

The club gives a \$250 scholarship annually to a graduating Caston senior. This



What is that I forgot to check?

Time to check out the lawn mower, roto-tiller, air conditioner and anything else that has been stored over the winter to insure it is ready to use. It is time to give that dirty, muddy and littered automobile a wash and wax to eliminate road salt and grime and clutter from the winter that has just past. But is there something else that is not seen or thought of, or spoken of on a regular basis that we should be thinking about during the wet climes of the spring? That unnoticeable thing that is located in the yard, which has a significant cost to the average homeowner, but no trade-in value! What is it?

During the past few meetings I have attended, I have been extremely surprised that when I asked about where this unspeakable thing was located, when was the last time you had this thing pumped or do you know where it is I got a resounding "I don't know!"

The above unthought-of, unspoken of and usually forgotten about is your septic system. A properly installed system should survive 15-20 years of continuous use. However, like our automobiles it needs to have its tank pumped every 1,825 days more or less to keep the sludge buildup down. The leach field should not have a motocross track or heavy equipment ran over it. To perform this endeavor one must know where it is located.

Please be advised that based on the above survival data, homes built or septic systems repaired 15-20 years ago could be on the verge of expiration. It would not hurt to give them a spring cleaning, too. Remember anytime they need to be repaired, you need a permit. A repair will require them to be brought up to current Indiana Department of Health and Fulton County Health Department (FCHD) codes.

Oh, now I remember what it was! I should have my well water checked too. If the iron and copper level is higher than what it was five years ago, I may need to have my softener resin changed out.



Too "Mulch" of a Good Thing?

Professional landscape designer and former agriculture, botany, and horticulture teacher answers local reader's questions about gardening, plant care and maintenance, and flowering choices.

Q. What's the best kind of mulch to use and how much mulch is too much around a tree? -Frank H.

A. Mulching is one of the most beneficial things a home owner can do for the health of a tree. Mulch can reduce water loss from the soil, minimize weed competition, and improve soil structure. When properly applied, mulch can give landscapes a handsome, well-groomed appearance. Mulch must be applied properly; if it is too deep or if the wrong material is used, it can actually cause significant harm to trees and other landscape plants.

Trees growing in a natural forest environment have their roots anchored in a rich, well-aerated soil full of essential nutrients. The soil is blanketed by leaves and organic materials that replenish nutrients and provide an optimal environment for root growth and mineral uptake. Urban landscapes, however, are typically a much harsher environment with poor soils, little organic matter, and large fluctuations in temperature and moisture. Applying a 2- to 4-inch layer of organic mulch can mimic a more natural environment and improve plant health.

Mulches are available commercially in many forms. The two major types of mulch are inorganic and organic. Inorganic mulches include various types of stone, lava rock, pulverized rubber, geotextile fabrics, and other materials. Inorganic mulches do not decompose and do not need to be replenished often. On the other hand, they do not improve soil structure, add organic materials, or provide nutrients. For these reasons, most horticulturists and arborists prefer organic mulches.

Organic mulches include wood chips, pine needles, hardwood and softwood bark, cocoa hulls, leaves, compost mixes, and a variety of other products usually derived from plants. Organic mulches decompose in the landscape at different rates depending upon the material. Those that decompose faster must be replenished more often. Most organic mulches must be replenished, but the rate of decomposition varies.

Landscape professionals recommend the use of quality hardwood mulch, as it lasts longer than softwood and other mulches while greatly improving soil quality. Quality hardwood mulch ranges from \$25-\$35 per cubic yard. Beware of "cheap" mulch, as it is likely made from old, ground-up wood pallets and contains pieces of nails. Mulches advertised as containing "gypsum" often contains discarded, crushed drywall and


other various "trash" materials. Cheap mulch isn't what homeowners want beneath their children's swing-set or added to their flowerbeds.

As beneficial as mulch is, too much can be harmful. The general recommendation mulching depth is 2 to 4 inches. Unfortunately, North American landscapes are falling victim to a plague of overmulching. A new term, "mulch volcanoes," has emerged to describe mulch that has been piled up around the base of trees. Mulch volcanoes around trees leads to excess moisture in the root zone, which can stress a plant and cause root rot in young plants. Piling mulch against the trunk or stems of plants can stress stem tissues and may lead to insect and disease problems. Mulch volcanoes create a habitat for insects and rodents that chew on the bark, resulting in tree girdling.

A 2- to 4-inch layer of mulch will reduce the germination and growth of weeds. This mulch layer serves as nature's insulating blanket. Mulch keeps soils warmer in the winter and cooler in the summer. Many types of mulch can improve soil aeration, structure (aggregation of soil particles), and drainage over time. Mulching around trees also helps facilitate maintenance and can reduce the likelihood of damage from "weed whackers" or the dreaded "lawn mower blight." Aesthetically, proper mulching gives the planting beds the uniform, attractive and well-cared-for look that is continually desired in the landscape.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. - Vacation season is underway in the Hoosier state, and thanks to the effort of hundreds of volunteers, Indiana travelers will enjoy spruced up highways while driving across the state. Since 1997, the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) has coordinated with Adopt-A-Highway volunteers and the Indiana Department of Corrections to "spring clean" every mile of Interstate during Trash Bash. Each year, hundreds of tons of trash are collected - sprucing up the highways in time for nice weather.

Trash Bash 2006 shattered records for the amount of trash collected. In a typical Trash Bash around 340 tons of trash is collected. This year, Trash Bash crews collected a massive 472 tons of trash. - Tie papers in a bundle before placing them in a curbside recycling bin.
- If you own a business, check dumpsters daily to see that top and side doors are closed.
- Report areas where people have illegally dumped garbage

and debris to your local transportation, public works or conservation office, and ask that the material be removed.


