Historical Power Show, June 16-18

The annual Fulton County Historical Power Show will be held this weekend, June 16-18, on the Fulton County Historical Society grounds. Show hours are 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday, June 16 and 17 and 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Sunday, June 18. Admission is \$3 for adults, age 12 and over, and free for children 11 years of age and under. Free parking and tram rides will be available.

The three-day event will host exhibitors of antique tractors, lawn tractors, hit-n-miss engines, farm equipment and antique trucks. Vendors of a variety of foods, crafts, flea market items and swap parts will also be available on the grounds. The museum, round barn and Living History Village of Loyal will be open during the festival, free of charge.

Coleman Meet and Swap at Rochester

The 14th annual International Coleman Collectors meet and swap will be held June 23 and 24 at the Fulton County Historical Museum, Rochester. Hours will be 1 to 5 p.m. Friday, June 23, and 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, June 24.

The Hiatt Coleman Museum, located four miles west of the Fulton County Historical Museum, will be open both days also. Friday hours at the museum will be 5:30 to 10 p.m. and Saturday hours will be 4:30 to 10 p.m.



The Lake Bruce Conservancy District held its monthly session Thursday, June 8, in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station. All five directors and 14 freeholders were present for the meeting.

The minutes of the May meeting and treasurer's report were read and unanimously approved, after which the chairman, Norm Steigely, shared correspondence. He stated he had sent an email to the DNR, which assigns permits and awards contracts to Weed Patrol, Inc. for weed treatment and weed surveys. He also talked by phone with Tony Cunningham of Weed Patrol, Inc., who stated the district had an existing contract with them for 2006 weed control at a lower rate than the current one and that he would do the surveys for the \$4,000 the district is to get from the DNR for the surveys instead of the \$5,800 contracted price.

Notification was received from Edwin Busewell requesting Norm to once again give a presentation to the Fulton County Commissioners at a public hearing to be held during the commissioner's meeting at 7 p.m. on June 19 as required by law when applying to the Department of Commerce for a grant. Norm noted that since only cities and counties can apply for these grants, the county commissioners will be applying for the district's grant. The monies will go to Fulton County and then dispersed to the conservancy district.

Notification was also received from the DNR stating that permits for the dredging have been approved.

Norm reported that weeds were to be sprayed Friday. He went on to say that the spraying is usually done around the second week of May, but under the new program instituted by the state everything got backed up and approval of all survey companies did not get done until late May. This year a weed survey must be done prior to treatment.

Director Tom Davies reported on the progress of the dry hydrant project. Davies met with Randy Moore of Arrowhead Development and took a tour of the lake with him. The district can apply for a grant to put in the dry hydrants or do it on their own with much less red tape.

Breakfast/Lunch at Twelve Mile

The Twelve Mile Community Board will serve breakfast and lunch Tuesday, July 4, in conjunction with the Twelve Mile 500 lawnmower race. Serving will be from 7 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the community building. The breakfast menu will include biscuits and gravy, pancakes and other items. Members from several local churches will provide the food, do the cooking and serve the meals. The Twelve Mile parade will begin at 12 noon with the lawnmower races starting shortly thereafter.

Board of Accounts audit has been completed and the district is A-OK. A round of applause was given to Dave Foust for his exceptional record keeping. Dave was elected financial secretary for 2006 as the district was told this should be done every year when officers are elected.

Steve Fralish, engineer for Wightman, reported on property acquisition and easements for the sewage treatment project. He left some copies of appraisals but stated that another would be coming within the next two weeks. Various proposed sites were looked at and Fralish had maps of these areas for the board and those in attendance to review.

The board reviewed the dredging permit from the DNR and the special conditions, reviewed the bidding documents sent to the district by J. W. New and found them to be in order. The board voted that the amount of dollars to be spent this year for dredging would be \$87,000 of LARE grant monies and \$29,000 (25%) conservancy monies to maximize available funding. It was also noted that in this first year of dredging, the area near the outlet dam would be the first area to be dredged. The area near the public access site will be the next area to be dredged and the amount of dredging will be determined by the remaining funds available.

It was announced that the next meeting of the conservancy will be a joint meeting with the Lake Bruce Association at 12:30 p.m. Saturday, July 15, at Hoosier Hideaway on Lake Bruce.

Local farmer Ron Shrader narrowly escaped very serious


injury last week when a dump truck crossed the center line on State Road 17 north of Kewanna striking and totaling the tractor he was driving. Shrader swerved to





Attracting Hummingbirds to the Garden

Leesa Metzger Metzger Landscaping & Design, LLC (Professional landscape designer and former agriculture, botany and horticulture teacher answers local readers' questions about gardening, plant care and maintenance, and flowering choices)

Q. I was visiting my neighbor yesterday and enjoyed watching her hummingbirds. How can I attract hummingbirds to my yard? -Josephine L.

A. Hummingbirds are drawn to red, pink, and orange flowers. Some good hummingbird flowers

are impatiens, salvia, lilies, trumpet vine, and monarda (bee balm). Although trumpet-shaped flowers are famous for attracting hummingbirds, I have found the diminutive blossoms of coral bells receive more hummer attention than any flower in the garden except columbines.

It's best to plant several kinds of flowers, so that something will be in bloom for hummingbirds all the time, whether they are migrating north in spring, spending the summer (if you're lucky), or heading south in the fall. Hummingbirds prefer flowers planted in big same-

species clumps, rather than scattered around. And of course you will want to avoid chemicals and sprays.

Hummingbirds love dripping water. These tiny, aerial birds do not wade and splash in a bird bath like a robin. Hummingbirds taste is more delicate and they prefer dripping water. Hummers will fly back and forth through dripping water, timing each trip so that they catch a drop on their backs as they pass. By arranging a bird bath with a drip you will likely enjoy hummingbirds at your bird bath, and quite a show as well.

Hummingbird feeders impose a responsibility on the provider. To be safe, they must be clean, and that is a challenge in hot weather. The solution should be changed at least every other day, even if

no hummingbirds are using it, so that it doesn't ferment or get moldy. Once a week the feeder must be washed with vinegar and water or a 10% chlorine solution and scrubbed with a baby-bottle brush. (Most experts advise against using soap or detergent.) If you see black spots inside your feeder this is mold and you will need to scrub it out with a good bottle brush, but if you can't reach it with a bottle brush you can add some sand with water and shake the feeder to remove the mold.

It is not necessary to purchase a hummingbird solution because the recipe for hummingbird syrup is simple to make. Boil four cups of water and stir in one cup of white sugar. Do not use honey, which can cause a fatal fungal infection on the birds' tongues. Do not add food coloring to the solution. The red color on the feeder is sufficient. You can store the excess syrup in the refrigerator for a week or two.

Hang the feeder where you can see it from a window. If ants discover the feeder, discourage them by applying petroleum jelly to the wire that suspends the feeder. If bees begin to dominate, purchase a hummingbird feeder that comes with bee guards. Hummingbird feeders that mount directly to your window with a suction cup prove to provide the closest viewing of hummingbird activity.

If all this is too much trouble, just plant the flowers and skip the artificial feeders. You'll still attract hummingbirds, and you won't be harming them with unsanitary feeders. The following is a list of plants that are sure to attract hummingbirds to your landscape. Flowers: Cardinal Flower Lobelia

cardinalis, Lantana Lantana camara, Columbine *Aguilegia* spp., Fuchsias *Fuchsia* spp., Impatiens *Impatiens* spp., Coral-Bells *Heuchera sanguinea* Hollyhocks *Althea* spp., Penstemon *Penstemon* spp., Petunia *Petunia* spp., Geranium *Pelargonium* spp., Begonia *Begonia* spp. Shrubs: Azaleas *Rhododendron* spp., Butterfly Bush *Buddleia davidii* Flowering Quince *Chaenomeles japonica*. Weigela *Weigela* spp. Trees: Flowering Crab *Malus* spp., Tulip Poplar *Liriodendron tulipifera*, Locust *Robinia*, Vines: Honeysuckle *Lonicera heckrottii*, Morning Glory *Ipomea* ssp., Trumpet Creeper *Campsisradicans*, Trumpet Honeysuckle *Lonicera sempervirens*. Happy hummingbirding!







Fifty (50) or more taxpayers in the taxing unit who will be affected by the tax levy may file a petition with the Fulton County Auditor, not later than thirty (30) days after the publication of this notice, setting forth their objections to the proposed levy. Upon filing of the petition, the County Auditor shall immediately certify the same to the Department of Local Finance, which Department will fix a date and conduct a public hearing on the proposed levy before issuing its approval or disapproval thereof.
