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License Plate Design Revealed

(Statehouse) August 10, 2006— State Representative Woody Burton (R-Greenwood), along with Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles Commissioner Joel Silverman, today revealed the chosen design for the new "In God We Trust" license plate. The design features the Flag of the United States of America and the words "In God We Trust" on the left hand side

"Seeing the 'In God We Trust' license plate come to life is a momentous occasion for everyone involved," said Burton. "The symbolism portrayed by the American flag displays our loyalty to the United States and the words of our founding fathers. It is my hope that thousands of Hoosiers will choose this plate and display it proudly."

Main-1-Media, a local design firm, donated its design efforts to the state for the creation of the license plate. The firm designed a number of options for the license plate, featuring the Indiana State Flag, the American Flag, and the Indiana Statehouse. Four options were posted on the Internet, as part of an unscientific online focus group, in order to gain public opinion on the designs. The website drew more than 300,000 responses. Because of the high number of responses, Rep. Burton, Commissioner Silverman, and Rick Terry from Main-1-Media felt confident in their design choice.

House Enrolled Act 1013, authored by Rep. Burton and passed by the General Assembly in the 2006 legislative session, allows for the manufacture and purchase of state license plates featuring the words, "In God We Trust." No additional fee will be enforced for purchase of the plate, as is the case with all other specialty license plates. It will be offered for all vehicle types, including cars, trucks, and SUVs.

The license plate will be available to the public on January 1, 2007 (at the time of the person's plate registration renewal based upon the first letter of his/her last name).

Off Duty Officer Rescues Young Girl

Dave Wilson, a sergeant with the Greensburg Police Department and the grandson of Lois Wilson and the late Art Wilson of Kewanna, went above and beyond the call of duty recently when he rescued a young girl who had fallen into rapidly moving water.

Wilson and his family were in South Carolina to attend the wedding of his sister. Shortly before the rehearsal dinner, he was sitting at a park with his family when he saw the approximate seven-year-old fall into the water. A waterfall that dropped off nearly 30 feet generated the current in the water. The youngster was rapidly approaching danger when Wilson went into the water after her, even though he was out of his jurisdiction and off duty. Wilson, along with another bystander, formed a human chain to accomplish the rescue.

Wilson is uneasy talking about his heroics, but his chief notes that what Dave did "was definitely something special. A lot of people would have frozen-up and just stood by and watched. Dave took the initiative to help. It was an incredibly unselfish act and we are all proud of him. I'd like to think any of our officers would do the same thing but Dave deserves to be recognized for his quick thinking. Dave doesn't want any credit for what he did, as he just sees it as solving a problem, but he did something worthy of praise."

As the incident happened shortly before the rehearsal dinner, it caused Dave a bit of discomfort as he sat through the event soaked from the chest down. Most people at the dinner were unaware of his heroics, until Dave's five-year-old daughter, his biggest fan, informed them. Dave noted "he didn't want a pat on the back, just some dry clothes."

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

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

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August 22 Next Deadline for Do-Not-Call List

Tuesday, August 22, is the next deadline to register for the state's Do-Not-Call list. Phone numbers placed on the list by midnight EDT Tuesday will begin receiving benefits of the law starting October 1, 2006. Registration is available 24-hours a day, 7-days a week at www.attorneygeneral.IN.gov or by calling 1-888-834-9969.

Re-registering is not necessary if you retain the same phone number. The law currently benefits more than 3.5 million people.

The attorney general's office has entered into agreements with 185 companies for alleged violations of the law. To date, more than \$1 million has been assessed in penalties, violations and court judgments.

Registering for the list is free.

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Q. We have a terrible mosquito problem at our house right now, and I have been wanting to have a water garden built sometime. Would a water garden just make the mosquito problem worse?

A. Although mosquitoes do breed in water, they only breed in standing water; not moving water. Currently mosquitoes are quite a problem throughout the Midwest and should not be taken lightly. Mosquitoes are responsible for more human illness and death worldwide than any other animal or insect in the world. Mosquitoes spread human diseases such as malaria, dengue fever, yellow fever, encephalitis, and west Nile virus and in animals equine encephalitis and dog heartworm.

Malaria kills between 700,000 to 2.7 million people every year.

Fortunately several of these diseases have been virtually eradicated from the U.S. but the West Nile Virus, encephalitis and dog heartworm are still a concern. Plus mosquitoes make spending time outside uncomfortable and itchy skin from their bites is not much fun either. The importance of effective mosquito repellents relates to public health and quality of life.

Female mosquitoes (males don't bite) are attracted to large dark objects. They can detect carbon dioxide, heat, moisture and human sweat. Repellents work by blocking the female mosquito's ability to detect us as a meal.

According to entomologist Raymond Cloyd, DEET (N, N-diethyl toluamide or N, N-diethyl-meta-toluamide), found in products such as Off® and Cutter® has been the product of choice as a mosquito repellent for many years for its high level of protection and persistence on human skin. In general, DEET has a good safety record except for some individual allergic reactions.

Repellents vary in their concentration of DEET. A 30% concentration provides up to 8 hours of protection. 6% lasts about 2 hours. Apply DEET only to exposed skin areas. DEET is toxic if swallowed. It should not be used on children less than 2 years old and only concentrations of 10% or less should be used on children. DEET is best applied to clothing.

Avon's Skin So Soft® can help repel some mosquitoes but it is shorter lasting at only about 20 minutes.

Permethrin is a pyrethroid-based insecticide applied to clothing or on pretreated clothing sold as Buzz Off®. Permethrin does not repel mosquitoes, but actually kills them on contact. It should only be applied to clothing and not on skin.

Plant essential oils such as clove, peppermint, geranium, and catnip may repel mosquitoes. Citronella, which is derived from a lemon-scented grass (*Cymbopogon nardus*), is commonly used as a repellent in products such as Natrapel® and Buzz Away®. The oils, however, volatilize rapidly depending on temperature and wind so effects may be short lived. For example, citronella is only active for approximately 30 to 40 minutes.

According to University of Florida there is no scientific evidence that eating garlic or onions will make a person repellent to mosquitoes; more likely repellent to other people. Repellent wristbands have not been shown to be effective.

Wear light colored, long sleeved shirts and long pants if you will be in mosquito areas. Avoid wearing perfumes. Mosquitoes tend to bite at dawn and dusk, although the Asian tiger mosquito is a voracious feeder during the day.

Adult mosquitoes develop from larvae that live in standing water in ponds, pools, gutters, buckets, barrels and birdbaths. Make sure you are not compounding the mosquito problem in your landscape. Remove old tires, buckets and other water-holding containers. Mosquitoes can breed in containers of water as small as a tin can. Change water in birdbaths at least once a week. In rain barrels or tree holes use mosquito dunks or pellets containing the bacterial agent *Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis*. Don't let mosquitoes keep you from enjoying your garden.

Skin Health Solutions

(NAPS)—There may be more to caring for the skin you're in than many people realize. Here, from a noted dermatologist, is an answer to a common skin care question.

Q. I'm never surprised when my four-year-old son comes in from playing outside with cuts or scrapes. But recently, a cut on his forearm has become red, swollen and a little "blister-y." I've washed the area with soap and water and applied a warm, wet washcloth to relieve the pain but it's still scabby and swollen. Should I take him to see the doctor?

—Worried Mom

A. Dear Worried:

You probably should. Red, swollen, blister-y skin may be a sign of a skin infection, which can occur when bacteria come in contact with an open cut or scrape.

If you suspect your child has a skin infection, cleaning the area with soap and water is a good first step, but it's also very important to call your doctor. Early treatment can prevent the infection from becoming more serious. If the doctor determines that your child has a bacterial skin infection, the physician may prescribe an antibiotic. There are



An inflamed cut should be seen by a doctor who can prescribe an antibiotic if necessary, health experts say.

many available, including some that taste good and have convenient dosing options.

Symptoms usually begin to go away within a few days after your child starts taking the medicine. It is important, however, to finish the entire course of the antibiotic as prescribed, even if your child is feeling better. If the child does not take all of the antibiotic, it might not cure the infection. Be sure to communicate with your doctor if symptoms do not improve, if they worsen or if new symptoms appear.

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Settling Your Pregnant Stomach

It's an unfortunate law of nature that the excitement of early pregnancy can quickly give way to nausea and vomiting. Traditionally called "morning sickness" even though many women experience it throughout the day, it's believed to be caused by a sudden increase in hormones that relax the stomach. Typically the discomfort disappears around the 13th or 14th week of pregnancy.

Many doctors believe that morning sickness is a good sign that the placenta and fetal membranes are developing well. Clint Kauffman, MD, Family Medicine, with special interests in maternity and women's health, understands that's little comfort when you're feeling lousy.

Dr. Kauffman suggests you might try some these different remedies:

- Munch on crackers before getting out of bed in the morning.
- Eat bland carbohydrates, such as plain baked potatoes, white rice or dry toast.
- Avoid rich, fatty foods such as sausages.
- Eat several small meals throughout the day so that your stomach is never empty.
- Don't force yourself to eat nutritious foods that cause you to vomit; it's better to eat whatever you can keep down. You can always consume more balanced meals when you feel better.
- Avoid any foods or smells that lead to nausea.

- If you're vomiting frequently, prevent dehydration by drinking plenty of liquids. Sip on crushed ice, fruit juice or frozen ice pops, if water makes you nauseous.
- Carry around a slice of lemon in a small plastic bag; when you feel nauseous, the citrus smell may help.
- Try ginger, used for centuries in China, Japan and India to ease nausea. Look for ginger ale made with real ginger, ginger candies or ginger tea. Ask your doctor before taking any ginger supplements; some research indicates that too much ginger can cause adverse affects in pregnant women.
- Talk to your health provider about taking vitamin B6, which appears to ease nausea in some women.

If you start to lose weight or feel dehydrated, Dr. Kauffman urges you to seek medical help immediately. You may have hyperemesis gravidarum, an extreme kind of morning sickness that occurs in 0.5 to 10 cases per 1,000 pregnancies in the U.S. This condition may require anti-nausea medication, IV fluids or temporary hospitalization.

A Call To Go

It all started the night of the concert. Up in Laketown, the Indianapolis Symphony was performing Beethoven's *Moonlight Sonata*. My mother, a woman of forty-some years, had been a Beethoven enthusiast for many years. So it was that I found myself on the third row of the side-seating area. My eyes trailed over the stage; the instruments were all so lovely! And the singers seemed out of this world. Once the music started though I was faintly aware of an instrument with better sound than the others. It seemed to dance lightly with the flutes, and sing with the violins. But at the same time it could thunder with the bass cellos. Then a moment when all the other musicians sat still, and I realized the music that had so raptured me by its versatile tones, was the largest of the instruments. The Piano.

Up until then my life had not really had a dream, or goal other than to serve God in some way when I was older. But that night, and in that moment, my life took on a new meaning. I watched the pianist's hands as they glided over the keys. I felt the music for the first time. It was not a hearing with just the ears, or even the heart, it was in my soul and every other fiber of my being. That feeling stayed with me even when the other musicians again took up their instruments and began to play. I still could somehow hear that one above the others, and yet very skillfully knit with them bringing out the best in all of them. My eyes were riveted to that girl at the piano, or rather on her instrument. Even after the

music stopped and I headed for the car with my mother, I could still feel the thrills going through me. And it was in that way I knew I would one day also sit in a stage and share my music. I would play as no one had since the great composers. My dreams came pouring in; the joy was there as well. I would dedicate my life to learning and playing to His glory. I knew nothing of the hard work of learning an instrument. All I knew was the sudden desire to play as she had. That night as I drifted off to sleep, I made up my mind to one day be a concert pianist.

It seemed almost Providential, when a couple of weeks later, my mother asked me if I would like lessons on the piano. Would I? Since the concert, I had tried to make the music without any notion of what the keys were I was pressing. So when mom said she knew a lady willing to give me lessons if I was willing to practice, my heart swelled. Was I willing to practice?

So it was a week later, I found myself under the tutelage of Mrs. Hopney who had graduated Julliard some 30 years. I almost sang my way through life after that. Practice sessions were rarely a bore, and every time I played a new piece to perfection, I was ecstatic! Oh the joy of making music! Of course it was awhile before I really started learning

pieces worthy of the stage. And this of course was a sorrow to me at first. Thankfully, my teacher seemed to sense my frustration. She would sometimes make comments like, "Beth, you know, Jane is doing so well in this piece, since she did just what I told her to do." At first, this only added to my frustration, but after prayer and thought, I decided to just play as she told me and to put myself into the playing. Slowly, I improved.

As the years went by, the compliments increased as well as requests for my playing. I even wrote some pieces of my own, though I never played them for anyone. The recitals slowly grew to concerts. As my ability grew, so did my dreams. I just knew I was going to go to The Julliard School on scholarship. I was, of course, smart enough to know that this dream was a bit far fetched. I was by now a sophomore. It was time for me to begin to think about the future. My teacher, Mrs. Hopney, stopped me one day as I was leaving her house.

"You know Beth," she said, "you should think very hard about a school of music. You will do well I think!" I looked at the older woman for only a moment before doing what I had never done before. I told her my dream. She didn't laugh. She only nodded and said quietly, but firmly, "I think you can do it Beth. You have the determination, as well as the ability. It will still be very hard work. Harder than ever before. They have recitals every year to choose the scholarship recipients; you only have two more years to do this."

I held my breath then asked, "You really think I can do it?" "Yes!" was the emphatic answer.

Over the next two years, I did work hard and long. I still was too afraid to tell anyone. My mother though began to wonder when my lessons become two hours long instead of the normal one hour. And practice times lengthened to three or three and one-half hours. My grades began to suffer, and mom finally sat me down to talk. After sharing her worries over my low grades and the chance I was giving up of graduating when I had always said I wanted to, she asked me why I was driving myself so hard at music. Her eyes as big as saucers showed her feelings. After I promised to work on my studies just as hard as I worked on my music, she and my father blessed my desire and thought that as long as it was what God wanted in my life that it was a worthy goal. It wasn't long after that talk with my parents that I finally came to the realization of just what I was trying to do. Fear and trembling set in. I knew too that the fear was not all that bad now, and was afraid of what might come when the trial was really before me.

Somehow I made it through the year and even the last before my audition. The night before the audition, my family of seven went to hear a missionary at the church where my dad ministered. We, as a church, had invited him to speak. We were having a special meeting just to hear him. I thought nothing of his

coming except perhaps this might help me see where God would have me give my money once I finished college, and started playing and teaching. I felt so assured that this was God's will. The missionary, Pastor Samuel Clayton, was from India. Within 15 minutes of the sermon I felt a stirring in myself. A voice, unlike any I had ever heard before, spoke audibly -

"Beth, GO! This is the work I have for you."

Instantly the horror filled me. "No! Not this Lord, after all my hard work. Please not this, not now. I'm going to Julliard. It's my dream. Please ask someone else!" My thoughts went to the days of practice and the sleepless nights spent studying leading up to my graduation of last month. I was now ready for college in the fall. But now this.

I heard no more of the sermon and was very distant with my friends afterward. When our house was dark and quiet for the night, I lay restless and sleepless. My inner turmoil was horrid. Finally because I knew I needed

sleep, I made myself some Sleepytime Tea. It was late in the morning when I woke up. Mrs. Hopney had made me promise not to touch the piano until the performance. The day progressed so slowly. Even though it was already half gone, I felt the day drag by. I felt the intensity grow. The inner voices did not help. I would just settle in my mind that it could not be God calling me, then that voice would come again.

Pastor Samuel, who had become a dear friend of our family, had already been invited to the recital since he was visiting again and staying with us for another week. He seemed very interested.

Finally, when I thought I would never see the end of the day, suddenly it was time to dress. I slipped on my sky blue, silken dress that mom and I had been working on for weeks. We had chosen the color to match my eyes. Then I sat down to do my hair with trembling hands. When I slowly descended the stairs, the whole family was already gathered in the living room. Even

Pastor Samuel was waiting. He smiled rather strangely at me but said nothing. He escorted me to the car and opened the door. I was too nervous, at the time, to notice him fidgeting slightly throughout the drive.

At the school concert hall, I went with the other performers to the back of the stage to await my turn to audition. I listened with awe to the other players. I began to wonder how I could ever dream of a scholarship. In those moments, I was so nervous about playing that I had no thoughts of the call to go. All too soon, it was my turn. My stomach flipped, my hands went cold and sweaty, and in my hour of weakness, the voice returned.

"Beth, GO! This is the life I have for you."

As I walked toward the piano, I fought back the urge to scream. I took my seat.

Then horror struck. As the applause ceased, my mind went blank. A lump rose in my throat. My heart began a marathon. My hands were numb and stiff. I

couldn't remember my notes! Panic started in on my mind. My breathing quickened. Then THE Voice.

"Beth, GO! This is the life I have for you."

Frustration. Anger. The two mixed, but suddenly I was playing. I played not the piece I had worked on for months to learn, but one from my heart. I poured myself out on that piano as I had never done before. I felt nothing but the emotions I was releasing. All my pain, my fear, my confusion, and my sorrow were spent on those keys. I felt all the hard work that was wasted, and all the joy of playing that would be lost flow out through my fingers as I played. I played.

Time passed unnoticed. But when I rose and turned to bow, the judges were teary eyed and the crowd was standing and applauding. And for the first time in two days I had peace. My

decision was made. Scholarship or not, I was headed to the mission field in India. I smiled, not with triumph that I had won, but with an inner peace that comes to those who hear and obey a call to go.

EPILOGUE

Beth did go to India, but it was only after turning her back on Julliard and putting herself through linguistic school. Her parents were astounded when she announced her decision. Pastor Samuel Clayton spent most of the night trying to dissuade her. But she held firm. When the letter came telling her she was accepted and received the scholarship, she only put it away and let them know she would not be coming.

Finally on August 19, 1989, Mrs. Elizabeth Clayton on her way to India with her husband. Her music was not wasted. The Lord showed her His

plans of teaching the Indians the gospel through music. She wrote many songs especially for children. And as they went about singing the words of the gospel, they spread the Word. The harvest from their songs was greater than the combined efforts of the two missionaries who gave the rest of their lives to the work with the people of India. She also taught music to her own eight children. In fact, one of her children did go through Julliard; the other seven became missionaries and pastors. She spent the rest of her life in India. Her gravestone reads:







Grant Offers are Often Scams

Attorney General Steve Carter With the 2006-2007 school year getting underway, the cost of back to school expenses can be a strain on the budget. For many families, this is a time of year when it's necessary to look for ways to save, or even make, a few bucks. When approached or offered a grant for a small fee - beware. While these offers for a grant to help with expenses can be tempting, typically, these "money for nothing" solicitations are nothing more than a scam to extract fees and obtain personal information.

Inside tracks to grants often don't exist. If you are confronted with an offer for a guaranteed grant in exchange for a fee, it should be a red flag that the solicitation is a scam. Applications for grants are free and anyone who would guarantee

you a grant is likely more interested in his or her own financial gain than in helping their potential victim.

It's important to keep in mind that grants are typically given out to promote a positive social program, such as working with youth, promoting the arts, supporting charity work, and researching scientific issues. Grants for personal gain, such as home repair or debt reduction, are not typical.

Some scam artists use email, direct mail, and even the classified ads to invite consumers to call a toll-free number to begin the process of obtaining a grant. Often, the representative of the company will ask basic questions and declare that the consumer will qualify for the grant. The representative will request a "processing fee" which is supposed to cover the cost of finding a grant source and obtaining the proper application information.

But instead of receiving the proper grant and application, the consumer will receive a list of agencies and foundations to which they must request an application individually. The agency grants are available for free over the Internet or at a public library and no charge is incurred for applying for the grants on your own.



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Book Signing at Mall


