assessed valuation. The proposed fund rate will be levied beginning with taxes due and payable in the year 2007. Taxpayers appearing at such hearing shall have the right to be heard thereon. The proposal for the established rate of the Cumulative Capital Development Fund is subject to the approval by the Department of Local Government Finance, who will require a Notice of Submission to be given to the taxpayers by publication. After the publication of the Notice of Submission, 50 or more taxpayers in the taxing district may file a petition with the County Auditor not later than 30 days after publication, setting forth their objections to the proposed levy.

**May 5 Next Deadline for ACT Test**

The next nationwide ACT test date for college-bound high school students is Saturday, June 10. Students must register online or have their paper registrations postmarked by the end of the day May 5. Late registration postmark deadline is May 19 (an additional \$18 fee is required for late registration after May 5).

The June test date is a popular one for juniors. Around two-thirds of test-takers in June have just completed eleventh grade. Many of them take the ACT, check their scores and then decide whether to re-test in the fall or winter of their senior year.

The ACT includes an optional writing test. Most colleges do not require a writing score, so students should check the admissions requirement of colleges they're considering before registering for the ACT. The cost is \$29 without and \$43 with the writing test.

Students can receive information from their high school guidance counselors or they can register online at [www.actstudent.org](http://www.actstudent.org). The website also features test tips, practice tests, an online test prep program, and a database for students to find out if a prospective college requires a writing score.

ACT scores are accepted by virtually all colleges and universities in the nation including all Ivy League schools. The ACT is an academic achievement exam that includes four areas - English, reading, math and science.


