Town Council Conducts August Session

The Kewanna town council met Thursday evening at the town hall, the main items of business being reports from the various departments.

Assistant Fire Chief Tony Pesaresi gave the department's monthly report noting three town runs, all medical, and six township runs, four fire and two medical. The department personnel also participated in 11 other activities and one investigation for a total of 207 man-hours. Training involved pumper operations on how to draft. Pesaresi reported that he will conduct NIMS training for town and township officials Monday, August 21, at 6 p.m. in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station.

Marshal Dennis Price's report revealed two traffic arrests, 12 traffic warnings, 13 criminal arrests, 38 calls answered, two vehicle checks and 1,587 miles patrolled. Thirteen ordinance violations (second notices) were mailed to local residents. The department has received a new Dell Dimension 3100 computer through a Homeland Security grant. The marshal presented a job application from Chris Sailors who was hired as a part time deputy for the department.

The council discussed a grant application for new street and traffic signs. Brian Shafer reported that students from Purdue University are supposed to come to survey the town for the project.

The town superintendent's report noted trimming of trees at the medical clinic site to make mowing easier. Trees were cut at the old Griffith property. A hydraulic leak was repaired on the town tractor. The fuel pump was replaced on one of the town's pick-up trucks. A new ground water tile was installed on Phillips Street. The town pumped a total of 1,444,200 gallons of water during July.

A hearing on the 2007 budget will be held at the council's next regular meeting, which will be 7 p.m. Thursday, September 7. The adoption hearing will be held Monday, September 18, at 5 p.m. at the town hall.

In other business, the council signed a letter to the DLGF asking them to consider Winamac Coil Spring's application for Economic Revitalization Deduction for new manufacturing equipment even though it was inadvertently filed late.

Potawatomi Trail of Death Web Site on Line

After months of work, the new Potawatomi Trail of Death Association web site, www.potawatomitda.org, is completed and on the Internet. The new web site of over 200 pages provides pictures of all the Trail of Death historical markers, quotes from the 1838 diary, driving directions, GPS readings for each location, and names of sponsors of each marker. There are also side trips to several related sites, such as Fulton County Museum, Delphi Canal Center, Tippecanoe County Museum, and Harrison Trail of 1811. Each of the 25 counties on the Trail are invited to send information about their museum to be added to the web site.

Motorists, hikers and bikers can now travel the Potawatomi Trail of Death Regional Historic Trail and visit all the 78 historical markers. The Trail of Death Regional Historic Trail is 660 miles from north central Indiana to eastern Kansas. As people travel the Trail, we hope they will take time to read each marker and meditate on the suffering that mankind has inflicted on those of different cultures and pray that forced removals will never happen again and that we will finally learn to treat each other with care and respect.

Shirley Willard, Rochester, Indiana, wrote the wording and inserted the pictures from the Trail of Death archives at the Fulton County Museum and from her own collection. Many photos were provided by historians and Potawatomi who had ancestors on the Trail of Death forced removal in 1838. Shirley then emailed it to Susan Campbell and others to be proofread.

Susan Campbell, member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, lives in Kalaheo, Hawaii, but that did not hinder her editing the web page via email. She proofread and checked every page. Others who helped with the proofreading of the driving directions include George Godfrey, Athens, Illinois; Greg Olson, Jacksonville, Illinois; Dora May Craven, Huntsville, Missouri; Ola May Ernest, Pleasanton, Kansas, and several county historical societies along the Trail.

Dale J. Travis, Decatur, Illinois, made the material that Shirley emailed to him into clickable boxes and thus created the web site. He did this as a donation, and it is greatly appreciated because that normally costs about \$1,500. Travis has a web page with hundreds of pictures of round barns in Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, etc. at www.dalejtravis.com. Shirley had been corresponding with him for several years about round barns, and she asked him if



he would do the Potawatomi Trail of Death web pages.

The web pages are well illustrated with one or more pictures of each of the 78 Trail of Death historical markers. Pictures were provided by people who traveled on the Trail of Death commemorative caravans in 1988, 1993, 1998 and 2003. Many of the pictures are by Larry Prichard, Lynn, Indiana; a descendant of William Polke, who was the federal conductor on the Trail of Death in 1838. Pictures were also provided by several museums and historical societies along the Trail. There are nearly 200 pictures, most in color. Black and white pictures include the dedication in 1909 of the Chief Menominee monument, provided by the Marshall County Historical Society, Plymouth, Indiana. A postcard showing an artist's rendition of the chapel at Chi-chi-pee Ou-ti-pe at Twin Lakes and Father Petit in a black straw hat was provided by the Culver Library. A sketch of the Potawatomi leaving Logansport was provided by the Tippecanoe County Historical Society, Lafayette, Indiana. The sketch was made by George Winter, the frontier artist who was an eye witness of the 1838 forced removal.

The web site is very easy to use. Maps of the four states include all the towns, which when clicked, show the Trail of Death pictures and history for that location. If you don't have Internet, you can see it at the library or museum.



Student Transportation and Being Prepared Two Minutes Per Stop

Each year when school begins our bus drivers make every attempt to set a route pattern so students know what time to expect them each and every day. Our drivers intend to get the students to school prior to the first tardy bell and also in time to eat breakfast if so desired. Let's take a look at what could conceivably happen when our drivers begin picking up students in the morning to bring them to school.

Let's say a driver begins their particular route at 7:15 and arrives at the first stop at 7:25. If the driver has twenty-five stops along the way and at each stop the children do not come out for two minutes what happens? Simple multiplication would tell you that with 25 stops times 2 minutes lost per stop you would arrive to school 50 minutes late. Our drivers are very consistent and considerate of our children, and parents and students should know that when their particular driver comes to their house they should be at the side of the road or heading that way. That way all students will get to school on time and the driver won't have to guess on whether they are planning to go to school or not.

So, here is what we need to keep in mind. Each family will know following the first day approximately the time the driver will be at their particular home and should plan to be heading out to the road or be at the road at that time. Of course make sure you do not get on the roadway for safety reasons. With this one simple procedure in mind each and every student and each and every bus should arrive on time daily.

A couple of other reminders for all of us who drive: Please remember all of our buses stop at all railroad crossings, even if the lights are not flashing at the tracks. On most of our roadways the county or state has posted bus turnaround or bus stop ahead signs in order to help each of us who drive to know that we need to be watching for: a bus backing up or already stopped to pick up a child. Across the nation children that travel to and from school via the bus are on the safest mode of transportation possible. Your consideration of being prepared will only assist in maintaining this safety record. As I mentioned in an earlier article: "They are busy people, but they are also well trained and caring—caring for each child on their bus. So, please remember, show courtesy and respect to all bus drivers you meet for they may be driving one of your very own precious commodities—the children of our community and future."

I hope each child has a most enjoyable 2006-2007 school year at Caston. Can You Hear Me Now?

Do you often ask people to repeat what they just said? Can you hear, but have trouble understanding the words? Does your family complain you keep the TV or radio too loud? If so, you may have some hearing loss.

According to the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), hearing loss affects 38 million Americans, with nearly two-thirds of those being over the age of 55.

Hearing loss is believed to be

caused by a combination of factors, such as age, repeated exposure to loud noises, trauma, medication, inherited abnormalities and viruses or bacteria.

To protect your hearing, you can:

- Turn down the volume on your stereo, TV and personal music players. If someone standing three feet away can hear the music in your headphones, it's loud enough to damage your hearing.
- Wear earplugs at loud concerts. A contemporary rock

concert can exceed 120 decibels. Use small foam plugs, which typically reduce noise better than bulky padded earmuffs.

- Protect your ears during home and garden work. Leaf blowers register a sound level of 110 decibels, which can cause hearing loss after only one minute, 29 seconds. Power lawn mowers register a sound level of 90 decibels, which can cause hearing loss after 2 hours, 31 minutes.
- Reduce your exposure to multiple noisy appliances. Running the dishwasher, garbage disposal and television simultaneously can raise the noise level in your home to toxic levels.
- Blow your nose gently. Overly strenuous blowing can rupture the eardrum, causing temporary or permanent hearing loss.

- Watch your medication intake. Aspirin and about 200 other medications can cause hearing loss. Before stopping any recommended or prescribed medication, consult a health professional.

Typically, adults need a hearing screening every three years. If you are regularly exposed to hazardous noises or if you have diabetes, you need an annual hearing test. Of course, if you're having trouble hearing, see your doctor immediately.



Surprisingly, many people with mild or moderate hearing loss don't even realize it, often

because it occurs gradually – over a period of 25 to 30 years. If you think you might be having hearing problems or are interested in a hearing screening, call the Winamac Specialists' Clinic to schedule an appointment with an Ear/Nose/Throat physician, call 574-946-2104

Professional landscape designer and former agriculture, botany, and horticulture teacher answers local reader's questions about gardening, plant care and maintenance, and flowering choices.

Q. - We are always having trouble with weeds that come up under our birdfeeders from the dropped birdseed. Do you have any suggestions of how to prevent this from happening? - Tina H.

A. The recipe for preventing birdseed from sprouting beneath feeders is quite simple. Admittedly a terrible cook, even I can successfully create a birdseed bake that the birds enjoy, yet keeps my flowerbed beneath the feeders sprout-free too. After purchasing seed, simply spread the birdseed out on a cookie sheet and bake it for 10 minutes in the oven at 350 degrees. This kills the germ of the seed; thus preventing it from sprouting. Let the birdseed cool completely before filling feeders. For cooks such as myself that opt for the microwave directions whenever possible, an easy alternative is 6 minutes in the microwave on medium power. For microwaves without a carousel, stir after 3 minutes and of course let the seed completely cool before filling feeders. There seems to be some controversy within the American Bird Feeding Society that suggests that cooking the seed decreases the nutritional value of the seed. The society claims that it would be better to not feed the birds at all rather than feed them baked seed instead of "fresh" seed. There have been no studies conducted to suggest this theory to be true. Cooking vegetables also slightly decreases their nutritional value, but feeding my children cooked veggies is better than no vegetables at all. I tend to lean toward the idea that the baked birdseed in no way harms the birds.

Q. When should we apply a lawn treatment to prevent moles? They are really tearing up our lawn this year. -Shawn T.

A. Mole activity is fairly high right now because the moles are busy eating the "yummy" white grubs in your lawn. Since moles can dig surface tunnels at approximately 18 feet/hour, combined with the fact that this one of their favorite feeding times of the year; they can do a considerable amount of damage in a short amount of time. In essence, to get rid of the mole, get rid of their feeding source.

A moles' diet regularly consists of earthworms also so they will feed in your lawn year 'round. In fact, a 5 ounce mole (medium sized) will consume 45-50 lbs of worms and insects each year. Many grubs found right now in the lawn are the larval stage of the Japanese Beetle Bug, giving yet another reason to dislike this pesky insect. This is the time of year when beetles mate and the female will lay eggs in the turf. Females look for areas that can be easily burrowed into, and thus irrigated soils of golf courses, lawns, and athletic fields are often infested, especially in drier years. Adult females also prefer to lay eggs in lower cut turf. These eggs hatch into larvae (white grubs) over the next month or so and it is these larvae that feed in the soil and thatch, severing roots, and causing drought stress and potentially thinning and death of the turf.

Frequent irrigation and/or rainfall may limit damage significantly, but dry conditions exaggerate the damage from grub feeding. It is at this time that insecticides are effective because the grub control products work only AFTER the grubs have hatched - usually the end of July or the first part of August.

If grub damage warrants control in summer (usually August when young grubs are feeding on grass roots) use Grub Control with Merit which provides season-long control or Sevin. As with all insecticides, it is critical to follow the label directions exactly when

making applications. However, all grub control applications should be watered into the soil with at least 1/4 inch of water immediately after treatment. In cases where irrigation is not possible, timing the application just before a significant rainfall is recommended.

For an organic alternative try trapping the moles. Since moles travel through existing tunnels at about 80 feet/minute, there are many opportunities to catch the little varmints with a mole trap. Spring is also a good time to apply grub control. Milky Spore is an excellent long term organic solution that will not harm pets, children or ground water supplies. It should be applied before grubs hatch in early spring.

John and Lynette had appointments for eye exams early Monday morning (they thought). We took both cars and Joe and I rode along as they thought the doctor might dilate their eyes and they would need drivers afterwards for awhile. However, when they checked in, they were told they didn't do regular eye exams, just surgeries and other serious stuff. Lynette is still trying to figure out why they didn't tell her that when she scheduled the appointments.

Oh well, we had a good time eating breakfast at the IHOP and

planning the rest of our day. (Notice we are doing a good job of eating. No chance of us becoming undernourished!)

Since we had two cars, Joe and John headed back south to the golf course and Lynette and I anticipated a day at Gladewater, "The Antique Capital of East Texas". I mentioned that a lot of antique stores in our area are only open the end of the week and weekend so she decided it would be a good idea to make a phone call before we made the 30 mile trip to Gladewater. She called the Chamber of Commerce, but got a recording. She then tried several businesses. (Holly had given us a print out of store names, addresses and phone numbers.) She only got one response and they didn't really know what hours were observed. (That should have been a clue.) She finally got a hold of someone in the Chamber of Commerce office, but they really weren't much help - they thought there were "some" stores open on Monday. We decided to take a chance and make the trip up U.S. 271. There were only three stores open, but they were big enough and full enough to keep us occupied for quite a while.

Gladewater was founded in 1873 by the Texas and Pacific Railway Company. It is believed the town's name originated from its proximity to Glade Creek. The town was incorporated in 1874, but the incorporation lapsed and a new charter was not obtained until 1931, when an influx of population necessitated organized city government. In April of that year, the first oil well blew in. Oil production led to a population increase during the 1930s from about 500 persons to around 8,000. Due to the oil boom, the town didn't feel the pinch of the Depression. However, although Gregg County has produced more oil than any other county, the slump of the early 1980s was felt severely. The downtown area was full of empty buildings and prospects were dim. That is when a local entrepreneur came up with the idea for the Antique Capital of East Texas. The town now has approximately 200 dealers in 16 malls and a revitalized downtown.

On our return to Tyler, we looked up the optometrist Lynette had been referred to earlier in the day to make an appointment. When they said they could get her right in, we were both dumb founded! It was almost too easy! She really thought she would have to schedule something a month away and take more time off work.

In the evening, we all reconvened at Kevin and Holly's for - you guessed it - another meal. A very delicious meal, but more importantly just a good, relaxing visit with family. After eating, we walked down the drive to feed their five horses accompanied by their five dogs! (Hey, kids, are you sure you don't need a kennel or stable license? Indiana wouldn't let a chance like that go by.)

After our bit of exercise, we got

to see Kevin and Holly's pictures they took while on an African safari last fall. It was really interesting - I didn't realize what a science big game hunting is. They are awaiting delivery of 15 specimens from the taxidermist in Dallas that will be added to the décor of their home. Holly loved Africa and notes she could easily live there. Kevin is returning to Africa for the month of August, hoping to bag a lion.

Tuesday was pretty much a repeat of Monday, except for the eye appointment. The guys returned to the golf course just south of where John and Lynette live and Lynette and I returned to Gladewater. Some of the stores still weren't open, but there were plenty that were. I added to my elephant collection and Lynette added to her Pepsi collection. To say that Lynette is a Pepsi fanatic is probably an understatement. John and Joe also spent some time at the new Gander Mountain Store.

In the evening, 22 various Goods and Shorts and friends met at a Japanese restaurant to help Holly celebrate her birthday. The tables encircled the grill and the entertainment was watching while the chef prepared our food. The chef starts off twirling his cooking utensils like a majorette at a football game. He put something on the grill that ignited into a big ball of fire. That was quite an attention getter! Except for Emma - she didn't want any part of it! She made grandma move her chair back and climbed up on her lap. She refused any nourishment until the chef got done and left the dining room.

We were planning to meet Holly, Hampton and Emma for breakfast Wednesday morning before starting our trip home, but Hampton wasn't feeling too good so it was just us older Goods (or good oldies). I don't know how we managed to eat again - but we did!

John and Lynette wanted us to experience Lambert's Café at Sikeston, Missouri, on our way home. Holly had mapped out a route on the Internet (which was pretty similar to the route we traveled south) so we could stop at Sikeston. However, we like to come and go different routes so we can experience various locales so we opted to head east on I-20 to stop at Marshall Pottery in Marshall, Texas.

Marshall Pottery, founded in 1895, is one of the oldest potteries in the country and is the largest manufacturer of red clay pots in America today. The 100,000 square-foot store features terra cotta, hand-turned pottery, housewares, unique gifts and more. You can watch the master potters at work, but it was apparently lunch time when we were there so we didn't get the opportunity to watch.

We could have headed north on US 59 to catch I-30, but we decided to head on east to Vicksburg, Mississippi for the night. However, we got into some torrential rain and eventually pulled off the road after slowing to a near crawl. Several other drivers pulled over too, but the rest were running like they were late and some with no lights on. That kind of thing makes me really nervous!

We ended up staying at Monroe, Louisiana, where we dropped a

couple rolls of film off for one-hour processing. We then toured Antique Alley located primarily in the historic downtown of West Monroe on the banks of the Ouachita River. Antique Alley is located in the historic Cottonport District, which has a history dating back to 1859 when Cottonport was recognized by the Louisiana legislature. The area continued to grow with the addition of a railroad bridge across the river and the building of an oil mill, which processed cottonseed oil until its closing. The mill is currently being converted into apartments, condos and retail shops. Merchants in the area organized in 1987 to pool their money and advertise the Antique Alley stores. Today, there are over 40 shops, three restaurants and a bed and breakfast in the area. We checked out one of the antique stores, but actually my eyes were just tired of LOOKING by this time!

Thursday morning we headed on to Vicksburg. I really enjoy historic fiction based on the Civil War so I would have loved to be able to spend some time here, but it was still raining so as close as I got to the battlefield were the signs along the interstate.

The Vicksburg Campaign was a series of battles and maneuvers in the Western Theater of the Civil War directed against Vicksburg, a fortress city that dominated the last Confederate-controlled section of the Mississippi River. The Union Army of the Tennessee under Major General Ulysses S. Grant gained control of the Mississippi River by capturing this stronghold and defeating John C. Pemberton's forces stationed there. Pemberton's army surrendered one day after the Confederate defeat at Gettysburg. These events are widely considered the turning point of the war and Grant's Vicksburg Campaign is considered one of the masterpieces of American military history.

We hit I-55 at Vicksburg (very little traffic) and headed north to Memphis, Tennessee, where we got into more traffic than any other time on the trip. It didn't take too long to get around the city and we pulled into our destination at Sikeston about mid-afternoon. We checked into our motel and then found the local golf course. We went back to Lambert's Café to eat early as we were told they get really busy

later and have people lined up waiting to get seated. What an experience!

Lambert's Café is known as the "Home of Thrown Rolls". The first roll was thrown in 1976 on a really busy day when Norman Lambert couldn't get through the crowded restaurant. One of the customers yelled to him "throw the d*** thing". Along with all the rolls you can catch and eat, Lambert's serves very generous portions and offers other "pass arounds". The night we were there they were serving fried onions and potatoes, fried okra and black-eyed peas - along with the entrée and two vegetables we ordered. I am sure no one goes away hungry!


Last year, Lambert's baked and served 520 rolls a day for a total of 2,246,400 individual rolls. They poured 476,136 cups of coffee, along with 40,392 gallons of tea. 61,200 pounds of okra was fried and they used 40,800 pounds of white beans; 110,610 pounds of beef; 335,400 fresh eggs; 150,000 pounds of chicken breasts and legs along with 61,650 pounds of chicken livers; 40,341 pounds of pond-raised catfish - you get the picture - they are very busy! Lambert's also operate cafes at Ozark, Missouri and Foley, Alabama.

Following our meal, Joe headed for the golf course to work off some of his food and I walked through the outlet mall next to our motel.

Friday morning, we continued our journey home stopping in southwest Indianapolis to visit our son, Jeff, his wife Tonya, and family. We arrived shortly before Jeff got off work and visited a couple hours before hitting the road again. Joe wanted to get to the north side of town before rush hour traffic. We stopped to eat (again) and get a few groceries and then made our way back to Kewanna, 2,314 miles later. As usual, the water tower was a welcome sight when it came into view. We hit town about 7:15 but didn't get home until about 9 p.m. after stopping to check on our daughter and her family (the Smiths) and my mom and dad (the Bakers). It took us almost as long to travel eight or nine blocks as it did to drive from the north side of Indy to Kewanna!

It was a great trip - an even greater visit - and we were able to see a big hunk of the good old USA! Thanks, John, Lynette, Kirk, Kathy, Kevin, Holly, Hampton and Emma for your hospitality! Now it's your turn to come north!
