A FOURTH OF JULY PRAYER FOR OUR TROOPS

George Washington's Biographer Explains How Faith Has Helped Soldiers Past and Present

As the Fourth of July approaches, it's not only time for fireworks and family picnics. It's also important to remember the sacrifices that our forefathers made to get this country started. This day is known as Independence Day because it marks just that - the beginning of independence in this country. On the Fourth of July we should recall that our fight for our freedom began only in 1776 and continues on every year.

This year, more than ever, it is important to remember the lessons learned from the bravery of those who gave their lives in past conflicts. According to Janice Connell, author of **FAITH OF OUR FOUNDING FATHER: THE SPIRITUAL**

JOURNEY OF GEORGE WASHINGTON (Hatherleigh Press, \$15.95), the soldiers who fought in our nation's revolution were no strangers to sorrow, cold, hunger, persecution, or terrorism. But then, as now, they used their faith and love of country to give them strength.

As things began to look hopeless at Valley Forge, Washington did something that inspired his men to persevere in the face of all their hardships. "Washington, in full view of his troops, knelt in the snow to pray," Connell explains. "He implored the blessings of God on his dedicated troops, men who carried the hopes and dreams of freedom in their hearts." Their commander's faith inspired the men to fight on.

For those who choose to show their support for our troops through prayer this Fourth of July, the following is a short prayer from George Washington's own personal prayer book:

"Bless the rulers and people of this land and forget not those who are under any affliction or oppression.

Let Thy favor be extended to all my relations, friends, and all others who I ought to remember in my prayers.

Hear me I beseech Thee for the sake of my dear Redeemer in whose holy words, I farther pray."

This Fourth of July, we must not only remember the sacrifice of soldiers who gave their lives to create the United States, but also celebrate the bravery of those who fight today to continue that legacy left by George Washington and the other founding fathers. May their faith and patriotism inspire and strengthen them as it has the countless soldiers of America's past.

Army Offering Referral Bonus

The U.S. Army is now offering a \$1,000 recruiting referral bonus to retired soldiers.

The new bonus pays retired members of the Active Army and Army Reserve a \$1,000 lump sum for referring individuals who enlist in either of these components, complete basic training, and graduate from advanced individual training.

Those eligible to receive this referral bonus include Reserve members who have transferred to the Retired Reserve but have not yet reached 60 years of age.

The individuals referred under this program may not be an immediate family member, and the retired soldier making the referral cannot be serving in a recruiting or retention assignment or as a Junior ROTC instructor.

Blood Bank Set for July 5

The American Red Cross will hold a blood collection day Wednesday, July 5, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Woodlawn Hospital, Rochester. All presenting donors will be eligible to enter a drawing for a \$50 gasoline gift card.

You may be eligible to donate blood if you are at least 17 years of age, weigh a minimum of 110 pounds and are in good general health. All donors need to present positive identification. For more information or to schedule a blood donation appointment, call 1-800-448-3543.

However, on any given day an average of 38,000 units of red blood cells are needed for patients in the United States. Citizens are asked to show their patriotism by donating blood. Free Wireless Hotspots at Rochester Library

The Fulton County Public Library now has wireless access to the Internet available to users who have their own wireless devices. To use the hotspots, your device must be 802.11 a, b or g compatible and have the ability for you to register as a user. To register, you sign on as a guest using your email address and checking a box that you agree to abide by the library's wireless access policy.

The hotspots are not secure so it is advisable that you have a personal firewall and up-to-date antivirus on your wireless device.

The hotspots cover most of the inside of the library and some areas of the Arboretum. Wireless access is available during library hours only. At this time printing is not available over the wireless network.







Roses for Midwest Gardens

Q. I have bought rose after rose for my garden. Many of them die after exposure to our Indiana winters. The ones that survive need many canes cut out due to the harsh winters, leaving me with a rose bush no bigger than when it was first planted. Can you recommend any roses for our area? -Brenda S.

One must be very careful in choosing a rose as most roses sold commercially at chain stores in this area are not recommended for zone 5. Some cultivars even have misleading names. For instance, the cultivar 'Chicago Peace' would not normally survive a Chicago winter!

Popular "florist type" roses, also known as Hybrid Tea roses, are grafted onto root stock. These roses often produce suckers that need to be cut just below ground level. It becomes difficult to discern root stock suckers from new rose growth. Add in the spraying often needed to control fungal diseases, and considering roses' susceptibility to insects such as thrips and mites, a gardener must wonder if there is an easier alternative for beautiful roses.

Many gardeners strive to protect their roses in late fall with foam cones that overheat easily on a sunny winter day. I've also known gardeners to place tomato cages around roses, stuff the cages with fall leaves and then wrap the strange looking contraption in burlap and tie it all up with baling twine. Why go to all this trouble when there are beautiful roses that were bred for

our Midwest winters? Unbeknownst to many gardeners are the Buck roses that were bred specifically to survive severe Midwest winters - without any winter protection! Dr. Griffith Buck, a researcher and professor of horticulture at Iowa State University, where the breeding of corn was "king", developed a passion for rose breeding. Dr. Buck's rose breeding program was forced to operate on a shoestring budget. There was simply no money for spraying for disease, so his program took a logical turn to developing disease resistant rose varieties. In reality the idea of disease resistant or hardy roses was a radical concept in the 1950's. Up until that time, serious rose growers had to exhibit great skill in order to make their roses survive and thrive. Constant attention had to be paid to their care and upkeep. Buck changed all that. The only special care his new rose varieties received was water and cultivation. That's it. No spraying for either pests or diseases and no winter protection. The roses that survived Iowa's harsh winters were the roses Dr. Buck would introduce. Most of Dr. Buck's roses are beautiful in form, fragrant, disease resistant and survive harsh Midwest winters. In search of the perfect zone 5 rose, you say? Search for Buck rose cultivars at www.helpmefind.com/roses and type in the search query "Buck" under the Breeders tab, then click on Plants Bred tab for a listing of Buck roses complete with pictures.

From 1948 to 1985 Dr. Griffith Buck hybridized nearly 90 rose varieties. Buck retired at the age of 70, and soon after his breeding stock at the University was destroyed, truly a shame. Many of his varieties survived because of the Buck family's personal collection. During his lifetime Dr. Buck was known for giving

away many of his roses to friends. In turn these friends have offered cuttings back to the cause of rebuilding the collection of Buck's life work. Even today, eight Buck rose cultivars are still lost. A giant scavenger hunt is presently underway to find the lost Buck roses. Buck roses are collected at the Minnesota Arboretum where they were carefully tested and cataloged.

Very popular cultivars of Buck roses include 'Earth Song' and 'Carefree Delight'. My twin sister is very partial to her Buck rose 'Country Dancer' and she is always on the lookout for more of these hard to find roses. Buck roses are not always marked as such, so it is best to carry a "wish list" of the names of Buck roses you would like to acquire. Buck roses come in many forms ranging from the more loose, open single forms such as Buck's

**FIFTY-FIVE YEARS AGO**

Fred Zellers was severely burned about the arms and face last Monday when he attempted to light a pile of corn cobs that had been soaked with gasoline. Young Zellers had been helping his father, Murle, in shelling corn on the Schied farm when the mishap occurred.
